Local Boy Sees Gunmen's Victims

In years to come, Tommy Marvin, young son of Mr. and Mrs. Cleveland Marvin, can relate first-hand stories of seeing the three victims of kill-crazy Herbert Muller, 22, and John Coulter West.

Tommy was attending the Lutheran Boys Camp Mowana south of Mansfield when the group who were hiking came across the bodies of John Elmer Niebel, 50, his wife, Nolana Parrish Niebel, 51, and their daughter Phyllis 20, all of Mansfield, in a corn field. Unaware of the tragedy, they were told by their counselor who made the investigation, just to keep quiet and he would report the "incident" and the boys were aware of the impression it was just "some drunks" who were hurt.

Not until Friday evening did they know of the killing spree that took the lives of six innocent Ohioans and kept the entire county and nearby communities in fear and terror.

Funeral services were held on Friday afternoon from the Jones Memorial Funeral home in Mansfield. Burial was made in the Mansfield cemetery for the Niebel family.

NEW LONDON — Mrs. Roger Miller of Menla, Pa., died Tuesday morning in New London Hospital of injuries received in a highway bridge collision Monday afternoon on Route 224, three and one-half miles south of here, and her husband was in critical condition with severe broken bones and serious internal injuries.

The driver of the other car, the Rev. William Frye of Ottoville, O., a Catholic priest, was also confined to the hospital and his condition was termed good.

The Miller automobile was traveling east on the wide highway while Reverend Frye was approaching from the opposite direction. Both vehicles were reported traveling at high speed and the tapering of the highway at the site of the bridge caused the cars to sidewise each other.

The victims were removed to local hospital in the broken ambulance. Both cars were badly damaged.

Man Hunt Revived Here Wednesday As Two Men Are Seen Leaving Holtz Barn; Airplane Used In Widespread Search

The biggest man hunt in the history of Plymouth was staged here Tuesday afternoon when a score of State Police cruisers arrived in town after a stolen car, which had been used in the Tiro bank robbery, was found. During the early evening hours State Patrolmen threw up blockades on all highways in and out of Plymouth, and also checked road traffic within a fifty-mile area.

The early part of the evening the Square was filled with state patrolmen who were working on the case, and villagers, which made up an interestingly curious crowd.

An intensive search for the two bandits was renewed here at one o'clock Wednesday afternoon when Carl McPherson notified Marshal Hulbert and State Patrolmen that two men had emerged from the Holtz barn, located on North Street, and which houses McPherson's paint and auto body repair shop.

Soon after the alarm was given that the two men had been seen leaving the Holtz barn, a State Patrolman took to the air in a cub plane from Heiler's airport. The plane was piloted by Thomas Root, who flew over this immediate section at an altitude which would make any person visible to the officer. While the highways and open fields were scanned, the thickly-wooded areas would still conceal anyone who desired to remain hidden.

McPherson related how he had returned to his shop at 12:45, and auto license number had been returned to him inside the building, and was unlocked the door, and saw quite a bit of noise turning, he saw two men rush out of the building. They headed through the fields which lead to the May Park park. Unaware of the manhunt which had taken place Tuesday night, McPherson told his story to Bob Kennedy, 20, and his brother, Neal, 18. The two youths took up the chase and followed the pair through the park area. In the meantime State Patrolmen combed the area from the west entrance of the park to the North street road, but their search proved futile. A heavy guard was placed around the entire wooded area, and a diligent search was made through all of Wednesday afternoon.

Although he could not see their faces, McPherson said that the two men were dressed in light-colored clothing, and were carrying a large trunk or suitcase. The two men didn't realize the car had been parked only three minutes before it was taken by the bandits.

At 1:20 Tuesday afternoon, the bank at Tiro was held up. The auto license noted by Tiro residents before the car was stolen at Shelby.

As the search for the stolen car continued through the area, the bandits drove the stolen auto to the Plymouth area where it was abandoned on "Main Street" known as the County Line Road, just across from the Art Dann home. So far as can be determined, no one saw the car, although it was abandoned on the wheels of the auto had gone into a ditch, and whether the bandits purposely drove the car into the ditch or couldn't make the turn from Mill Street is unknown. Some reports state that the car was first observed about 2:30 in the afternoon.

Frank Pitzer, an employee of the Miller-Shelby Co., and a co-worker of Frank Allen, owner of the stolen auto, arrived home in Plymouth at 3:40. He related the incident to L. Z. Davis and others, and Davis related the story in the Evening News. Kenneth Eckelberry, owner of the description of the stolen car, and at 5:40, on his way to his home on Mills Street, he observed an automobile which he recognized that it talked with the description of the bandits' auto, he went to the Pitzer home on West Broadway, and they came back to look over the description. Mr. Pitzer, knowing that it was the Allen car, notified the owner in Shelby, and Mr. Allen called in the Shelby.

