FB Arrests Plymouth Men For Staging Tirol Bank Robbery

Charged with robbing the Tirol Farmers and Citizens Bank last July 27th, Eugene Chronister is being held in Cleveland, along with Homer Brown of Shiloh, his accomplice. The Federal authorities closed in on Chronister last Saturday at his home in Euclid, a Cleveland suburb. The two men at the time of the robbery secured \$2300, but when Chronister was arrested he had only 35 cents.

The F. B. I. is holding Chronister for violation of the federal bank robbery statutes, according to R. J. Abbot, special agent in charge of the Cleveland F. B. I. office, who released details of the capture.

The arrest of Chronister last Saturday brought to a close one of the most intensive manhunts in this vicinity for many years and ends a long vigil by the F. B. I. in solving a robbery, when the men entered the Tirol Farmers and Citizens bank at gun-point held up the cashier, Mrs. McNutt, who was forced to turn over to them \$2300 from the bank vault. The robbers missed another \$3,000 which was in the teller's till.

The two men had stolen a car.

Too lazy to think—it has been well said that man is a lazy animal and to think is the hardest kind of work. This is shown by the pressure groups. The individual members of some of these groups refuse to think. They just take orders from someone with limited information—worse still, from someone who is a total stranger to the facts.

Few people realize to the extent that Congress is flooded with irrational, unconsidered false propaganda by the blind followers of some so-called leader. The innocent victims of such propaganda are very emphatic in their demands. Their letters and telegrams generally start out "We are watching you. We demand that you vote for or against such and such a bill."

These people are moved by mob psychology. They generally know nothing about the subject in connection with which they are writing or sending telegrams. Often they do not know the contents of the bill that they favor or condemn from Adam's left ox. All they do is to repeat some canned arguments given to them by some so-called leader. In other words, we no longer have a situation where each person individually gets all the information possible and listens to all the pros and cons, and then makes up his own mind as to what is best.

It is a mistake to believe that

these followers of blind leaders are limited to any particular group. They include agricultural, business, industrial and professional men and women. The leaders, whose advice they follow without question, are generally prejudiced or seeking political favor or aggrandizement—persons who sometimes are more interested in their personal ambitions than in the welfare of their State and Nation.

The time has come that the American people stop being voted or controlled in mass. Let each of us use our own intelligence. Let us never close our minds to facts. We generally can agree upon the results if we can agree upon the facts. There are great and serious issues before this Nation both national and international. We realize full well that there are pros and cons to all these issues. There is plenty of room for honest difference of opinion, but may we insist that that difference be based upon facts and not upon falsehood.

Let us never surrender our right to do our own thinking. Let us never be guilty of being a blind follower of a betrayer of our State or Nation. If we once surrender the right to think and blindly accept the dictates of some other individual without knowing anything about the facts then we are no longer a Republic and there is danger ahead.

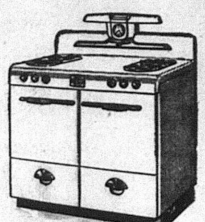

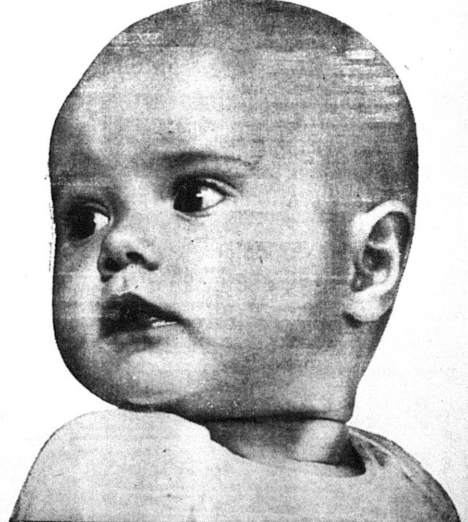

New Sub-Experiment Station
At Celeryville Dedicated At
Third Annual Muck School

Dr. W. E. Kraus, Associate Director of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, outlined the events leading to the establishment of the Sub-Experiment Station at Celeryville for a gathering of approximately 75 muck growers from Celeryville, the Medina Marsh and Hartville, in his address at the opening session of the Muck School.

The two day and one evening session, held February 17th and 18th, was highlighted by a score of specialists from Michigan State College, the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station and Ohio State University.

Dr. Kraus stated that funds available to the school at least begin research in a few of the problems that are now present in Ohio muck land farming. Soil sterilization, nematode control, muck soil conservation and minor elements were the main experiments to get under way on the 15 acres that was presented to the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station by the muck growers of Celeryville.

John K. Wells, Associate County Agent of Huron County, who acted as chairman of the School, introduced Dr. Paul M. Harner, Muck Soil Specialist from Michigan State College, who spoke on Water Control. Dr. Harner was particularly interested in seeing some method adopted to control the water at approximately two feet. He stated that tile drainage and flood water control would be necessary.

Mr. Virgil Overholt, Extension Engineer of Ohio State University, who followed Dr. Harner on the program, went into detail as to some possible methods of achieving a water control program. Further surveying would be necessary to determine the water needs and probable cost. Mr. Overholt stated:

Round table discussions led by Mr. Overholt on "Water Problems and Soil Conservation," "Fertilizer and Muck Elements," led by Dr. E. E. Barnes, Associate Agronomist at the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, and "Disease and Insect Control" led by Dr. H. C. Young, Associate Chairman in Botany and Plant Pathology at the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, proved to be very interesting phases of the two day program.

Mr. Guy Hummon former County Agent of Huron County and now assistant to the Director of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, praised the muck growers for their interest in trying to help with the problems of Muck soils. Mr. Edward Postema, Foreman of the Muck Crops Experimental Farm at Celeryville pointed out the details of the program to be put in operation on the farm this coming year.

Mr. John Stambaugh, chairman of the Muck Growers Committee commended the speakers for their wealth of technical material presented at this School which dealt directly with muck problems for this coming year.

Mr. John Wise, President of the Willard United Bank, who furnished the dinner for the speakers and muck growers committee and other expenses involving various speakers, stated that the cooperation of all specialists shown at this school would lead to an outstanding job of muck soil research at Celeryville.

The hotel built for the two afternoon sessions by the Celeryville ladies were appreciated by all.

Quotas Reduced

M/Sgt. L. R. Portman of the Newark U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Station announced today that the quota for volunteer enlistments has been greatly reduced both in the Army and the Air Force.

Sgt. Portman stated that the quotas are so small that usually they are filled by the tenth of the month, with the remainder of the applicants being put on file until the following month.

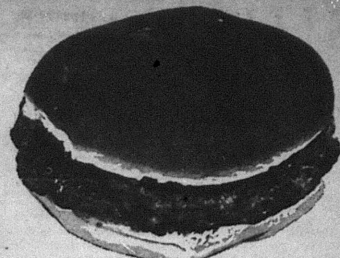
