

Tells ofquake inWashington

A couple of Plymouth people are somewhat concerned over the earthquake which struck the state of Washington Wednesday of last week. Mr. and Mrs. Edw. B. Curpen have a daughter residing at Seattle, and Mr. Leon Davis has a son, Maurice, who is at Eatonville.

Thursday morning of last week it required only seven minutes to get a call through by Mrs. Curpen to her daughter's home in Seattle. Mrs. James Dones, the former Jean Curpen, stated that the city of Seattle, was shaken considerably and gave a vivid description of the tremor, to her mother over the phone.

A letter dated April 13, the same day of the quake, was received from Leon Davis from his son Maurice, who resides about 50 miles south of Seattle. The full text of the letter follows:

"Dear Dad: I thought I had better drop you a note tonight as you are probably right now hearing reports of our earthquake to-day. First of all, we are all O. K. and are not suffering. I am, of course, except broken dishes and a few other things, plus, of course, an upset nervous system.

"I'll try to give you an account as it happened to us here. There was a general assembly at 11:30 this morning and during the time came down home to get a book I needed for the afternoon. On my way back when I was almost to the school, my feet began to act strangely and it was a quake. I was still and I could not see away to and fro. The trees rocked like there was an enormous wind, but there was no sound.

"The youngsters emptied the school house in nothing flat, and it was fortunate that the assembly was over and most of the children were out for lunch period from both buildings. I came right back home to see how Elura (his wife) was and met her down on the street. She had been in the apartment building and the quake, 1 1/2 minutes, and was pretty well frightened. Unless you've experienced one of the things you have no idea what it is like. How any building withstands the quake is more than I can stand. We lost quite a few dishes, a couple of vases, a mirror and some other things. We had on our chest of drawers.

"Some of the walks at school are in very bad condition. In some rooms there is a crack in the wall and ceiling. Plastering came down in amounts. The walls of the auditorium are in rather bad shape. They sent the pupils home right away and inspected the building this afternoon.

Anyway, it is no fun and leaves your knees shaky for an hour or so. We went down to Tacoma this afternoon to see how Mary and her family were. We went to see him as he was in class. Everything was ok there.

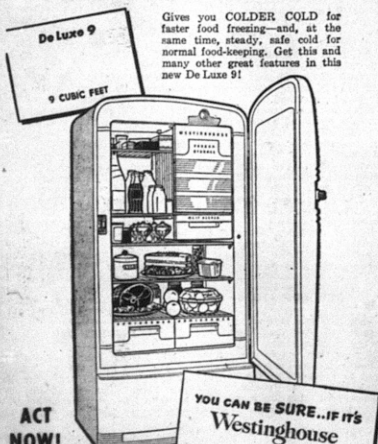

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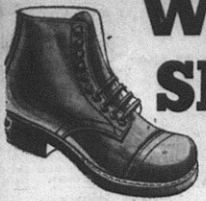
