

Ontario Turns Back Pilgrims

The clock ran out on a late Plymouth rally enabling the Ontario Warriors to defeat the Plymouth Pilgrims 71-62.

The score stood 62-41 in favor of Ontario at the start of the last quarter. The Pilgrims began to click. But the big lead which Ontario had built up during the first three quarters was enough to carry them through the Ontario jumped into an early lead and kept the score in their favor throughout most of the game. They led by quarters 20-14, 37-23, and then 62-41 at the off set of the finale.

This was the 11th straight victory for Dick Casada's Warriors and just about gives them the title, though their last game was this week when they meet Lexington.

SHILOH—George W. Shafer, 75, president of the Shiloh Savings Bank and who retired as a grocer after being one here for fifty years, died late Tuesday in Shelby Memorial hospital after a short illness. Born in Shiloh, Pa., on Nov. 18, 1873, he came to Ohio fifty-five years ago.

Mr. Shafer was a member of Mt. Hope Lutheran church here and a 50-year member of Shiloh Lodge No. 544, F. & A. M., and belonged to numerous other Masonic bodies.

Surviving are his widow, Desann, two daughters, Mrs. Paul Swayne and Sidney and Mrs. John Boyd of Chester, W. Va.; a sister, Miss Frances Shafer of Shiloh; three brothers, H. V. and S. J. Shafer all of Harrisburg, Pa., and four grandchildren.

Services will be held at the McCutcheon funeral home here at 2 p. m. Friday with Rev. C. S. Gladfelter, Mt. Hope pastor, officiating. Burial will be in Mt. Hope cemetery, here.

No Contract, No Response

The main discussion at Tuesday night's council meeting was whether or not the Plymouth fire department would respond to calls received other than those which are covered by contracts.

The fire agreement reached by Mayor Robinson and councilmen decided against answering any calls out of the corporation other than those in Plymouth township and individual property owners having a contract with the village.

Fire Chief Dalton McDougall was present at the council session, and pointed out the rules and regulations governing fire fighting and equipment, and duties of the fire chief.

There was a presentation of a township trustees entered into agreement with village officials for fire protection. The contract covers all of the farm buildings in this township. Willard officials also have a reciprocal agreement with the village fire department, whereby Plymouth may extend aid to Willard, if needed, and Plymouth may call on Willard in an emergency.

An attempt was made some time ago whereby fire protection was given to an individual contract with the village for fire protection, or until such a time that the New Haven trustees enter into an agreement with the village for fire protection in the immediate territory.

THE WEATHER

January's spring-like weather came to a sudden end on Sunday, the 30th, when the thermometer sank to one below zero. Up to that time maximum temperatures were mostly in the low 30's or high 20's, while maximums were frequently in the 50's. The highest was 51 on the 19th and 60 on the 24th.

The average for the month was 35.1 degrees or 6.8 degrees above normal. Except for the last three days it would probably have been the warmest January on record.

Precipitation (mostly rainfall) occurred on 19 days for a total of 3.70 inches, an excess of 1.46 inches. Dense, persistent fog from the 23rd to the 27th made driving hazardous.

Only 31-30ths of an inch of snow fell up to the 29th, but on the 31st a warm blanket 3 inches deep covered the landscape—just what the wheat needed.

Dave Williams Laid To Rest

The sky was cloudless and a brilliant sun made the snow twinkle which lay on the vast fields bordered by rows of trees in the distance which acted as a windbreak, and gave protection to that little-known cemetery, which lay just east of the old Kuhn school site known as Mount Pleasant. Even on this winter day in February this little spot seemed so placid and enchanting, and especially for the small group which had gathered to pay last respects to an artisan, one whose life and career had been ended by Death.

So it was in a setting as this the Dave Williams, 70, was laid to rest, thus ending a chapter of human mystery, closing a book of misunderstanding of a life which possessed so many possibilities but which had ended in a fruitless gain in this world.

Attaining the half of a brick mason almost a half century ago, Dave Williams came to this country, and in many of the larger cities, including Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Chattanooga, he had labored in an occupation, which today stand out as part of a monument of his labor and skill.

After his traveling days were over, and he had a big disappointment in life, he came to Plymouth some twelve years ago, where he made his home. He just drifted into town, and it was not long before he had found a little work here and there, mending chimneys, laying floors, and doing some brick work. The only fault Dave had that didn't do anyone harm except himself was that he was a "squealer." But Dave went on any job in an intoxicated condition. He knew his failures and weaknesses, and he assumed all responsibility for letting himself get down in the gutter. Time after time he'd try to straighten himself out, but a quick circumstance which no one would ever have dreamed of years would let him break over, and he'd try to forget through drink.

About seven years ago, Willard went to the hospital where he lay on the brink of death for weeks. He recovered from his illness, and despite warnings issued by physicians, he continued to drink. He was a physical body could not stand. Four weeks ago he entered the Shelby hospital, suffering from an abdominal ailment. An operation was performed, but it did not bring him relief, and death came Monday night at 7:00 o'clock.

