

Votes To Decide State And Local Issues Nov. 8

Voters in the state and in Plymouth will have some vital issues before them on Tuesday, November 8th. There are two outstanding issues within the state — the question of making oleo yellow instead of white, and a change in our present balloting system.

Oleo-Butter Clash
For the past two years the oleo and dairy interests of the state have been contending, and as a final result the issue comes before the voters in November. The oleo interests point out that butter is only a small part of Ohio's agricultural and cash income. It is claimed that only 1.4 per cent is realized from the sale of butter and butterfat during the year of 1948. It is pointed out that Ohio is the fourth ranking soybean producing state, and that 52,000 Ohio farmers produced soybeans for harvest, or over 13,000 more farms that sold butterfat.

The dairy interests claim that should oleo be voted that it will reach the price of butter and that it will be offered to the public at a lower price. There are arguments for and against the coloring of oleo, but it is one that the people of the state will have to decide.

New Ballot Offered
The present party column ballot used in Ohio lists all party candidates under a party emblem so that a single "X" at the top of the column can mean a vote for all candidates of a party.

In the Massachusetts ballot, the candidates are listed under the headings of office they seek, with their party affiliation listed after their name. Thus a separate mark is required for each candidate for whom a voter wishes to cast a ballot. The Massachusetts type of ballot would discourage straight ticket voting as well as prevent a non-qualified candidate from riding into office on the coat tails of a strong candidate at the head of the party ticket. This is the only change over the present balloting system.

School Ask Levy
An \$18,000 bond issue will come before the Plymouth village school district voters on Tuesday, Nov. 8. The money is to be used for the completion and equipping of the new elementary school building which was opened this fall. The funds are to run for a period of six years. The cost to the taxpayer will be 10c on each one hundred dollar evaluation.

This extra money is badly needed to finish up the work at the new school, and is being given support by the P. T. A. association, the Mothers Club, and many interested school parents.

"There was a lane next west of the doctor's office; and next was a two story frame house, set near to the street and on a low foundation. Financial Statement Of School Costs Given

On Tuesday, November 8th, the voters of Plymouth school will decide whether or not the proposed one mill levy will carry this enabling the board of education to pay off the outstanding obligations on the new elementary school building and other expenditures incurred since the passing of the 1948 bond issue \$48,000.00.

This one mill levy will amount to approximately \$18,000 and will be used in addition to paying off the debts against the grade school, to erect a bus shed, re-floor the gym floor at the high school, build permanent partitions in the high school annex, reconstruct the shower room at the high school, establish a music room and woodworking and drafting shop, also at the high school and the purchase of new seats, (not teacher's desks, etc.) for the elementary school children. All of these improvements were on the program when the 1948 bond issue was floated but because of unforeseen expenditures have been left undone.

According to Architect Marr the total cost of the new grade school building is \$129,048.04, while the repairs to the heating equipment at the high school amount to \$11,578.85; fees of \$8,433.96, making a grand total of \$148,999.95.

In checking over the bond issues, the 1947 issue called for \$47,500.00, the 1947 issue \$50,000 and the 1948 issue \$48,000. After building the annex at the high school and the additional heating equipment necessary, a balance of \$32,499.95 was left from the 1947 issue; added to the 1947 and 1948 bond issues, the total on hand was \$127,499.95. Even with the proposed \$18,000 levy, it is noted that the entire amount is \$145,499.95 or approximately \$3,500 less than amount expended, which was \$148,999.95. This amount (\$3,500) is to be made up from the unexpended emergency fund which is part of the general fund.

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TWO SUGGESTIONS FOR COUNCIL

There are two things which council should act upon at their first regular meeting in November. The first and important is the compiling a list of homes, occupants, and street numbers. While the survey and renumbering of the village has been made and accepted by the council, yet, if we are to use the new numbers for the homes in Plymouth, where are we to secure them?

Every month hundreds of statements are mailed out locally, and if the new numbering system is to be adopted at the post office here, there no doubt will be some complexes. However, we believe local businessmen will be more than glad to cooperate in seeing that the new numbers are properly used if they can secure a complete listing.

We believe that it is up to council to compile an official village directory if the purpose of the survey and renumbering is to be fully realized.

