

PIRGIMS LOSE TO HURON 19-13

Though the Plymouth football team lost to Huron last Friday evening 19-13, the Pigmirs grid players a much improved game as they lost to the score. But the score does not tell the whole story.

Outside of the first few minutes of play in the opening quarter when the Huron eleven took the kickoff and marched right down the field for a touchdown, the Pigmirs ball club was in the improved team. After Huron took a 6-0 lead in the opening minutes of the game, the Pigmirs grid machine got down to work and struck pay dirt midway through the second quarter. They started their drive on their own 35 yard line and ended the 55 yard march on Des Donnewirth's 30 yards around end for the T. D. Donnewirth took a lateral from Ronald Trauger on the payoff line. Harvey Wilson attempted conversion was good and Plymouth led 7-6 as the first half ended.

There was about 5 minutes left in the final period before Des Donnewirth started to spot his Huron backfield a 10-7 lead over the Plymouth lads. Des his Hulbert Metcalf with a 30 yard pass good down to the Huron 10 yard line and then very much better than he did to Don Cunningham in the end zone. This time Wilson's placement was just wide of the goal posts. Time ran out over the Pigmirs' 10-13.

This Saturday afternoon the Plymouth boys will meet the Willard Reserves at the Mary Tate Park field. Let's turn out and root the boys home to their victory.

CYCERONANS HEAD MEETING

"My how times have changed!" While there is no longer any living charter member of the Old Ciceronian Debating Society, yet each year the community in the vicinity of Guinea Corners gather the last Sunday in September for their picnic to renew friendships and talk over old times. Approximately twenty were in attendance last Sunday for the dinner and program in charge of Mrs. Isaac DeWitt, Boughnouth, and Mrs. Will Hoyle and Mrs. Rolfe Zellner, both of Willard. The Zellner children furnished the music, and officers stated for 1949 include Mrs. Clarence Lewis, president; Mrs. E. J. Hutchinson, Willard, vice president and Mrs. Lloyd Zellner, secretary and treasurer.

Among the many changes noted is the means of transportation, the cost and mode of living and changes in entertainment diversions.

Yet there were some in the group Sunday who could recall the many facts of the society among them G. F. Sparks of Willard Route 2. An interesting conversationalist, Mr. Sparks was at that time the president of the Ciceronian Literary Society. "To the best of my knowledge," organized about 1870. Mr. Warren Severance, a former lawyer and now a Justice, now Willard, was at that time, living on a farm "now owned by Roland Cline" north of New Haven and was the owner of the Guinea Corners in the old school house that burned down and was replaced by the brick building that stands there now.

It was customary in those days for district schools, to hold a spelling bee, usually every two weeks on Friday night. After the spelling bee, the older scholars would hold a debate, the subject being something historical rather than political. It was at that time that Mr. Severance was teaching that this society was started.

The name Ciceronians was derived from an ancient philosopher named Cicero.

All original members of the society have passed on, the last surviving member being Mrs. Flora C. Brooks who passed away several years ago at Plymouth. O. The society has been carried on through the efforts of the children and friends of the old members. I will endeavor to give a list of the names of the original members, as I can recall them: F. J. Brooks, at one time clerk of the Greenwich Enterprise, he later died in Florida. J. Curtis, who went to Michigan and became a State Representative. Mr. Fred T. Clark, of near Plymouth, Mr. Catlin and Mr. Harry Sibbett of Delphi, Mr. Charles Palmer and Mrs. Nettie Case Cooper, who passed away of the Bang family, also Mrs. Della Loveland Youngs and Francis Clark Sparks, also Mrs. Eva Hough Barwell, Mr. Frank Smith, Mr. Martin Dennen, Mr. Clayton Schull, Mrs. Floyd Tucker, Mrs. Wesley Frank, Mrs. Clinton Cooper, Mrs. Bess Risk, and the honored guest Mrs. Vernon Tucker all of Shelby.

LOCAL DEALERS BUY FINE STEER

At an auction held at the Wooster Fair a week ago last Friday, Sept. 17th, Wayne County Four-H and FFA Club boys and girls sold one hundred and forty high quality cattle which brought top prices. Dave and Bob Bachrach purchased one steer which won fourth place in the 4-H display and first place in the FFA showing. They paid 43c per pound for the steer weighing 770 pounds. The cattle were sold last Spring to the farm boys and girls clubs by Bachrach Co. of Plymouth, and at that time the average weight was 550-600 pounds. It is estimated that the steer purchased at the sale by Bachrach Co. is an average of 2 1/2 pounds per year.

The cattle display at the Wooster Fair this year was one of the best exhibits in years, and it is very evident that the club boys and girls are showing much interest in better breeds of livestock.

Many farmers in Ohio, Michigan, Pennsylvania and New York State are placing orders with this firm for direct contact with western markets, and as the cattle are shipped into Plymouth, buyers from many sections come to look them over. The week seven carloads were received by Bachrach Co. and orders are coming in daily for feeder cattle.

