JUMP GOES ON G.O.P. BALLOT

Jump will fill the ballot vacancy caused by the August 21st death of Joseph E. Hodges, Plymouth. Jump, who resides at 607 Myrtle-av, with his wife and three children, was graduated from Willard High School and Boston College. He has operated an insurance agency for several years. Appraisal of New Homes, Buildings, Improvements To Be Made In Huron Co.

Appraisals of new buildings and improvements including homes has been started on a county-wide basis under the direction of the Huron County Auditor's Office. This is not the much discussed general re-appraisal that the law requires every six years, but applies only to new buildings and improvements.

Very little had been done in the way of adding new buildings since the last re-appraisal in 1943, except on the part of a comparatively few property owners who conscientiously turned in valuations that were used in lieu of an appraisal.

The last appraisal was made by the Auditor's office, last year. With the accelerated building program taking place in every part of the County, a very unfair tax situation had developed, constituting a major problem, not only for the County, but every taxing and school district in the County.

Last September an appraising firm was engaged to handle an accumulated list of Commercial and industrial improvements valued in an increase of \$1,700,000 of valuation over the County. Holidays and other opportunities have been used to make appraisals at random and since the first of the year, a little headway could be made with this procedure with the backlog of several years' building. So now through cooperation of the County Commission, an appraising team of local men will appraise the County.

The team consists of two men: Burt P. Webster and David Welling, who have had experience in rural as well as urban building areas are studying appraisals.

While the County is charged with making appraisals, most of the receipts from increased valuation are returned to the taxing district to which they are contributed to the municipalities and townships to co-operate with the Auditor's office, in equalizing the tax burden.

Most of the larger communities already have their co-operation, as several months have been required to obtain information to appraise all buildings, rather than just those buildings which complied with the law, by properly informing the Auditor's office.

The appraisers are working from a list of the property owners, building permits and varied other reports. While few seem to be aware, the law requires a property owner making an improvement to erect a new building costing two hundred dollars or more, upon any home in the townships, villages or municipalities, not the system of building registration or inspection, shall inform the County Auditor, sixty days after building has been started.

The law requires the notice to be in writing, containing an estimate of the cost of building or improvement, and a description of the lot or land to properly identify it. When property owners fail to make the required report, the law requires upon its existence is discovered, that an appraisal be made, and a penalty of fifty percent added to each of the years since its erection.

KEYSTONE IS TITLE WINNER

VANDALIA, O.—John W. Sherk a ruddy-faced shorthooter from Vandalia, Pa. Saturday was receiving congratulations as America's top trapshoot artist. The 49-year-old Pennsylvania farmer won the title and \$3,000 in prize money by shattering 24 out of 25 targets in a special shoot-off Friday with Jimmy Rasmussen of Waukegan, Wis.

Attending before a crowd of 15,999 fellow riflemen, Schenk killed the 17-year-old Rasmussen in the regulation event, with 99 out of 100 bullets. Rasmussen scored 23-25 in the shoot-off.

Because the Auditor's office is of the opinion that Huron County people are not familiar with this law, no penalty will be assessed for the present. When the present listing of buildings is completed, the law will be advertised, for the guidance of all concerned. In the meantime every effort will be made to secure every new building and improvement and add it to the tax duplicate, in complete fairness to those whose buildings have been appraised.

It is estimated that the County will be covered by January 1st, or soon as possible after appraisals are completed property owners will be advised of their valuations. The 1941 standards are being used, the same that apply to buildings in existence at the last appraisal are being used.

PERSONAL TAX CAMPAIGNS RESUMED

E. A. Brown, personal tax representative of the Department of Taxation has returned to Huron County to resume the drive which was started last April, to cause all who should file returns, to make their returns.

Since the campaign started more than eighteen thousand dollars in back taxes has been brought into the County treasury, most of which will be distributed to the taxing district from which these payments originated. Due to varied reasons many did not file personal returns, many pleading ignorance.

Mr. Brown has handled each case with fairness and consideration, assessing only the minimum penalty, his principal purpose being to get the returns filed by everybody, rather than those who considered it their duty to file returns, and understood that a return was necessary.

About seven hundred have been interviewed, and another two hundred have failed to respond. Arrangements may be made to interview Mr. Brown in the evening, if necessary, as it is not his desire to have anyone make any sacrifice, or financial loss. Some cases have been handled in the mail.

As the Auditor's office is rushed, Mr. Brown will handle all the remaining interviews. He is at the Auditor's office from Monday noon to Friday noon.

THE WEATHER

The first three weeks of August, 1948 were cool and wet. Not until the 23rd did it really warm up, with five successive days in the 90's. The highest was 96 on the 27th; the lowest 46 on the 6th. The average temperature for the month was 70.3 or 0.9 of a degree below normal.

Rain fell on only six days for a total of 5.25 inches, an excess of 1.69 inches. However, of the total, practically all or 4.64 inches fell on three days—1.84 inches on the 4th and 5th and 2.80 inches on the 11th, causing flooded fields and highways.