The second suggestion is one which has caused much confusion the past few months. It's the location of the bus station and where the busses now stop. On various occasions passengers have purchased tickets, and remain at the bus station. The bus arrives, but it doesn't stop at the station, but down the street almost in front of the Methodist church . . . a half block away. The village council knows the circumstances, and the local agents and bus company know that the set-up is unfair.

Time required to discharge and load passengers takes an average of 45 seconds, mostly 10 seconds. By letting the busses stop in front of the bus station will prove a lot more convenient and save a lot of "misses" for the passengers. Surely, a bus wouldn't hold up traffic by double-parking any longer than some of the big trucks that occupy the highway for ten times the length of time. Let's do something about it.

PHONE RATES AND EXTENSIONS

According to a recent news story New Washington may get free phone service into Bucyrus. The negotiation for increased rates and the extension of New Washington's service may well be applied to Plymouth.

The local telephone office has given Plymouth subscribers a splendid service. It has been many years since the Northern Ohio Telephone Company has had a staff of pleasant, congenial and efficient operators, as are now at the switchboards, and patrons here have made many open expressions of the improved service. Like all utilities phone companies have experienced unusually high raises in materials, labor and equipment, and it is only fair to expect an increase in rates. However, if the new rates which are to be invoked are considered by patrons as being exorbitantly high, then the phone company could offset some of the increase by giving a free service to Willard, Shelby or Mansfield.

No utility can continue to keep its equipment modern and efficient without earning a profit, and with high taxes placed on corporations, it is doubly hard to build a reserve for necessary improvements. Whatever rate structure the phone company may apply to Plymouth we feel certain that it will be reasonable and fair.

WHERE WILL TAXES END?

The headlines over the week-end flared that President Truman will ask for more dollars through taxation in January, 1950.

Reports coming out of Washington Saturday state that the U. S. payrolls will reach its biggest postwar raise. The fifty-one billion dollars voted by Congress will spur the hiring of 75,000 workers. This will constitute the greatest peace time ballooning of federal payrolls since 1935 when Roosevelt added 135,000 to the government payroll. Workers will be hired at the rate of 300 a day which will cancel out most of the economy gains achieved by Secretary of Defense Louis A. Johnson, who removed 135,000 defense workers from the payroll last August.

The story goes on to say that "the largest chunk of new workers will be flung into 'MAP' the organization created to ship one billion, three hundred million dollars worth of United States arms into countries of Western Europe, and other nations aligned against communism." This looks like another war.

Tax evaders are going to cost the government. Four thousand new agents will be placed on the payroll to investigate income tax reports. The great farm production year will force the Commodity Credit Corp. to add about 1,000 workers to handle price controls and the storage program.

Finding NEW taxes should be about ten times as hard as it is to find a way to spend the money. If and when the American people ever become interested in taxation and representation they can do something about it. If and when the American people become tired of dictating labor leaders and strikes, they can do something about it. Until the American people take an interest in their tax dollar and the way it is spent, present conditions will continue . . . and today, more than ever before, we are literally sitting on a powder keg.

Explain New Unemployment Law Changes

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Oct. 21—Bureau of Unemployment Compensation Administrator Frank J. Collopy today moved to clarify some of the issues raised by the dependency allowance clause of the newly amended Unemployment Compensation Law.

Under the law, amendments to which went into effect on August 22 and Oct. 18 respectively, dependency allowances are provided for workers eligible for unemployment benefits if they have either one or two dependent children under the age of 18. Here are some of the crucial points relative to dependency allowances as set forth by the administrator:

1. The amended law provides for a weekly dependency allowance of \$2.50 for each dependent child below 18. The maximum weekly dependency allowance is \$5.00 in that no individual can collect such allowances for more than two children. In short, a worker who has three dependent children under eighteen and who is eligible for unemployment benefits can collect dependency allowances for only two of his children—a total of \$5.00.

2. A worker is eligible for dependency allowances if he has dependent children only if he is also eligible for unemployment benefits. Eligibility for unemployment benefits is the first prerequisite to eligibility for dependency allowances.

3. Dependency allowances are paid in addition to the basic unemployment benefit amount for which a worker is eligible. A worker legally eligible to collect a weekly benefit amount of \$20 and who also had two dependent children below 18 may be eligible for a total of \$25 a week. (\$20 plus \$5.)

4. A worker filing an application for unemployment should make it a point to indicate whether or not he has dependent children at the time of the original filing.