It was only a matter of minutes before state patrolmen towed the car into the Ford Garage, where Officer F. Hamm of the State Highway Patrol in Massillon took fingerprints. Mr. Allen came over, identified the car, and stated that about the same amount of gas

Editor Takes Sentimental Journey Home - You'll

Our arrival in Atlanta Saturday was marked by the announcement of two Democrats seeking the governorship of the state. If you remember, a few years ago Georgia had a couple of governors at one time. Herman Tamm, son of a former governor, whose death caused the controversy, opened his campaign, while Thompson, the present incumbent, made his announcement for re-election. From the pictures we saw, and from what we read in the Atlanta papers, the boys still take their politics seriously. Thompson's opener was featured with a big parade at Millen, Ga., along with barbecued sparrows, and other festivities which took up the entire day. Tallmadge were his "red suspenders," and an equally rousing celebration was held at his meeting. Both men will probably be nominated in the primary, and in the November election, both of them will appear on the democratic ballot. The atmosphere I found in the South wasn't very encouraging for the Democratic party, and many southerners will no doubt vote the Republican ticket this Fall. A meeting of "Dixiecrats" held last Saturday at Birmingham, is evidence that Southern Democrats are not at all pleased with the present Truman administration. On the surface of things, it is safe to say that the "Solid South" is going to show a real revolt in the coming November election.

Money has no doubt been flowing freely throughout the southern states. We observed in every town a real mark of progress by scores of new business buildings and hundreds of new homes. Where does the money come from? I surmise the majority of it is from the huge forests which are filled with much needed timber. Through Kentucky, Tennessee, Georgia, and North Carolina, in all directions, lumber mills have sprung up, and the boys are taking the timber

from the hills. In Georgia alone in 1947 one hundred and twelve million dollars of lumber and pulp wood were placed on the market. With pulp mills being established in the South, farmers are seeding their acres with pine, and it takes only from seven to ten years before these trees are bringing in a cash return. In Macon there are two pulp mills, while Dublin has two large mills, plus two plywood manufacturing plants.

The growth in industry, population and agriculture is prevalent throughout the southern states, and a comparison may be made to Dublin, which twenty-five years ago was a city of approximately 7,000. Today it has a population of almost 18,000, with a sharp increase in buildings. Two factors which are mainly responsible for this growth are the naval hospital and a woolen mill. The hospital was built in 1948 at an estimated cost of twelve million dollars, and outside capital has gone in with a ten million dollar woolen mill. Coupled with these two plants are various other small concerns. High farm and produce have added much income to the larder of southern farmer, and local prices are about half of what we have to pay for the same products in and around Plymouth. Farm land in middle Georgia remains high, and as an example one real estate broker quoted a 50-acre farm with one fair building at \$15,000. However, a 30-acre tract in 1947 produced a \$5,000 return. Yet, to the traveler going through Georgia, from Atlanta to the Florida line, the land does not offer a real desire to farm.

Those of you who have made the annual trek to the Florida line, have seen the peanut trees, the peanut and cotton fields, which comprise about the main crops, except in the southwestern section which is developing one of the finest tobacco growing areas in the south. We spent the

night in Dublin at the home of a relative. A fine old home with spacious front lawn takes up a good portion of an 8-acre tract within the city limits. The yard is filled with pecan trees, trees, pomegranate bushes, etc. In the front yard stands a "live oak," the third largest known in the state. A sight one rarely sees, and its name is just what it is. . . the leaves stay green all year round. I observed one huge pecan tree in the yard, and I returned to the owner. "This tree must be pretty old to bear pecans?" I was startled when he told me that last year he harvested two hundred pounds of nuts from this one tree. And then I inquired as to the price of pecans last year, and he stated that the average price was \$160-\$180 per ton. We were in Georgia during the melon and peach harvest, and it must be admitted that the weather was abundant. However, we did buy a bushel of choice peaches at \$3.00 and large melons for 50c each, and will give you a comparison for the same items at retail prices. The middleman and transportation make prices higher in northern Ohio.

