

THE PLYMOUTH STORY

English Tea Adopted; Contentment For All

Editor's Note: This is the final installment of the Plymouth story written by Charlotte Wooster Boardman. We have had many comments on same and hope that our readers have enjoyed the early history and families of this area.

"Of the Baughmans I knew only Delia. He was about my age. 12 years. Two little girls - self appointed dictators of our crowd - picked out the two boys they wanted for their beaux, and then distributed the rest among the rest of the girls. Del was assigned to me. We both accepted the comments without comment; he went home with me from parties, neither of us saying a word as we walked. He on the extreme outer edge of the pavement I close to the fence. He took me as far as our front gate, I ran like a white-head for home. Years ago, I heard that, now, I can't find him in Michigan, Mr. Baughman, or Delia, or both, had acquired fortune or political fame or both.

"Plymouth folks were comfortable; and the houses were furnished comfortably. Most all the rooms were carpeted, but most of the carpets were made of straw. We had feather beds and ticks stuffed with straw, the straw frequently changed; seldom did we have blankets, there were always plenty of home-made coverables and elaborate quilts. The feather beds were on top in winter, the ticks of straw on top in the summer.

"Our carpets were laid over straw for cleanliness and comfort; the dust sifted away from the carpet and went down under the straw.

"Our food was as good as any in the land and there were never better cooks than our mothers. For breakfast there was fried pork, meat of some kind, sometimes beefsteak, sometimes ham and eggs; at others salt pork, fried and thin, with fat, cream gravy was made; at others, dried beef cooked in coffee, and once in a while salt-mackerel. All this was varied at times during the summer with wheat or corn meal pancakes.

"In the winter the crock of buckwheat batter was never empty and there were all winter long, buckwheat cakes and sausage and sausage gravy.

"I had not become acquainted with oat meal or any other cereal. Neither did I know anything about bacon. We put down in brine our own salt pork and corn beef and 'tried out' our own lard. Ah, those were 'smelly' days! Our kettles were made of iron, and our smoke houses or in the smoke houses of farmers with whom we traded; and either we or those farmers made our sausages. And I can see in some of those hams of beef in the process of drying; they were hanging from the beams overhead.

"English Tea Is Now Supper. Our dinners were in two courses; meat and potato and another vegetable; then pie or pudding. I suppose we got the model from our New England ancestor judging from an article I once read called 'The New England Tea.' This reminds me - we did not call our evening meal 'supper' but 'tea.' 'Stay to tea' was a phrase they used. It consisted of dried beef or cheese, dried apple or dried peach sauce, bread and butter or on baking day 'raisin' biscuit or if the bread gave out, there was a cake we had soda biscuit. Baking powder had not yet arrived. And then the meal would end with cake (and tea which was always dry) for the rest of day.

"But when we had invited company to tea there was nothing dry. There was nice cold meat of some kind, preserves and pickles of several kinds, biscuits and one knows how many kinds of cake; probably every kind the hostess knew how to make. In season they were brought in from the berries from our own gardens and peaches from our own trees.

"Our houses were warmed by, and our food cooked on, wood burning stoves; there was a fire in nearly every room; our home builders in those days did not economize on chimneys as they do now. I think wood was about \$2.50 cord.

Valuations Of County Real Estate Is Up

Real estate valuations in Huron County have risen more than \$4,000,000 the past 12 months, mainly through the construction of new buildings and improvements of existing properties, it was announced recently by Bernard F. Keane, county auditor.

The new valuations will be reflected in the tax duplicates which will be mailed to affected property owners after the first of the year. Tax Rate Change.

Despite new levies and bond issues voted by various municipalities in the county, the over-all tax rate will be reduced from 24.5 mills to 23.8 mills, Mr. Keane stated. The reduction now merely awaits the approval by the Board of Tax Appeals. The rates due to the expiration of the county five-mill TB levy and the upward revision of rates due to new buildings and improvements, have been reduced in 34 of the 59 districts, Mr. Keane added.

Re-Appraisal Continues. Although winter weather will slow down the continuous county re-appraisal program, Mr. Keane stated it would continue through the winter months whenever possible.

BEGIN CATTLE T-B TESTING IN RICHLAND

County-wide tubercular cattle testing among breeding stock will get under way possibly today, Thursday, Dec. 1, County Agent C. A. McGraw announced. This is the regular three-year cycle of testing of 'all breeding stock, both dairy and beef cattle, over five or older. The program is paid for out of an appropriation by the county commissioners. Cattle owners are to be notified by a helper of the veterinarian a day or two before the testing. After they have been notified, owners are asked to co-operate by having their cattle penned up for the testing.

Township Gets Transfer OK

A \$4,000 transfer of funds in Plymouth township has been approved by the Ohio State board of tax appeals Howard Wenning, Richland county clerk of courts, reported yesterday.

The transfer was made from the township's general fund to its road and bridge fund at the request of S. H. Cashman, Village and Floyd E. Steele, Plymouth township trustees.

They stated the \$1717 balance in the road and bridge fund was insufficient to properly maintain the township's road. A balance of \$857 in the general fund, after the \$4,000 had been transferred, was sufficient to carry out the township's administrative functions, they said.

Shelby police said Jenkins admitted the kidnaping. Attorneys Beam and Beam are representing the defendant.
