

Seal Sale Set For March 17

A goal of \$385,000 has been set for Ohio for the 16th annual Easter Seal Sale, it was announced recently by James A. Hewitt, the president of The Ohio Society for Crippled Children. The nationwide drive will open March 17th and close Easter Sunday, April 17th.

Sheets of Easter Seals will be mailed to nearly two million families in the state, Hewitt said, with an appeal for a dollar—or more—to support services for the physically handicapped. Ninety-three affiliated county societies for crippled children and cooperating service groups join with the state society in conducting the campaign.

Keyed to the spirit of Easter, the 1949 seal bears the silhouette of a young girl with crutches and the slogan: **HELP CRIPPLED CHILDREN**.

Funds contributed through purchase of the seals, Hewitt stated, will be used for medical care, corrective braces, shoes and other artificial aids; equipment for therapy; recreation and camping; training of urgently needed professional personnel; and many other services.

According to Hewitt, Easter Seal funds may be used for any type of crippling condition if no other agency in the community is prepared to provide the service needed.

Classified as "crippling" are more than 200 types of disabilities. Major categories include cerebral palsy, infantile paralysis, heart defects, speech and hearing handicaps, visual defects and epilepsy.

More than 90% of the money collected, Hewitt stated, will remain in the state; the balance or eight and three tenths percent will represent Ohio's share in the support of educational and other activities of The National Society for Crippled Children and Adults. The Ohio Society for Crippled Children was founded in 1919 by the late Edgar F. "Daddy" F. len of Edgar. Since that time, the organization has carried on a continuous program to bring about adequate physical, educational, recreational and vocational services for physically handicapped people in the state.

Condemnation Suit Scheduled For Mar. 16-17

Two days, March 16 and 17th, have been set aside in Judge VanHorn's calendar of the Huron County Court of Common Pleas to hear the condemnation proceedings case of the village of Plymouth against the Gottlieb estate. The case will come up for jury trial, and it is not known whether or not the case will consume one or two days.

Solicitor Joseph Dush, representing the village, has been busy gathering data concerning the condemnation case, and he is ready to give all details to the jury. The proceedings were started some months ago after an extensive survey was made for a sewage disposal plant in the village. The location recommended by engineers was a three-acre site in the north-east section of the village on the Gottlieb property. The village made several offers to the estate for the property, but was turned down. The Gottlieb estate is reported as owning the land, and certain road easements. As a result, the village started condemnation proceedings and the trial will come up this month.

Solicitor Dush informed council at its meeting Tuesday night that he has filed an answer to the 11th day of the month in the County in which Jesse LaDow had asked removal of J. W. McInire as a member of the board of cemetery trustees. The deadline for filing the answer was February 25th.

The solicitor's answer admits that the defendant, J. W. McInire, is the only member which has been properly served summons, as a member of the cemetery board, but the answer was filed by Solicitor Dush in behalf of the entire board. LaDow claims in his petition that McInire is inefficient and that the board was illegally appointed, and that even after its appointment it failed to perform its duties. LaDow also claims that the board members should be deprived of their office and pay back money which members received as compensation.

The matter was under discussion at Tuesday night's council meeting, but no formal resolution or action of any kind was taken. Solicitor Dush informed the council that an interview he had with McInire, it was very evident from the board while under pressure. No definite date has been set for the hearing, but Solicitor Dush is of the opinion that the board will be called within the next few weeks.

Wildlife Growth Encouraged in Shiloh Area Shiloh Legion Post Active In Game Reserve

Friday morning Feb. 18, for the second consecutive year, fifty pheasants—12 hens and cocks—were released by members of Garrett-Riest Post 503, American Legion on the B. R. Guthrie game reserve south of Shiloh for the evening.

A year ago Mr. Guthrie, retired farmer and poultry dealer, of Shiloh, leased this 200 acre tract to the Legion for five years with the understanding that it was to be used as a game sanctuary. The Legion promptly and enthusiastically took over, bought and released pheasants upon the spot and just fell during the hunting season a number of members of the Post were deputized as game protectors to insure no trespassing upon the premises. It is a pleasure to relate that the hunting public of Shiloh and vicinity respected their wishes so well not a single violation was reported.

The released pheasants thrived and multiplied and spread to surrounding territory. "It is hoped that by next fall," Woodrow Shaffer, Chairman of the Legion game committee, stated, "we can take in the entire triangular section lying between the Guthrie road on the west to Howard's corners to the south and thence east to state route 178. A number of farmers living within this area have expressed a willingness to cooperate, and if we could get them all to agree, we'd have control of a block comprising close to a thousand acres. We are not conveniently situated at this time, however, to properly take care of so large an area."

