

FOOTBALL SQUAD HELD FIRST MEETING AG. 12th

INSURANCE CARDS AND PERMISSION BLANKS TO BE ISSUED; ALONG WITH TRAINING INSTRUCTIONS.

A call is being sent out this week for all those boys who are interested in getting a berth on the Plymouth's football squad. It is requested that all candidates for the team meet at the local high school building on Thursday, August 12 at 1:00 P. M. for the primary purpose of receiving insurance cards and permission blanks which parents of each player must sign.

Each player will also receive instructions on training rules and other necessary information. At this meeting, each player will be given "the once over" to find out if he will meet the requirements of practice games, which start on August 20th.

The work of marking off the field and erecting goal posts is now in progress, and this part of the football program will be ready at an early date.

Many of the boys have been inquiring when practice will start, and many of them have offered their services in getting the field in shape. Council Has Busy Session: Hulbert Resigns as Chief

Clay Hulbert, who for more than four and a half years has been chief of police of Plymouth, will step out of office on Saturday, Aug. 14. Hulbert handed in his resignation to Clerk Guy Cunningham, who read the brief message to the village council and mayor at Tuesday night's session. For the past several months there has been bickering between the police department and the village council, and as a result two weeks ago Mayor Robinson, in a written message to Hulbert, asked for his resignation.

Following the acceptance of Hulbert's resignation, the Mayor and Council stated their appreciation for a new police chief would be received up until Monday, Aug. 18. It was pointed out by Mayor Robinson that those making application for the job should have an automobile. Applicants are requested to address their applications to Guy D. Cunningham, Clerk of the Council, Village of Plymouth, Ohio. In making application for the position, you are requested to state salary expected.

Start Proceedings
Condemnation proceedings have been started on a three and one-half acre tract of land belonging to the Gottfried farm, on which the proposed sewage disposal plant is to be located. A resolution of the proceedings was read before the council Tuesday night and approved.

The purchase of the site of land is necessary to complete a contract with consulting engineers who have made up the plans and proposals of the sewage disposal plant. Village officials have offered the owners of the tract as much as \$500, but have been refused. Inasmuch as the site is the only one which is approved for the plant, officials have been forced to begin proceedings. The land in question is located on the west side of the North Street road at the intersection of the Plymouth East Road, in the northeast part of the village.

New Parking Zone
The past week new signs have been installed on the north side of the square between Jump's Clothing Store and the Tourist Hotel. This section of State Highway 61 is very badly congested, and the one solution is to set a time limit for parking which is twenty minutes between the hours of 7:00 a. m. and 6:00 p. m. Observance of the time limit is being enforced, and so far there have been few violations. The northbound bus will stop at the Tourist Inn instead of stopping in front of the square, located in the Hitching Post. Signs have been erected accordingly, and no parking is allowed in this area.

Guest Speaker At Presby'n Church

Dr. Chas. Hamilton of Wooster, Ohio, the Barnardian minister of the Philippine Islands gave an interesting background of the Islands Sunday morning at the Presbyterian Church where he was guest speaker. Survivors include two brothers, Russell of Greenwich, and William S. of Delaware; four sisters, Mrs. Ida Carpenter and Mrs. James Gifford of Greenwich; and Mrs. Marvin and Mrs. Flora Stoner of Shelby and other relatives.

Funeral services were held at the Barnard funeral home Saturday at 2 p. m. with Rev. R. C. McCord officiating. Interment was made in the Ripley cemetery, near Greenwich.

COMMUNITY CLUB BEGINS DRIVE FOR NEW MEMBERS

As Sponsors of Boy Scouts, More Financial Aid Is Needed To Carry On Scout Work.

Entering into its fall and winter season, the Community Club will make a drive for new members during the month of August. It was revealed at the August meeting that the Boy Scout organization is going to need funds if the work is to continue.

While the Community Club, which acts as a sponsor to the organization, is required to pay \$50 in cash, it felt by the membership that if the work is to continue in Plymouth the boys will have to have more help.

The local Scout organization has depended upon sales of waste paper to a large extent to raise the money to carry on its work, with no demand for waste paper, there is no revenue coming in from this source, and the outlook is a very dark one. It takes approximately \$800 a year to carry on all phases of Scout work. This includes camping equipment, food for the boys who participated in camp, and many other items which are required for Scouting.

