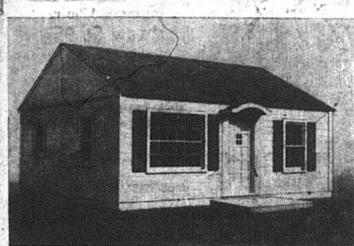

Writes of Her Trip to the West

In a letter from Mrs. Bertha Fritz, who recently accompanied her son, Dr. Harold Fritz and family to their home in Cathlamet, Wash., she states that latter part of their trip proved quite thrilling. On account of the floods they were forced to make a detour of 500 miles over the mountains in order to reach their home.

Cathlamet is situated seventy-five miles from the mouth of the Columbia river, and the islands in the river were inundated or wiped out, and the residents and live stock were evacuated by the Army to the town. There were 17,000 cows, besides horses, pigs and chickens in the town. The people had been warned a week before of the coming flood, and those who heeded the warning were able to move their furniture and other belongings, but those who failed to heed it, were taken off the islands by the Army with only the clothes they wore.

Red Cross workers, assisted by volunteers, were feeding 1,000 people daily, in the school house, most of them being housed in the auditorium and private homes. The water was contaminated and everyone was being vaccinated against typhoid.

The temperature was 90 degrees, and melting snow from the mountains kept the streams swollen.

The crest was expected to be reached Saturday, June 12th. In a letter she stated the Army Engineers with trucks and cranes were rebuilding the dykes.

Can't Buy Football

Regalia In Schools

Attorney General Hugh S. Jenkins, during the past week, ruled that a board of education that has established a course in football as a part of its physical education program, may not expend public funds to buy personal items of equipment, such as shoes, jerseys, etc., for the students participating in the program.

In the opinion Jenkins commented, "If we sanction this expenditure of public school

funds for the boys who desire to play football, I can see no escape from the conclusion that the school board would also have to furnish baseball suits and shoes for those engaging in baseball, and sweaters, shorts and tennis shoes for girls who get their physical education course through tennis, hockey or badminton."

The opinion was requested by the Bureau of Inspection and Supervision of Public Offices. (Opinion of the Attorney General, No. 322.)

DRAFT WILL ADD 29,000

M/Sgt. L. R. Portman of the local U. S. Army and Air Force Recruiting Station announced today, the enlisted warrant career plan, soon to be announced by the Army, will add its promotion on top of another handsome distribution of chevrons incident to expansion of the service from 540,000 to 850,000.

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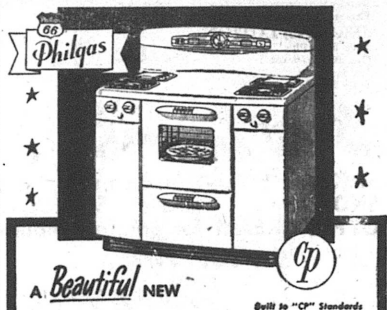

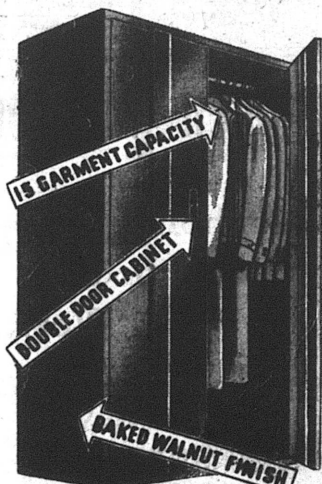

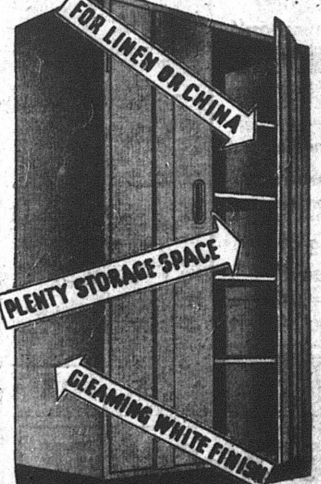

Due to this campaign on the part of the department of taxation more than eight thousand

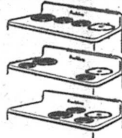