5. If both a husband and wife—who have dependent children—qualify for benefits at the same time, only one of them is entitled to dependency allowances.

6. Under the amended law, a dependent child is any child or stepchild of the benefit applicant . . . who, at the time of the filing of the original application for benefits, is under eighteen years of age and is being wholly or chiefly supported by such applicant.

Boys' State To Be Held At Camp Perry

Buckeye Boys' State, the annual self-government school operated by the American Legion of Ohio, will be held in 1950 at Camp Perry on Lake Erie, it was announced at State Legion headquarters in Columbus.

The dates will be June 10-20 and the tuition fee per boy sponsored by local posts and co-sponsoring groups will remain at \$30.

W. L. DeWeese of the Legion staff, who is dean of Boys' State, said the 14th school will be the first at a northern Ohio site. It was held the past three years at Ohio Wesleyan University, Delaware, and previously was located at Miami University, Otterbein College, Ohio Wesleyan, and the state fairgrounds in Columbus.

While previous "states" were limited in size by the accommodations, the one at Camp Perry may for the first time pass the 1000 mark in enrollment, provided the Legion can secure enough qualified help for instruction and supervision, DeWeese said. More than 9000 high school juniors, selected on their leadership ability and

grades, have attended the thirteen schools held to date. Decision to move Boys' State to Camp Perry was made by the commission in charge at a meeting held at Sandusky and the camp. It followed conferences with Maj. Gen. Leo M. Kreber, state adjutant general, and a survey of facilities by DeWeese and W. S. Knoll of Columbus, known as the "father" of BBS in Ohio.

Robert R. Bingham of Wilmington, representative of the Ohio Manufacturers Association and former state finance director, was re-elected president of the commission. James V. Sahr, Cleveland attorney and former state Legion commander, was renamed vice president.

General Kreber told the Legionnaires it is the desire of his office that Camp Perry, which normally is used only by the Ohio National Guard, become more useful to all the citizens of Ohio.

'break it' for home alone.
'I don't remember that we called that bell the 'curfew' but that is what it was. I think the Hildreys must have been in Cincinnati.

'Next (west, we are moving up from the alley toward the present Lutheran parsonage) was the home of John Culp, a newer and better built house than a majority of the others. It was white and had green blinds. The front line of this lot was 20 feet or more to the north of the front line of the lots, or house fronts just described (The Hildreys, Rogers and Barkers); these latter were on the south side of the Square, while the Culp lot and the High School lot across the road, formed the west boundary of the Square.

'Mr. Culp's father was a farmer living to the northeast (I think) of the town. There were brothers and one sister that I know of. I remember the name of only one brother, and that was Isaac; he married Katy Jane Bodley; he died about the time we went to Plymouth. The sister was Polly and she married a Mr. Sherman.

'John Culp married a Miss Taylor, her intimate friend called her 'Kath'. There were three boys, Ed, Charlie and 'Ikey'. The last died years ago; Ed served with distinction in the Civil War (25th O. V. I.). He died a number of years ago; his widow, Lucy Preston Culp is still living in Kansas City. I believe Charlie is living there also. (Remember this was written many years ago.)

'I do not know what business John Culp was in, but in the back of my head is a firm name 'Culp sheep' or 'Culp', that would indicate Dry Goods.

'Across the road or street was the High School, or more exactly—the Public School building.

Dancing Lessons
Next east of the 2-story frame school house, was a lot with a barn at the back end. Next was a two-story house, become wood colored because long without paint. Here lived a family in memory lived a widowed woman Dubois. She gave dancing lessons. I think mother wanted to send my sister and me to her; but father still retained some of his Methodist bringing up and wouldn't let us go.

'After Mrs. Dubois went away the house was occupied by a Mr. Vinson, a gravestone cutter, whose wife was the barn above spoken of and whose material, finished and unfinished stone, lay scattered about the lot next to the school lot. There were children, but I remember but one a boy of my age named Le or Levi, a grandfather. I have been told, of Harley Vinson of Norwalk.

'Next east, on the north side of the Square was a small old house, touching the street line; this is all I remember about it.