In the past weeks some dissent has arisen between members of the park board and scout committees in regard to the refreshment stand which has been in operation at the Mary Tate Park. It was decided Tuesday night by local Scouters to pull out the stand at the park. Revenue from this stand was used for the upkeep of the Scout hut, and this source of money will now be missing.

The only solution the Scout organization has for continuing its work here is through public contributions. Checks, money orders and cash may be sent to Donald Ford, Don Eisel, Harold Cochran, Jim Rod, or Davis at the Peoples Bank. These men will see that proper credit is given, and "advance" thanks are extended to those who wish to donate.

Local Scouters have a heavy program for the boys, Cubs and Scouts, and the program outlined for them this fall is a full and active one. Your dollar will help see this work through. So send in your contribution today.

Membership to the Community Club is open to anyone in Plymouth or the vicinity. It is not a professional group of business men, lawyers, doctors, etc., but is composed of men in every walk of life. The main purpose of the Club is to promote community cooperation in order to take part in those projects which may prove a betterment to the community. The dues are nominal, and there is only one meeting a month.

LET'S EXPLORE OHIO

Mother of Presidents

Unique in the annals of American history is the Harrison family, which provided a signer of the Declaration of Independence, the ninth President of the United States and the 23rd President.

Some historians trace the Harrison lineage directly back to the Indian girl, Pocahontas.

The first Benjamin Harrison, born about 1740, and who served as Governor of Virginia long before there was a state of Ohio, was the signer of the Declaration of Independence.

His son, William Henry Harrison, was the first Ohio man to be elected our nation's president and his great grandson, the second Benjamin Harrison, was the 23rd president.

President Benjamin Harrison was born at North Bend, Ohio, August 20, 1833 and is buried there close to the memorial which was erected for President William Henry Harrison on the banks of the Ohio. Benjamin Harrison defeated Grover Cleveland for the presidency in 1888 and in 1892 was in turn defeated by him.

After his term of office, he became an international lawyer of great repute.

Harrison was graduated in 1852 at Miami University and practiced law in Cincinnati. He served as a general in the Civil War and was an elder in the Presbyterian Church. He was twice married.

In southwestern Ohio are a number of points of interest including the Miamisburg Mound on Route 25; Fort Ancient, with its prehistoric fortifications on Route 39; Oxford, site of Miami University; the McGuffey Museum honoring the man who wrote school books which an earlier generation studied; the Galloway log cabin at Xenia and, further east, on Route 73, the famous Serpent Mound.

The factual lessons of McGuffey Readers is interwoven with lessons in sobriety, honesty, kindness, industry, which even today affect the thought of millions, descended from those who were under the influence of McGuffey's teachings during school days.

While in Cincinnati, many will visit the home of Harriet Beecher Stowe in Walnut Hills, where

Doings In Congress

Congress is in special session.

Washington is a hot place in many ways that one. The Democrats are subdued as their standard bearer is out of step with many.

The vociferous Wallaces have not yet arrived. The Republicans are angry. The public is confused. Occasionally some one remarks, "Why doesn't Congress do something about the high cost of living and the shortage of houses?" When asked just what Congress should do, there is silence.

The truth is that over a million homes will be completed this year. All the available building material and labor is utilized. There are a few things that Congress can do, but the Internationalists for a profit are opposed.

Congress could pass the resolution that I introduced. This would lower the cost of living and also supply more better and cheaper homes. The resolution reads:

"Whereas our internationalists for a profit, and foreign purchasing agents with our gifts and credits have and are depleting our Nation of food products and building material by purchasing same with our money and exporting it; and

Whereas our playing gaudy Santa Claus to the rest of the world leads to ultimate depletion of our natural resources and means national suicide; and

Whereas as a result of this foreign competition with our money in our domestic markets, the cost

of living has reached the point where some American families can no longer maintain the American standard of living; and

Whereas as a result of this foreign competition with our money to win World War II that others started, are compelled to live in garages and basements while we have been building homes for Italians, British and other nations' people; and

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the President be and is authorized and directed to stop that foreign exportation of any and all building material used in building homes until these G. I. have homes to live in on the American standard; and

Be it resolved that the President be authorized and directed to stop foreign shipments of farm implements, automobiles, and other articles in scarce supply until the American needs are satisfied.

