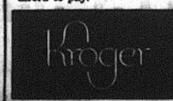

Hunting and
Trapping Laws
Are Set

The Ohio Wildlife council last week officially approved all hunting and trapping regulations for the 1949 season as set tentatively at the August meeting.

Hunters who have had fewer hunting hours in the field, and other drastic restrictions imposed on them because of the game shortage during the past several years will welcome the liberalized laws going shooting.

Daily hunting hours will be from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., replacing the 9 to 4 hours of the last two years for rabbit, pheasant and grouse shooting.

The rabbit season opens on Nov. 15 and continues through Dec. 26 with a daily limit of 4 and possession limit 4. The pheasant season opens Nov. 15 and continues thru Nov. 25. Daily limit will be two cock birds and possession limit 2. For grouse, the season will be from Nov. 15 through Nov. 30, bag and possession limits the same as for pheasants.

The inland trapping season will be from Nov. 15 through Jan. 15 and for the Lake Erie Trapping District, Nov. 15 through Mar. 15.

Skunk was returned to open-season status following two years of protection.

The bag and possession limit on raccoon hunted by dog and gun is changed from 2 raccoons per hunter to 2 for each hunter.

Hunting and trapping law digests, normally available with the purchase of new licenses which became effective Sept. 1, will be available around Oct. 1. The printing of the digests was delayed until the laws could be officially set following the completion of nesting and population surveys, on which laws are based.

The 1949 squirrel season which opened on Sept. 15 continues thru Sept. 30. Daily bag limit is 4 and possession limit 4; hunting hours are from daylight to dark.
