BUCYRUS—Pleading not guilty to two counts of manslaughter in the second degree at his arraignment here before Common Pleas Judge Clarence U. Ahl, Arnold G. Hiatt, 46, of Shelby was released from furnishing bond of \$4,000.

Hiatt was indicted secretly by the county grand jury a couple weeks ago in connection with an automobile collision, east of here on Route 30N, July 27. The accident resulted in the deaths of Raymond E. Zeitzers, 53, of Shelby, who was riding with Hiatt, and J. Milton Pfeleiderer, Bucyrus.

Authorities said Hiatt was driving a furniture truck, which he reportedly failed to stop for traffic on the Lincoln Highway, colliding with Pfeleiderer's car. Hiatt was the only survivor of the crash and suffered the loss of his left arm.

SWINE DAY AT WOOSTER ON WED. SEPT. 22

The Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station is holding its Annual Swine Day, on Wednesday, September 22, at 9 o'clock Eastern Standard Time. The morning program will be devoted to inspections of experimental feeding trials and different breeding programs under way. Mr. W. E. Krauss will explain the plans now being carried out at the station. Mr. W. L. Robinson, Swine Specialist at the Experiment Station, will give a report on the swine experiments that are now in progress under his supervision, at 10:15 a. m.

The afternoon program will be opened with a talk by L. L. Rummel, Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Experiment Station. Mr. Rummel will explain the plans now under way to improve the possibilities of experimentation with swine at the Experiment Station. Due to the location of the swine barns in the past it has been rather difficult to carry on any pasture program, which is a vital part of any swine producers program. The new location of the swine experimental farm will give all research men an opportunity to give all interested swine producers a much more complete statement of facts regarding feeding of swine on pastures, disease control on permanent pastures, and mineral requirements of various types of swine.

Other speakers on the afternoon program will be Mr. Wise Burroughs, of the Department of Animal Science, who will speak on "Recent Findings in Swine Nutrition;" Mr. W. E. Krill, Ohio State University, who will give up-to-date information on the "Common Diseases of Swine and their Control;" and Mr. L. E. Anshel, Department of Animal Science of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, who will speak on a rather important subject to all swine producers, "Look at the Swine Skin." This subject is one of the most important of the day, due to the trend in the present price of a more general purpose type hog. During the war the market price of breeding animals was as low as under-fed market pigs was attractive to all swine producers to get top price regardless of quality. With the decreased demand for pork and an increase in the corn crop we will again be faced with the problem of producing top quality pork.

Mr. John K. Wells, Associate County Agricultural Agent, states that all swine producers in Huron County could gather a lot of vital swine information by attending this Swine Day at the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station.

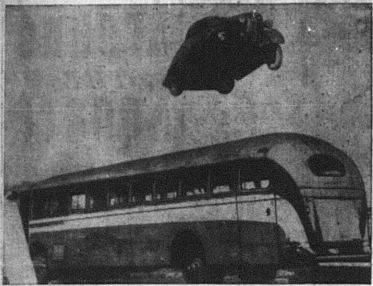

Players Behind the 'Stars' Do a Swell Job of Playing For Indians

As the day by day fortunes of the Cleveland Indians are chronicled in your favorite newspaper or related by your own "private eye" sportscaster, the biggest bouquets are usually tossed at the Boudreauxs, the Gordons, or the Lemons.

But every now and then a lesser known member of the Wigwam cast will be favored with a well-deserved burst of praise. Such a pair is the Indians' unsung but invaluable pinch-hitting duo of Hal Peck and Bob Kennedy.

Separately and together right hander Kennedy and southpaw Peck have piled upon an amazing record of dependability in the toughest of all baseball assignments—that of coming off the bench "cold" to deliver a clutch hit when the opposing pitcher is, more often than not, bowling over the Indians' with unpleasant regularity. Invariably the Tribe is trailing and frequently the addition of another notch in the pennant staff rests squarely on their shoulders.

Yet, under these maximum pressure conditions, Kennedy has delivered a hit on six out of twelve occasions while Peck has registered eight safeties in twenty-two tries for an average of .364.

But those averages, fat as they are, tell only a small part of the story. Tucked in those figures is the key to many an Indian rally.

Hold Mass X-Ray Service In Huron

From October 26th to November 23rd there will be in Huron County a health project which has been carried out in only one other Ohio county, Shelby. This will be the mass X-ray survey designed to discover not only tuberculosis but heart and respiratory abnormalities as well.

