Clay H. Stackhouse of Wakarusa was elected as a director of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts at their recent meeting in Denver, Colorado. Mr. Stackhouse, who manages the Humphreys Farms near Wakarusa, is also president of the Ohio Association of District Supervisors and Chairman of the board of supervisors of the local Huron Soil Conservation District. Mr. Stackhouse stated that approximately four hundred and fifty supervisor-delegates attended the convention from every state in the Union. Their discussions centered largely around the problems of proper use of land and of how the Districts could best be conducting activities of the various federal agencies so that conservation of our soil would proceed at the most rapid rate possible.

In his new capacity Mr. Stackhouse will be representing Soil Conservation Districts in the states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Michigan on their National Association.

Barn Burns in Plymouth Wp.

A large barn and all of its contents on the Roman Hartz farm near Shelby, were destroyed in an early Sunday morning fire, which is believed to have been started by defective wiring. At the time the blaze was discovered Mr. Hartz and a hired man were in the building pitching hay. The farm helper was in the act of tossing a fork of hay when suddenly a burst of flames broke through near him. So rapidly did they spread that very little of the contents, especially machinery, could be moved out. The two men rushed for water buckets, but without avail, for the fire had spread in a large hay mow, spread furiously throughout the structure within minutes.

Livestock, including two brood sows and thirteen pigs in broods, perished in the blaze, along with several lambing ewes that refused to leave the burning structure. Besides the two large hay mows, a hayloft, a bin of oats, a wagon and box, and much of the straw also went up in smoke.

As the flames enveloped the entire structure, breaking out from the south, a high wind from the south, or rather the fireward another building and the home. Only through the use of fire-fighting equipment from Plymouth and Shelby, and the usually good water well, were the firemen able to keep the flames from taking a great toll.

The Plymouth fire department received the call here around 9:00 o'clock Sunday morning, and was the second call within the week from the southern portion of Plymouth township. The Shelby department sent out a 1200-gallon tank of water, while the Plymouth department had 500 gallons in its water compartment on the truck. Along with this, the well on the farm was pumped hard for quite a few minutes, it being estimated that some seven hundred gallons of water were used from the well alone. However, Fire Chief McDougal and his Plymouth firemen, didn't let the water at any time during the blaze. The fact that the fire did not spread to other buildings and the home, is evidenced that all firemen did a good job. It was estimated that the fire was in wind direction made it almost impossible for firemen to keep their position in trying to protect the nearby buildings.

The barn was located on the old John Chapman place, having been built by him in 1892. It was about three years ago, Roman Hartz, who resides on the farm, bought the old Chandley place from Carl Lindsey. Mr. Hartz is actively engaged in operating the farm, and used the barn. Mr. and Mrs. Ward Clark reside in the home on the Hartz farm. Mr. Clark is a son-in-law of Sam Chessman.

The Fire Chief McDougal states the loss to building and contents will run several thousand dollars, partially covered by insurance.

The Sunday morning blaze attracted many sightseers to the scene of the fire.

Firemen were called out at 3:00 o'clock Wednesday morning to the F. W. Douglas residence on Sandusky street where fire had broken out in the large two-story garage. The blaze was soon under control and damage to the building was estimated at \$500, while Dr. Douglas sets his loss of supplies and equipment at several hundred dollars. A deep-freezer unit was also damaged.

The fire, the origin of which is believed to have been caused by defective wiring, was first seen by Mrs. Lottie Price of Newark, an aunt of Dr. Douglas, who is visiting them. If a group does not have a projector, the company will provide the equipment and an operator. A company representative will make a few explanatory remarks in introducing the picture.

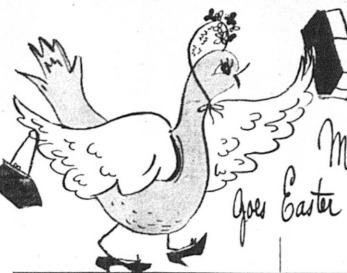
