Former Faculty Member Given 'Citizen Award'

Work with young people and establishing and carrying on the city youth recreation center was recognized when Sherman Moist, Willis High School teacher, was named Delaware county's All American honor citizen at "The Best is Yet to Come" stage show held Sept. 5th in Delaware, according to a front page story and picture in the Delaware Gazette.

Mr. Moist will be remembered as a former teacher in the local high school and oftentimes returns to Plymouth. He has been a teacher in the Willis high school for the past six years.

Moist was born in Toledo and spent his first year and a half there. His family then moved to Delaware. After going to grade school and high school there, he attended Ohio Wesleyan and was graduated in 1936. While attending Wesleyan he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa, Kappa Delta Pi, Alpha national fraternity for education, major and Pi Sigma Alpha, national political science honorary. After leaving Wesleyan

he attended the University of Michigan, receiving his master's degree there.

sites and places in and around Hollywood which attract the tourists who visit the West Coast. We found motor traffic very severe and hazardous, and all the "wreckers" one hears over the radio about Hollywood traffic are very true. We considered an airplane much safer. We covered a lot of territory Saturday afternoon and evening, and a few side trips in town Sunday morning. Knowing that Harvey Miller, brother of E. B. Miller, resided in Long Beach, we gave him a buzz Saturday night, and he came out to the airport Sunday morning to wish us bon voyage as we left.

At 11:00 o'clock. Checking weather and other flight information at the Municipal Port in Los Angeles, we were advised to fly out over the Pacific ocean so that we might gain altitude before crossing the mountains which lay just east of Los Angeles. The take-off was a beautiful one, and we headed the nose of the plane eastward our last glances of Los Angeles and the ocean just as we were winging as the ones we had experienced Friday evening.

On the return trip home our first stop was at Albuquerque, N. Mexico where we spent the night. We pulled down early due to wind and dust storms, and here we found accommodations unusually pleasant. We left Albuquerque early Monday morning, making a non-stop flight to Springfield, Mo., a distance of eight hundred miles in five hours and ten minutes. At Springfield we took on fuel, a few eats, and took off at 2:00 p. m. arriving over Plymouth at 6:15 p. m. Monday morning. On our return to the Willard port we had traveled a distance of 4,500 miles. Our average speed going out was better than 200 miles per hour, but headwinds on the return trip held us back. The average speed for the entire trip was 160 miles per hour. Our highest altitude was 12,000 feet, but in Texas and the mountainous sections, we kept between eight and ten thousand feet up. Our flight time was twenty-nine hours for the 4,500 mile trip.

Our plane was equipped with radio and we were able to check with various stations at all times concerning our flight and the weather. We depended upon the radio range stations, beams and maps for our tour, and we experienced no difficulty at any time during the entire trip. We found that the Westerners are more "air-minded" than we as individuals are in the midwest. Beautiful airports, with all facilities are established all along the route, and the service is complete in every way. In the various ports at which we landed, it was not an uncommon sight to see many privately owned planes come and go... people traveling from the West Coast to the East in their own plane. It was a trip we all enjoyed, and one that will be long remembered.

Mr. McQuate made several shots from the aid within camera, and he gathered in quite a selection of scenes which are interesting inasmuch as they were

taken from the air. Mr. Brumback, who went out to California, enjoyed the trip very much, even though it was her first time in a plane. Mr. and Mrs. Hessler have made numerous trips to Nebraska, but this is the first tour for a plane to the West Coast out of the Willard Port. The entire party experienced no fatigue or air sickness during the journey.

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ings in Congress

By Congressman Wm. Lomke

We are getting nearer to November 2nd. Reckless statements by politicians are becoming more frequent. The latest false alarm was sounded by Secretary of Agriculture, Mr. Brannan. In his speech in Minnesota on Labor Day he stated that if and when Dewey and Warren are elected, farm prices will be lowered.

The trouble with the Secretary's statement is that farm prices have recently been tumbling under the Truman administration. They have about touched the bottom they will be permitted to go under the support price ninety percent parity. The Republicans, aided by the Democrats, extended the support price for another year.

You may rest assured that under Dewey and Warren agricultural prices will be maintained at least as high as under Truman. It may even be that Dewey will have sufficient vision to help pass a cost of production bill— one hundred percent parity. He comes from an agricultural state, the same as Truman, and I am sure knows as much about agriculture as Truman does.

Again, there cannot be a drastic reduction in agricultural prices without a financial collapse—a national catastrophe. Under FDR's and Truman's Administration, our Nation has been plunged \$623,000,000 with future commitments, into the red. If we

are to meet these huge commitments and if we are to pay the interest on our national indebtedness, fair agricultural prices means to lower the national income and that means less taxes for the Government with which to meet its obligations.

The time has come that the American people stop following false alarms and false gods. The truth is that the farmer will never again submit to the conditions that he was forced to during the depression and recession. The Nation, with its huge indebtedness and commitments, cannot survive with the prices of 1932, 1937, 1938 or 1939. Congress will not and cannot crucify the farmer whether Dewey or Truman is elected.

In the meantime, there must be a change. We must again establish the Supreme Court and other Federal courts as an independent branch of our Government. We must have a change in order to get rid of the undesirable elements that infest some of the Departments of our Government. We may have to make another change in 1952, but the 1948 change is just eight years past due. It should have been made in 1940. Then the world in general would have been the gainer as well as the U. S. A.