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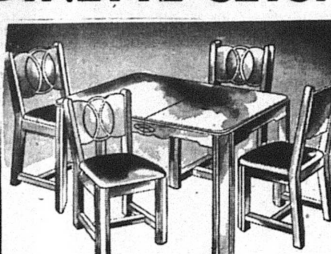

Rev. H. L. Bethel Tours Germantown

Rev. H. L. Bethel, pastor of the local Presbyterian Church, who is enjoying a month's vacation in Philadelphia, Pa., writes the second chapter of his interesting visit. In this letter he tells about touring the famous old town of Germantown as follows:

At dinner Monday evening our host, Mr. Jenkins suggested that he would take the Bethels for a side through the historic parts of Germantown. Mr. Jenkins is probably the best informed man alive on the history of Germantown. It was a rare privilege to have him tell us of the many old buildings of colonial times and he made the battle of Germantown so real we could almost see General Washington with his field glass, standing on a block seeking to discover how many British soldiers were in the Chew House. The battle centered in this house which is still in the Chew family. We could see General Agnew carried into the Wister House, mortally wounded and till this day the blood stains are on the floor as witness to event.

Germantown is famous for more than the battle. Here we saw the mother churches of the Dunkards and Mennonites. Both churches are still standing. The first school house of the city still stands and the house where David Rittenhouse lived while he operated the first paper mill in America is almost hidden by trees as it nestles along the shore of the Wissahickon. Over twenty mills—mostly grist mills, were once scattered along this stream.

Another building of special interest is the Stenton, built by James Logan, William Penn's secretary. It was occupied by Gen. Washington for a short time in 1777. At one time the British ordered all mansions in Germantown burnt. Seventeen were thus destroyed. Two soldiers came to fire Stenton. Only a maid was present. They went to the barn for straw but that was their undoing. Officers rode up inquiring for deserters. The quick-witted maid told of the two in the barn. They were arrested and the mansion saved.

Many other places of interest were pointed out but I must mention one more that should be of interest to all. Situated on a high hill is a large square mansion built of stone. "That" said our host, "is the house where Benedict Arnold lived." It is now a museum. To our right were the stables and small office buildings gave the appearance of a great estate.

You may be interested in what Mr. Jenkins calls THE SIGNERS' WALK. It is just west of the sunporch. There are fifty-seven stones to represent the fifty-six signers of the Declaration of Independence and one, the old marble door-step to Independence Hall that had become so worn that it had to be replaced. Each stone is associated with the man whom it represents. No. 2 came from Monticello and of course represents Thomas Jefferson. No. 17 came from the home of Arthur Middleton, S. C. His home was burnt by the British in 1778 and the stone came from the debris

of this one of the fifty-six signers represented here.

RESOLUTION
A RESOLUTION OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, DECLARING THE NECESSITY FOR THE APPROPRIATION OF CERTAIN PROPERTY TO BE USED AS A LOCATION FOR THE PROPOSED SEWAGE DISPOSAL PLANT FOR THE VILLAGE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1. It is hereby declared to be necessary for the Village of Plymouth, Huron and Richland Counties, Ohio, to appropriate by proceedings provided for by law, certain real estate to be used as a location for the proposed sewage treatment and disposal plant for the Village of 380 feet west of the center line of North Street.

SECTION 2. The real estate necessary to be appropriated lies in five parcels as follows:

PARCEL ONE: Situated in the Village of Plymouth, County of Huron and State of Ohio, and more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point which is the intersection of the west property line of North Street and the south property line of Plymouth East Road, thence in a southerly direction along the west property line of North Street a distance of 800 feet to a point in the west property line of North Street, thence turning 90 degrees westerly for a distance of 350 feet to point, thence turning in a northerly direction and parallel to the west property line of North Street and continuing along this line a distance of approximately 600 feet to the intersection of such line with the south property line of Plymouth East Road, thence turning in an easterly direction along said property line approximately 250 feet to the place of beginning, and the parcel of land containing calculated area of 3.44 acres more or less.

