

Ray Sykes Dies of Heart Attack

Funeral services for Harry R. Sykes, 69, 25 East Court Street, Cincinnati, a distributor of power-plant and heating equipment in that city since 1931, were held in the Rebold funeral home, Saturday at 2:30 p. m. Cremation followed and the ashes will be brought to Plymouth later for burial.

Mr. Sykes suffered a heart attack at his home Thursday. He got up feeling fine, ate his breakfast and fifteen minutes later suffered the attack and passed away.

A native of Plymouth, he was the son of the late Dr. and Mrs. W. S. Sykes. He graduated from Plymouth High School in 1888 and was employed by the Fato-Roach Company before moving to Cincinnati.

He was a former member of the local Masonic Order. He left Plymouth for Cincinnati in 1908, where he was employed by the C. C. Co., which he retained until he entered business as a distributor of power-plant and heating equipment in 1931.

He was a graduate of Ohio State University. He was active in the Masonic circle, Ohio member of the National Association of Power Engineers.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Emma J. Sykes, who he married in 1908. He has three daughters, Mrs. Robert (Betty) Corwin of Cincinnati, Ill., Mrs. Rudy (Jane) Barta of Cleveland and Mrs. (Dana) Clark of Los Angeles, Calif., five grandchildren, two sons, Dr. W. S. Sykes, Jr. of Lakewood and one sister, Mrs. Sula McLaughlin of Wisconsin.
