Michael Van Brunt, 7 year old son of Supt. and Mrs. P. I. Van Brunt was awarded a certificate of honor in the fourth annual "Best Teacher Contest" sponsored by the Quiz Kids radio program.

Michael is one of the five hundred fifty-three students, out of many thousands who entered, who wrote the best letters on the subject, "The Teacher who Has Helped Me Most." His teachers are Mrs. Fred Port.

The contest was conducted to find the "Best Teacher of 1949" and to bring recognition to the entire teaching profession. The contest was placed first by Phyllis Haag, English Instructor in Washington, D. C. She will receive \$2500 in cash for advanced study. 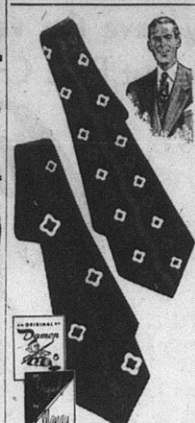