PARCEL TWO: Being a strip of land 10 feet in width and lying along and parallel with the following center line. Beginning at a point on the west right-of-way of the North Street, which point is 79 feet south of the south end of the bridge over the Huron River, thence in a northerly direction at an angle of 81 degrees 15 minutes with the center line of North Street to a point 10 feet more or less from the center line of North Street, thence in a northerly direction across the Huron River, a distance of 100 feet, more or less to point "A," which point is described as being located at the intersection of the center line of North Street and 760 feet south of the center line of Plymouth East Road, thence in a northerly direction 170 feet more or less to the southwest corner of a certain residential plant tract, above described as Parcel One.

PARCEL THREE: Being a strip of land 10 feet in width and lying along and parallel with the following center line:

Beginning at point "A" previously described, thence in a westerly direction along a line which is perpendicular to North Street across the Huron River to the west boundary of the land owned by Jacob and Olive M. Gottfried, a distance of 460 feet more or less.

PARCEL FIVE: Being a strip of land 20 feet in width and lying along and parallel with the center line described in Parcel Four above.

SECTION 3. The estate and interest desired and necessary to be appropriated in the above described land is as follows:

Parcel One: A full fee simple interest and estate.

Parcel Two: A permanent easement.

Parcel Three: A temporary easement for construction purposes.

Parcel Four: A permanent easement.

Parcel Five: A temporary easement for construction purposes.

SECTION 4. The intent of the Council of the Village of Plymouth is to proceed to appropriate said property, according to the necessity herein declared and according to law.

MILK PRICES SET RECORD

BIDDING FOR MADAM COW'S OUTPUT SENDS PRICES SOARING.

An increase in milk prices that had its origin in Cleveland had spread throughout northern Ohio and had reached Plymouth August 1 to send retail prices up another two cents a quart and take another bite out of the food budget of the average family. A record price of 22 cents a quart was paid by local residents, Sunday.

As a similar increase went into effect at Mansfield Monday, Sunday. Dealers from Cleveland, Columbus and Toledo have been scouring the state for more milk and they have been offering higher prices to farmers. A local figure placed the increase to area milk producers as the result of the latest action from present \$5.40 to \$6.90 on the average basis listing.

High milk consumption and the culling of herds because of high meat prices have teamed up to produce what is termed a shortage of supply despite summer months being the top production season.

Livestock Up
The price of choice hogs and steers soared to new high marks of \$31.75 and \$40.80 a hundredweight, respectively, on the Cleveland livestock Monday.

Previous highs recorded last week were \$30.50 for hogs and \$40.40 for steers.

Market observers said that the buyers were setting up a "really hot market" Monday, with the prospect of higher prices later in the week.

Seasonal light supplies, heavy demand and cool weather of the past several days were blamed for the record climb. Consumer's resistance to high prices is being offset by light supplies.

August 9th Final For Tax Refunds

The Huron County Auditor's Office wishes to remind those who may have a personal tax refund on insurance policies to make application by Monday, August 9th. All the insurance companies have sent letters to all their policy holders in regard to this matter.

Refunds are only due where beneficiaries of insurance policies die before the death of the insured are receiving monthly payments. When insurance is paid in a lump sum it never was taxable, but where the insured provided for the beneficiary elected to take monthly payments, rather than a single payment insurance payments were taxable as annuities. The Supreme Court has ruled that either way is a contract of insurance and are not taxable and refunds of personal tax payments in '46, '47 and '48 can be made.

Matured endowment policies left on certificates of deposit with insurance companies and annuities are still taxable, as the contract of insurance has terminated. Applications for refund may be made direct to the State Tax Commission in Columbus, or thru the County Auditor's Office. All information in regard to the contract on which refunds are claimed, is requested.

RESIGNS POSITION

FDIC PAYS CROP LOSSES OF \$6,134

Indemnity paid by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation to Richland County farmers for 1947 wheat losses totaled \$6,134.91, the Agricultural Conservation office in Mansfield announces.

Some thirty-six farmers in the county claimed losses last year, the association said, for a total of 2,496 bushels of wheat. Average compensation paid per bushel was \$2.53.

Through the crop insurance program, farmers holding crop insurance who sustain losses are issued certificates which they may hold until May 15th of the following year, cashing them in at any time at current market prices.

Throughout the state, farmers participating in the insurance program claimed losses totaling a quarter-million bushels of wheat. Two counties, Hamilton and Monroe, reported no losses at all.

There were one hundred and fifty-four farmers in Richland county participating in the program last year. Premiums paid here amounted to \$5,270.27.