'Next was the home of Dr. Roeliff Bevier. (This is the residence of Elmer Mackley.) This house was something like John Culp's; it stood a little back from the street, had a front fence and gate and the ground it stood on was a little higher than the street, because I fancy—the natural knoll had never been cut down to street level. Inasmuch as General Brinkerhoff of Mansfield had for his first name 'Roeliff,' I am inclined to think Dr. Bevier's mother was related to the General. The Doctor's family was like a good many in Plymouth, genteel and refined, consisting of his wife, and three daughters—Jennie, Ione and Lucy. The first married a Mr. Brown of Toledo; Breckenridge; the third—Fred Kirland.

'Mrs. Breckenridge died a good many years ago; also did their son Roeliff Breckenridge, an exceptionally fine scholar. Their daughter Mabel married Charles Wasson of Cleveland.

'Running north of the Square,

next the east line of Dr. Bevier's place, was a lane; which I don't think maybe only to the doctor's barn. (This alleyway is still in use today.)

'Next was a two story house; seems to me it was painted a dingy yellow and had green blinds. This, too, stood on a knoll higher than the street. (This is where our Lawyers, Donald Akers, lives now.) In my memory it stood higher than Dr. Bevier's house because of a higher foundation; anyhow it seems to me there was quite a height of steps to the front door.

'Here lived the widow Carpenter; and she had a daughter Eliza. I think she had another daughter who was the wife of the Merchant Powers.

'Next east was a jewelry store; jumbled in my memory of proprietor's three names, Hornbrook, Cuykendall and Kaufman; a better memory than mine must decide who was the jeweler. (We believe it was Hoffman.)

'Next was a Drygoods store of one Burgoyne (the town dubbed him 'General'). This is where I think John Culp was a partner.

'Next and on the north-west corner of the Square, was a tin store. The name associated in my mind with this store as proprietor is 'Seymour'; and associated with 'Seymour' are the names Adams and Breckenridge. And further there is a faint memory that a Jane Seymour married a Breckenridge. Also so it seems to me that there was a Nancy Adams or a Nancy Seymour.

'Across the road (this would be east from the present location of the People's National Bank, and probably about where the traffic lane turns to go into Sandusky St.) in the northeast corner of the Square, was a Drygoods store kept by a Mr. Altono Powers, whose wife I think was a daughter of the aforesaid widow Carpenter, and whose home was back—that is to the north of Seymour's tin store. (North of the present Bank.)

'I think there were two children, a boy and a girl. The boy I knew in later years. He was a 'lightening Calculator'. His abilities carried him up to good positions. He finally became manager and I think a partner in the Wm. Taylor and Son Co. of Cleveland and was there as long as he remained in business.

'Next east, somewhere about the year 1850 was the first store for ready made shoes our folks had seen, or at least had patronized. It was owned by William Culp, but for his advent our boots and shoes were made by the village shoemaker.

'Next was the grocery store and bakery of Mr. and Mrs. Webster. I guess they made everything; their bakery except their crackers; these were made in Mansfield. They served oyster stew and—in the summer, ice cream in their front room upstairs. Ice cream in those days was frozen custard.

'Next was a good sized store—I don't recall what it seems to me was a hardware. The store, beyond, a lane (this might be the present alleyway between Brown & Miller's Hardware and Koser's Bakery) we'll say a hut, belonging to Aunt Rhoda's, was a store and one room with, maybe, a lean-to back of it. That is about the time I first heard of the song 'Go tell Aunt Rhoda, Go tell Aunt Rhoda, Go tell Aunt Rhoda, Her old gray goose is dead!'

'Whether or not she was the 'Aunt Rhoda' of the song I do not know, but that was the town name for her.

Schwartzkopf, Mrs. Mary Flockner all of Mansfield, Mrs. Jerry Roth of Shelby, one brother, George A. Lacer, of Mansfield, also five grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Services were held at McQuate Funeral home, Tuesday afternoon. Rev. Harlan J. Miller, officiating. Interment was made in Oakland cemetery, Shelby.

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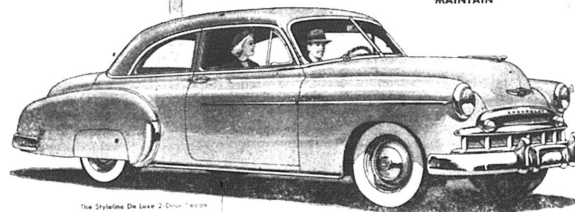
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