Two mobile X-ray units owned and operated by the Ohio Dept. of Health will be in Huron County for one month, working in every township in the County. Dr. W. W. Lawrence, Huron County Commissioner, and Miss B. H. Kistler, R. N., Health Commissioner of Bellevue, have made this possible. The Huron County Tuberculosis Assn. is closely co-operating as are all civic associations throughout the County. The success of the project depends

upon the reception given by the people of Huron County. In the U. S. T. B. has dropped to seventh place among killer diseases, although it is the first cause of death in the 15 to 44 age group. In 1941 out of 100,000 people, 203 died of T. B. In 1945, the last year these statistics are available thirty-one people out of 100,000 died of T. B. Yet in the state of Ohio alone, one person dies of T. B. in every ten minutes. In Huron County twelve cases of T. B. were reported in 1947 and three deaths occurred which were caused by T. B. No one needs to die of pulmonary T. B. The disease must be found in its early or mineral stages to be easily curable. It is precisely here that the mass X-ray has its tremendous value. It acts as a screening agent, by showing the chest picture of those in perfect health as well as those with some abnormality. These latter will have large X-ray pictures taken for further

study by experts, this expense to be borne by the County T. B. Association. Health authorities estimate there are some 250,000 cases of unreported T. B. in the U. S. today. Everyone of these people is a potential spreader of disease and even death, for the tubercle bacillus, the T. B. germ, is spread by coughing and sneezing.

"Why should I be X-rayed?" and "I don't want to know" are the greatest enemies of this project. Modern medicine recommends an annual X-ray for every person fifteen and over. By the time one is not feeling all right, T. B. has usually passed from its easily curable stage to its advanced stage when cure, if possible, may be slow and expensive and when every person contacted may be given the disease.

SHEEP CLAIMS TOTAL \$1948 IN 3 MONTHS

Animal claims totaling \$1,948 have been allowed by Richard county commissioners to thirty-two persons during the past three months.

Claims are substantiated by two witnesses who receive 50c each for viewing the dead sheep and five cents per mile for travel expenses in going to the hearing.

Petition Dismissed—The divorce petition of Norman E. Scott, Willard, vs. Edna L. was ordered dismissed at the plaintiff's cost.

Defendant in Suits—The Wilcox auto service, Willard, was named defendant in two suits totalling \$7,701.93 by the Relay Transport Service, Chicago, and the Cooper-Jarrett Co. The suits alleging negligence, one the outgrowth of the destruction by fire Oct. 19, 1947, on Rt. 224 of a tractor-trailer unit and its cargo following a wreck in which the driver and his helper were killed.

The petitions charge that the defendant, called to the scene to remove the wreckage, was responsible through negligence, in getting the wreckage afire.

Approve Settlement—Settlement in all phases of the suit of Jimmie Burns, a minor, through his father, Willie Burns, New London, vs. Floyd Shepard, West Middlesex, Pa., was approved by Judge Luther Van Horn.

The suit was an outgrowth of a traffic accident July 13, 1948, on Route 60, in which the plaintiff sought damages of \$2,299.99. Terms of the settlement were not disclosed.

Demurrers Overruled—A demurrer filed by the defendants in the suit of Harry S. Rogers vs. the Lake Shore Coach Co., Sandusky, and the Union Bus Station, Norwalk, was overruled. The action arose out of injuries the plaintiff allegedly received in a fall down the stairs at the station.

A demurrer to the petition of the plaintiff in the case of J. L. Leek, Monroeville, vs. the Interstate Motor Freight System, Cleveland, and Harry Braunhardt, rural Bellevue, was overruled.

Changes Plea—Thomas Grimm, held in the county jail since August 20 on a charge of assault and battery on the complaint of Harry McCullough, was taken to the

Ohio Power Adds New Unit To Plant At Pomeroy, Ohio

A fourth 185,000 HP electric generating unit, estimated to cost approximately \$18,000,000 has been authorized for installation at the new Phillip Sporn Plant now under construction on the Ohio River near Pomeroy, C. D. Albright, District Manager announced here recently.

The new power generating unit will bring the capacity of the Company's newest and largest plant to 550,000 KW. The ultimate capacity is expected to be 800,000 KW.

Owned jointly by The Ohio Power Company and the Appalachian Electric Power Company, the new four unit plant designed as the world's largest and most efficient of its type will cost approximately \$70,000,000 when completed in 1951. Company officials have announced. Construction was started in February, 1947 and the first generating unit is scheduled for operation July, 1949. Unit two is planned for 1950 with the third and fourth unit to be completed in 1951.

"Construction is progressing ahead on schedule," Mr. Albright said. "The power to be generated will benefit the entire Ohio Power Company System, which covers commercial, industrial and private residences in fifty-five Ohio Counties."

The Phillip Sporn Plant is part

of a \$35,000,000 post-war expansion program of The Ohio Power Company, started in 1947.

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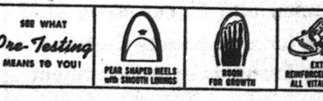

ORDINANCE No. 171
An Ordinance Fixing Compensation for Skilled, Semi-Skilled and Unskilled Labor Employed by the Village of Plymouth, O. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:
SECTION 1: The wages per hour for skilled labor employed by the Village of Plymouth, Ohio shall be \$1.50.
SECTION 2: The wages per hour for semi-skilled labor employed by the Village of Plymouth, Ohio shall be \$1.00.
SECTION 3: The wages per hour for unskilled labor employed by the Village of Plymouth, Ohio shall be 65c.
SECTION 4: This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall become effective September 16, 1948. The reason for such necessity is that the rates of pay herein provided are necessary to help maintain the public services provided by the Village of Plymouth, Ohio for the health, safety and general welfare of its citizens.

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