Game throughout the state has been on a steady decline for the past several years, and with the state seemingly unwilling to close the hunting season on rabbits and pheasants for a year, sanctuaries such as this appear a community's sole remaining hope for an increasing game supply.

We intend eventually to make the area around Shiloh the best pheasant and rabbit hunting territory in the county," says Alvin H. Garrett, Post Commander.

If they can continue with the spirit they have shown the past year, we do not doubt that they will succeed.

McGregor Asks For 10% WH Tax

Congressman J. Harry McGregor (Rep.) 17th Ohio District, introduced a bill in Congress recently reducing to 10% the rate of withholding tax on wages.

Mr. McGregor stated this bill, if put into effect, would reduce the number of Federal employees by several thousand.

In 1946 there were 49,457,661 individuals who received refunds on Federal income tax. These refunds represented \$2,261,308,206. In the year 1947 there were \$3,231,882 individuals who received refunds on Federal income tax, and the amount of money involved was \$1,712,345,040.

McGregor contends that these \$3,231,882 refund cases can be reduced by approximately 50 percent if a smaller percentage is withheld from individual wages at source of income. There would be no loss of revenue whatsoever if McGregor's bill becomes law, but there would be a definite decrease in the amount of paper work required in the offices of Internal Revenue. Much unnecessary work could be avoided with the result of saving money for the taxpayer. Mr. McGregor is attempting to secure a "balancing point" so that income taxes withheld will approximately equal the actual income taxes due the Federal Government.

In many instances, under the existing law, the Government must enter into involved correspondence, which is both costly and inconvenient to the taxpayer. This bill would require that only 10% be withheld at the source of wages, but it would in no way decrease the amount of money collected by the Government under the existing program.

February Weather

February, 1949 was merely a continuation of the unseasonably mild weather that began in November.

The average temperature for February was 35.1 degrees, or 7.5 degrees above normal. The highest was 60 on the 15th and 18th; the lowest 8 above on the 2nd and 3rd. On only six days did the thermometer fall below 20; on most other days the minimum was in the 30's.

Precipitation was light—only 1.84 inches, or 31 inch below normal. Snowfall measured only seven-tenths of an inch up to 6:00 p. m. Feb. 28th.

Since November 1, 1948 the average monthly temperatures and degrees above normal were as follows:

November	46.7	6.5
December	33.7	2.9
January	35.1	6.8
February	35.1	7.5

The highest temperature for the winter was 61 on January 19th; the lowest 1 below on January 30th. Total snowfall for the three winter months measured only 6.4 inches.

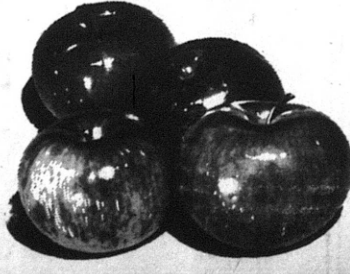

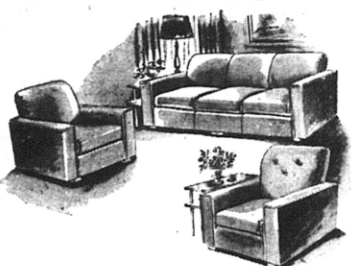

EXPLAIN TAX ON STOCKS

Holders of stocks, bonds and mortgages are required to file personal tax returns with the county Auditor in the County of their residence. Government bonds, except postal savings, Municipal bonds and bank stocks are excepted.

Every Corporation makes a report to the Ohio Department of Taxation by January 15th, of all its stockholders and shareholders as of January 1st, with their addresses. The Department sorts out the thousands of these reports by Counties, a task that requires several months. In October they arrive at the County Auditor's office and they are carefully checked with the returns on file there.

Every year there are several hundred who have secured various stocks, who did not know they were required to file personal tax returns on these in-

vestments. Since the Auditor's Office has no knowledge of their ownership until the following October, they cannot be mailed a return on February 15th, when the returns are generally mailed. The fifteen percent penalty period has already passed, so they are sent a return the second year, when payment for two years is required.

The Law requires a return to be made even though a form is not mailed. The inconvenience to owners of stocks, and the embarrassment to the Auditor's Office personnel can be eliminated by reporting ownership as of January 1st. Stocks that do not pay dividends are also taxable according to their market quotation as of Dec. 31, 1948. Many confuse personal tax with income tax.

Wherever possible it is the de-

sire of the Auditor's Office to have tax-payer penalties, and they are willing to extend every effort to have all comply with the law. On all personal tax matters, if the situation is different, a ruling will be secured from the Ohio Department of Taxation.
