Set Up Allotment

The Richland county Triple-A organization has started work on county wheat allotments which are expected to be returned next fall in a move to curtail production.

The allotment program was dropped during the war when farmers were urged to produce more grain to feed the hungry nations of the world.

Guy L. Taylor, county AAA chairman, said the control program is being revived so over-

production of wheat won't bring the price down to the level of depression days.

Township AAA committeemen are contacting all farmers to compile a list of average acreages of wheat in the county for the years 1945 through 1948. The list will be used to determine the allotments of wheat acreages for Richland county farmers.

Most farmers show by their applications that liming and fertilizing pastures and hay fields again will be the leading conservation practice, Taylor said.

Heads Up Farmers Club of Mansfield Commerce Group

Tom Sheppard, Rural Rt. No. 1, Shelby, has been named temporary chairman of the Farmers club of Richland county, being organized in affiliation with the Mansfield Chamber of Commerce. The Jackson township farmer will head a committee of fourteen men whose job it will be to formulate by-laws for the group that aims at obtaining greater cooperation between distributors, manufacturers processors, consumers and farmers. Mr. Routzon, executive secretary of the Chamber of Commerce explained.

Floyd Habein, secretary of the Findlay Chamber of Commerce, led a group of three men from that city in explanation of the Hancock County Farmer's club and its objectives and achievements. Included among aims were the promotion of a general knowledge of farm life, of the