The name of Bachrach has been associated with the buying and selling of cattle in Plymouth for more than twenty years. Dave and Bob Bachrach are carrying on the tradition of the business as did their grandfathers sixty years ago.

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INSTALLS NEW CREAM FREEZER

Installation of a new Mills Master Freezer has been completed at the Black & Gold this week, and is already in operation. The new machine is of the latest automatic-type for making home-made ice cream, frozen custard and sherberts.

The machine, with a mixing unit at the end, is finished in white enamel, with a series of storage cabinets, with a capacity of seventy-five gallons. The motor is a 1/2 horsepower and is mounted in the basement of the building, with the operating unit on the main floor. The machine is entirely automatic, even to washing and cleaning all working parts after use.

It is entirely automatic in operation. The machine has been placed in the container. It requires but six minutes to make five gallons of cream, and the hardening or setting time has been reduced from 20 to eight hours.

ORDINANCE NO. 172
AN ORDINANCE LEVYING AN
ADMISSION TAX AGAINST
PERSONS, INDIVIDUALS,
PARTNERSHIPS, ASSOCIATIONS
AND COMPANIES;
PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR
THE VIOLATION THEREOF
AND DECLARING AN EMER-
GENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE
OF PLYMOUTH, STATE OF
OHIO:

Section 1. For the purpose of providing revenue for the General Fund of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, there is hereby levied against persons, individuals, partnerships, associations and corporations:

(1) A tax of three per centum of the amounts received for admission to any place, including admissions by season ticket or subscription, if such place is within the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, O. Provided however, that the activities in, on or about the Public Schools under the direction of the Board of Education, be exempt.

(2) A tax of three per centum on the amount received for admission to any public performance for profit at any cabaret or other similar entertainment in case the charge for admission is in the form of a service charge, or cover charge, or other similar charge, and such place of entertainment be within the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

Section 2. Every person, individual, partnership, association or corporation receiving any payments for admission, taxable under this ordinance, shall on or before the last day of each calendar month make a return, under oath to the Clerk of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, showing the number of taxable admissions collected during the preceding calendar month. Each payor

making such return shall at the time of making the same pay the amount of taxes shown thereon to the Clerk of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and if the tax imposed by this ordinance is not paid when due, there shall be added as a part of the tax interest at the rate of one per centum a month from the date when the tax became due until paid.

Section 3. On and after October 1, 1948, it shall be unlawful for any person, individual, partnership, association or corporation to continue to conduct any amusement or any temporary place of amusement without a license therefor, as hereinafter provided.

Every person, individual, partnership, association, or corporation desiring to continue to conduct or hereafter to begin to conduct any amusement or any permanent or temporary place of amusement or any itinerant form of amusement, shall file an application for a permanent, temporary or itinerant form of amusement license with the Clerk of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

Upon the finding by the Clerk that the application is in proper form, the said Village Clerk shall forthwith issue such license or licenses, upon the payment by the applicant of the fee of One Dollar (\$1.00). An amusement license shall be valid only for the person, individual, partnership, association or corporation in whose name it is issued and for the conduct of amusements at a place designated therein; it shall not be assignable; it shall be conspicuously displayed at the place or places for which issued during the period of ticket sale and conduct of amusement. All licenses for permanent places of amusement shall expire on the thirty-first day of December next following the date upon which they are issued. Licenses for temporary place of amusement or for forms of itinerant amusement shall expire at the time specified therein. Licenses issued for permanent place of amusement under the provisions of this ordinance may be renewed annually before the first day of January upon application made to the Village Clerk and the payment of a renewal fee of One Dollar (\$1.00).

Section 4. Whoever continues to conduct or begins to conduct any form of amusement at a permanent or temporary place of amusement or any itinerant form of amusement, within the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, without having a license therefor, as provided in this Ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) or more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), and each day of such violation may be deemed a separate offense.

Section 5. Whoever being a person charged by this ordinance with the duty of collecting, or paying the taxes imposed by this ordinance willfully fails or refuses to charge and collect or to pay such taxes, or to make return to said Village Clerk as required by this ordinance or to permit any authorized agent of the Council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, to examine his books and other records, in or upon the premises

where the same are kept, to the extent necessary to verify any return made or to ascertain and assess the tax imposed by this ordinance if no return is made, or to maintain and keep for one year or such lesser or greater time as may be permitted or required by said Village Council, such records, tickets, stubs and other documents pertaining to the sale or other disposition of admissions as may be required by the Village Council, shall be deemed to have committed a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), and upon conviction for a second or other subsequent offense shall be fined not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).

Section 6. The moneys received by said Village Clerk under the provisions of this ordinance shall be credited to the General Fund of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

Section 7. The Village Council shall, so far as not to be inconsistent with this ordinance, have

the right to prescribe rules and regulations for the administration of this Ordinance, including the right to revoke or suspend licenses.

Section 8. The license required herein shall be in addition to any and all licenses otherwise required by law.

Section 9. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall become effective October 1, 1948. The reason for such necessity is that this revenue is needed to help maintain the police and fire departments for the health and safety and general welfare of the citizens of said Village of Plymouth, Ohio.
