Asks Bad Be Ousted

A petition filed last week-end in Richmond County Common Pleas Court by Jesse E. LaDow, representing a group of lot-owners in Greenlawn cemetery asked that the present cemetery board be removed and that the court authorize the creation of a new committee to be appointed by Mayor Robinson.

Jesse E. LaDow, representing the lot-owners, filed the action against J. W. McIntire, one of the trustees, who has been a member of the cemetery board here for the past fifteen years.

The petition states that the lot-owners have failed to maintain the cemetery property and perform the duties for which they are responsible. The board of trustees was first established in 1933 and members were appointed by the mayor to serve without compensation. In 1933 the board was placed under a new status with compensation awarded.

Some years ago LaDow donated to the village a six-acre tract of land which lies on the south side of the cemetery, with stipulations that certain improvements were to be made. The petition filed last week by LaDow is a result of the inactivity of the board to perform its part of the contract. One of the improvements was a new entrance into Greenlawn which so far has not materialized.

In an interview Wednesday, McIntire states that he's not worrying about the outcome of the action taken by LaDow. He stated that the board has done a good job at the cemetery and whatever answer may be made will probably be handled by the village solicitor Joseph Dush.

Miles Christian and Chas. Look-aberg are the other two members of the cemetery board.

Mayor's Court

Five violators were fined in Mayor Robinson's court the past week for speeding through the school zone.

J. W. Lumbert of Mansfield, driving a new Mercury was hailed by Officer Meiser Wednesday noon, who charged him with traveling at sixty miles per hour through the zone. Officer Meiser had to trail Lumbert three miles to New Haven before he was overtaken. Lumbert was fined \$5 and costs, making a total of \$11.60.

Others who were fined in mayor's court for the same offense included James Jacobs, \$10 and costs; Lester O. Goodwin, \$10 and costs. This was Goodwin's second offense; Raymond Rachel, Mansfield, \$10 and costs; Margaret Green, Willard, \$10 and costs.

While the school zone may not be marked as plainly as it could be or according to state regulations, Mayor Robinson states that he is on duty at the school only at the opening and closing of the school and at noon, and that motorists can see the children if they drive through the zone.

A flat rate is charged for all airmail post weighing more than eight ounces and up to one pound. This flat rate varies according to zones. It is 55 cents for zones one and two, 60 cents for zones three, 65 cents for zones four, 70 cents for zones five, 75 cents for zones six and seven, and 80 cents for zone eight.

Four cents is charged for each additional pound and cents for each post in zones one and two, eight cents for each additional pound in zone three, 14 cents per additional pound in zone four, 24 cents for each additional pound in zone five, 33 cents for each additional pound in zone six, 45 cents per additional pound in zone seven, and 55 cents for each additional pound in zone eight.

A new schedule of regular parcel post rates also has been set up. Detailed information on the change in rates may be obtained from the post office.

Examiners To Aid Vendors With Returns

Sales Tax reports for the last six months of 1948 are now due and must be filed with the state treasurer by January 31. Even if no sales were made during the period, they must be filed regardless.

In filling their reports vendors must submit a copy of their previous semi-annual report and a record of tax stamps purchased for the last half of 1948. They also ask that vendors come prepared to give answers to the questions as they appear on the report.

To assist local vendors, an examiner will be at the Peoples National Bank on January 29th from 1 to 3 p. m.

1948 BIRTH AND DEATH REPORT

The birth and death report of the village of Plymouth, for the year 1948, shows an outstanding record in births, as compared to other years.

There were sixty-six birth certificates, twenty-four boys and twenty-eight girls in the village and fourteen in the rural district; ten boys and four girls.

In 1947 there were forty-nine birth certificates showing an increase of seventeen births.

Death of Plymouth residents, were twenty-five, fourteen men, nine women and two infants, and in Plymouth rural five men.

Burials in Greenlawn cemetery were forty-three, nineteen being residents of Plymouth, twenty-five were bodies brought to Plymouth for burial and thirteen were taken from Plymouth for burial. The 1947 record of deaths was twenty-four.

This is the procedure in practically every state legislature. Why should it not be the procedure in the lower House of Congress. There can be no valid argument against that procedure. If that were done, Members of Congress could not dodge issues and would have to vote for or against bills, and the electors would know just what their Member stood for.

Our Democratic friends the other day, with the help of forty-nine Republicans, made some improvement—not much, just a toothhold. Remember it was the great liberal—President Roosevelt, that changed the rules so as to make it virtually impossible for any Member to bring up a bill, no matter how meritorious, for disposition on the floor. At that time there weren't enough Republicans to fear. The truth is that he did not trust the members of his own party.

The first day that he went into office, March 4, 1933, his chairman of the Rules Committee moved that the rules of the 73rd Congress be made the rules of procedure of the 74th Congress with one amendment. That amendment was to change the number of signatures to be placed on a petition at the Speaker's desk to discharge a committee, and bring the bill up for consideration, from 145 to 218. Hoover was satisfied with 145. Franklin hog-tied his party with 218.

All we did the other day was to liberalize just a little the boss rules adopted by order of Franklin D. when he first became President. Now it is possible, but not very probable that a legisla-

ive committee may get a bill up for consideration, after a great deal of red tape, without the blessings of the Rules Committee. Yet, because of the red tape, I doubt very much whether any committee, if there is a coalition of the conservatives on both sides of the aisle, can get a bill up without the okay of the Rules Committee.

Let us not fool ourselves. Let us not kid the public. The change so loudly proclaimed and blazoned on the front pages of newspapers amounts to very little. Let us demand a complete, intelligent revision of the rules of procedure so that any Member may, after a bill has been in committee for a reasonable time, move to discharge the committee

Of that number, 5,049 were army veterans who received a total of \$1,585,776 and 2,004 navy claims for \$567,689.94.

Throughout the state an average of \$310 has been paid to 28,299 living veterans and an average of \$383 paid per veteran to the next of kin of 7,315 deceased Ohio veterans in approx-

imately eight months, for a total of \$19,435,976 since April 22, 1948, to January 1st.