We got started out of Atlanta Wednesday morning, July 14, two hours behind schedule. We had timed our arrival at the entrance of the Smoky National Park so that we could make the 35-mile trip through the park in daylight. However, we reached the entrance at 6:30 in the afternoon, too late to enjoy the full beauty of the drive, for it was raining and fog was coming in. It meant another day on the road if we spent the night at the entrance, so we decided to make the climb, which is over 5,000 feet. Starting up the mountain, the rain impaired our vision through the windshield. The wiper would not operate while the accelerator was down, so it was just a continuing shift of gears and a release on the gas all the way up. At the top, on the observation platform, we could barely see the mountains due to the heavy fog. There was no need to "kill" myself. I was really worried. But we decided on making the descent, and within ten minutes the fog had lifted, or rather had gotten through it, and from then on we had fair riding.

Some ten years ago I took a similar trip through the Smokies shortly after the roads and park had been built. At that time the roadways were open to hazardous-looking turns and steep hills. Today, there are trees and shrubbery along the highway which hide the many dangers of steep banks and sharp turns, making the trip a little more pleasant. The Smokies are full of grandeur and beauty especially at this time of year, filled with many species of mountain flowers and blossoms, and there is always a real thrill for the vacationist who wants to see something different.

We spent Thursday night in a very comfortable cabin near the business section of Knoxville, Tenn. In this area you can see the result of Oak Ridge and Norris Dam, both projects bringing to this vicinity a heavy demand for housing and living facilities. Knoxville shows a real progressive growth with many fine new buildings and homes. The city's business district is clean and invigorating. Leaving there at 7:30 Thursday morning, we drove steadily to make Plymouth at 8:30 Thursday night. After driving through mountainous terrain for some 700 miles, we were indeed glad to view the long rolling highways of Ohio which brought us home safely.

Before we close our story there were two things that impressed us most. First, the many highway projects that are going on throughout the South, especially in Kentucky, Tennessee and Georgia. Despite the high and rugged mountains, the majority of the new highways are to be four lanes, with towns and cities being bypassed, and elimination of curves wherever possible. Truly, within another five years, the motorist will find these States offer the finest in safe motoring on new and modern roads. Secondly, the vast amount of red clay that is to be seen from southern Kentucky to middle Georgia. We are not critical, but after being away from it for twenty-seven years, it is hard to carry a mental picture of the vastness of the stuff. And after traveling thru it for several hundred miles, one's eyes can easily become "blood-shot." . . if you've ever admired red as a color, you're bound to lose your taste.

As a people there are none finer than those in the South, and heritage is one to be proud of. . . courtesy and friendliness prevail everywhere. They still have respect Stonewall Jackson and Robert E. Lee. . . and many fine traditions for which the Old South became a notable, will live forever. I shall always be glad that I was born in the South.

was in the tank at the time it was taken. The car apparently was not damaged in any manner. During the early hours of Tuesday evening, the state patrol thoroughly covered the territory in this area as it was believed that two bandits had made off "on foot" where they abandoned the car. Reports indicated they made their way over to Woodland Ave. and thence north. No one had come in direct contact with them. Various rumors came into town the early part of the evening but they proved only rumors.

Traces of the bandits were picked up near the Paul Stoodt Nursery on Route 88, where a blue striped T-shirt, worn by one of the bandits, was discarded. A report also came in that a search in the vicinity where the stolen car was found revealed the driver's license belonging to a Shiloh area resident.

Nervous Before Robbery

The gunmen visited the Pastime Tavern in Tiro where they passed the front window of the bar, just before the robbery was staged. Mrs. Lulu Crowl, wife of the proprietor, W. H. Crowl, who served them, thought the pair looked suspicious.

They really acted nervous, and I watched them carefully as they drank. I overheard one of them say to the other, "What the hell's wrong with you?" The other replied, "Not a damned thing."

Mrs. Crowl followed a hunch and called to the front window as they left, and watched them as they walked across the street to the car and talked together for a moment before getting in. She noted the license number as they drove away.

Leo Steele, Shelby Route 2, entered the Crowl Tavern shortly after the two men left, and Mrs. Crowl related her suspicions to him. They went again to the window and noticed the car had been driven around the block and had been parked near the bank.

Mrs. Steele left the Tavern, walked across the street and passed the bank. Seeing nothing out of the ordinary, he entered the bank to see if Mr. McNutt had seen where the men went. Instead of making his inquiry he came to the door with the bandits who ushered him behind the counter with these remarks: "If you make a move we'll shoot you right between the eyes."

The Crawford county sheriff's office, manned by Sheriff Ralph Schuck, threw up road blocks in the vicinity of Tiro, where the bandits were last seen.

Doings In Congress

shortage and high cost of living is for Congress to put an end to this stupid foreign policy. Let Congress limit the President's foreign flirtations to our surplus. Give our people the material they create. Stop giving the taxpayers' money to foreigners to compete with our consumers. That is the only remedy.