Only a few friends gathered at the home funeral home Wednesday morning at eleven o'clock for the last rites. There were no relatives, and no one knew any about Dave's past except the few who were close to him in Ithica, N. Y., where he assisted his father, who was a building contractor, and who enjoyed a good reputation in the building industry. Dave had never worked on the many college buildings in Ithica, and this remembrance was a great source of satisfaction to Dave.

One of the great red roses upon the easel was the one symbol of love and kindness from "Plymouth Friends." For one to whom Fate had not been so kind, and who was a member of Plymouth citizens present to pay last respects. There was the mayor, ex-mayor, the chief of police, doctor, civic-minded and outstanding citizens, all of whom were present. Then there was Rev. Paetzick, pastor of the Lutheran church who seemed to have selected just the right passages of Scripture and who spoke one of the most beautiful services ever heard. For the few minutes which Rev. Paetzick spoke, it seemed as if the man in the gutter had come up to the same level of those who had made outstanding successes in life. Impressive was the service and the love which was a wonderful tribute to Christianity. It was a service commemorating the career of Dave Williams, an artist in masonry, and whose story will be with us for a month for many years. It was not of his weaknesses, but of his skill and ability... and of a man who had fought a good fight, but lost.

J. J. PITTENGER 77 DIES IN SPRINGFIELD

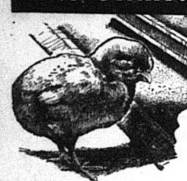

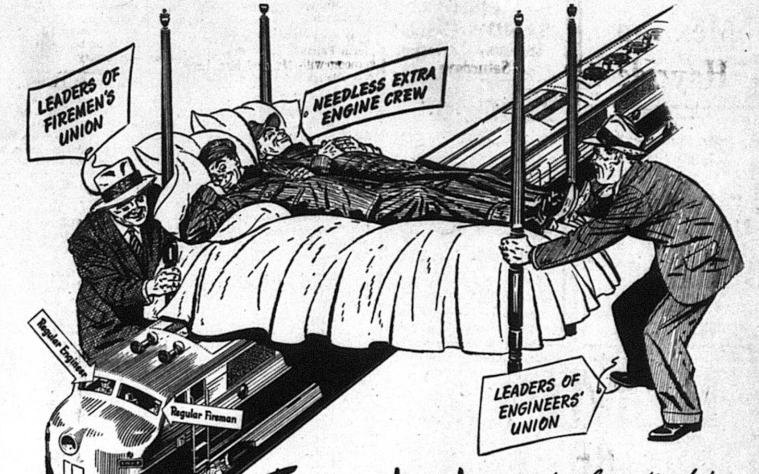

The glory of the victory and the inauguration are over. Now that the shouting and applause have ceased, President Truman is confronted with more serious problems—headaches. He will be called upon to make good all campaign pledges. There will be pressure groups galore. I do not envy him. The best interest of the Nation and the world now demands sober thinking rather than political oratory.

The President will be asked to make good his Party's platform pledges. He will be asked to make good his promise to get the Taft-Hartley Bill repealed. It should have been passed. With no apologies to its authors, the Taft-Hartley Bill was an insult to every laboring man.

It was indicated by the large industrialists and was passed in a "labor be damned" spirit. The election on November 2nd should be an eye opener to those who unwittingly fell into the trap of a few clever corporation lawyers. The price the Republicans paid for that blunder came too high. After the repeal, the President's job will be to get real labor legislation in cooperation with the labor leaders, legislation that will protect the nation from the disaster strikes that affect the very life of the Nation—legislation that will provide for the continued operation of an industry during arbitration of the problem. This legislation must not be repealed.

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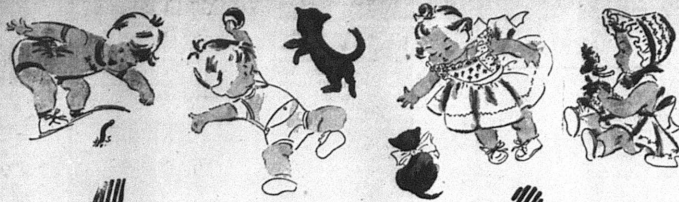

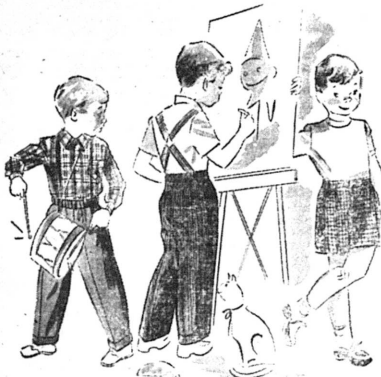

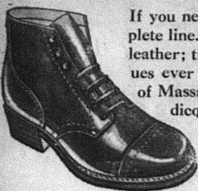