No measurable rain fell during the last twelve days of the month which, together with the excessive heat made ideal weather for corn raising.

While the corn crop is not yet "made," barring early frosts it should be one of the biggest and best on record.

Where do Molotov and Stalin bring upon the German and Austrian people. It is also time that our Government call these gangsters' bluff. They were former pals of his. We have permitted them to insult us a thousand times more than take of pulling their chestnuts out of the fire. If we had had any sense, we would have let them fight it out among themselves. It is time that these Russian gangsters wake up, and realize the misery that the Hitler gang-

overdue. That persuasion will take more than empty words.

The boldness of these liquidators is undoubtedly due to the utterances of Wallace and his satellites. Stalin and Molotov, however, overestimate Wallace's importance. He does not represent America—his influence is nil. We know that ever since Henry shook the hand of the liquidator, Joe, he has been singing his praises and covering up his liquidations.

Greenwich Ram Day Success

Over fifty purebred Southdown and Shropshire rams were purchased by progressive sheep producers from Huron and Richland Counties, at the Second Annual Ram Day held at the Greenwich Lamb Pool Thursday, August 28. These yearling rams came from some of the outstanding purebred flocks in the state of Ohio.

In addition to the sale of the rams, an educational program was conducted under the direction of

John Bricker, Cleveland Livestock Producers Fieldman, and L. K. Bear, Extension Sheep Specialist. Mr. Bear pointed out some of the management practice necessary in getting the best results from a purebred sire on farm flocks. A DDT sheep spraying demonstration was conducted. This method is receiving wide approval, from sheep men in the area, for the control of ticks. Mr. Bear pointed out the importance of phenothiazine drench on lambs and ewes in the spring and fall of the year. He emphasized the timeliness of giving lambs a phenothiazine treatment for worms before they are grain fed for market.

Virgil Branigan, Sheep Salesman for the Cleveland Producers Livestock Association, explained the exhibit of lambs, resulting from a cross of western ewes and

Shropshire or Southdown rams. A very desirable market lamb results from this mating.

The following men on the Ram Committee were responsible for the Second Annual Ram Day: L. Faulkner, Chairman; Arthur Burdett and Lewis G. Heyman. The first Lamb Pool at the Greenwich Yards will be held on Thursday, September 9th. Farmers are encouraged to call the Extension Office, Norwalk 107, by Tuesday, September 7th, if they desire to have their lambs sorted before the day of the Pool. A copy of the Pool dates and other facts about the program may be secured at the County Extension Office, Court House, Norwalk. Cooperating groups in the Richland and Huron Co. Sheep and Lamb Improvement Program are Sheepmen of Huron and Richland Counties, the Agricultural

Extension Service and Producers Livestock Cooperative Association.

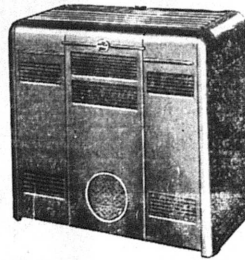

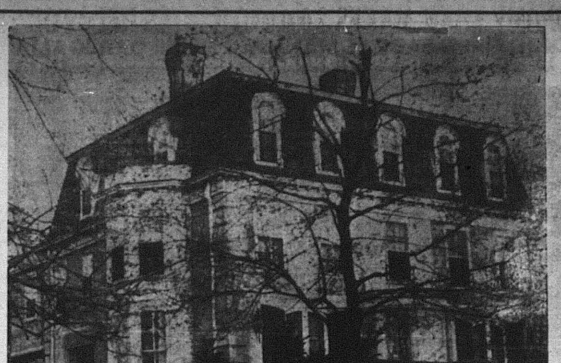

To Hold Plowing Match At Urbana

Attention, Mr. Farmer: Does your tractor stagger across the field, or can you plow a straight furrow? Regardless of whether you are a good plowman or a poor one, you will be interested in the State Conservation Field Days and Plowing Matches at Urbana, Ohio on September 8 and 9.

The farms selected for the farm machinery demonstration, the tilling, liming and farm pond construction, and the state plowing contests, are located just south of Urbana on State Route 54 in Champaign County.

Wednesday's program on September 8, starts at 9:30 a. m. and most of the day will be devoted to demonstrations of farm conservation practices for control of soil erosion and runoff waters. Trained men will explain the various details of these construction projects, the fertilizer test plots, the forage harvester demonstrations, and other events of interest to farm families.

On Thursday, September 9, the program of field demonstrations

will be expanded to include the official plowing matches for Ohio. Regulations are the same as those governing the National Plowing Matches and the winning farmer contestants in the level land and contour plowing contests at Urbana will be eligible to compete in the national matches. Entrants in the Urbana plowing contest are selected by the supervisors of the local Soil Conservation Districts in each of the ten competing areas within Ohio.
