ORDINANCE NO. 193
AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, PROVIDING FOR THE LICENSING OF TAXICABS IN SAID VILLAGE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT: SECTION 1. From and after the effective date of this ordinance it shall not be lawful for any person, persons, partnership or corporation to drive, operate or maintain a taxicab, taxicabs or taxicab service for the carrying, hauling or transporting persons or passengers, whether for hire or not for hire, on the public streets, highways, and alleys of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, without having first obtained from the Council of the Village of Plymouth, a license or permit to do so.

SECTION 2. All such licenses shall be granted directly by the Council by a majority vote of all its members, and all applications for licenses shall be made directly to said Council.

SECTION 3. The fee for the first taxicab of any one operator of such cabs shall be the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) and the fee for other cabs of the same operator shall be the sum of Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each such taxicab.

SECTION 4. Each holder of such license shall have and carry insurance within the limits of at least \$14,000.00 to \$20,000.00, and at least \$10,000.00 covering injury to the public and damage to property.

SECTION 5. Each holder of such license, and his agents and employees, shall faithfully observe and obey all state and village laws and Ordinances governing and controlling traffic on the village streets, alleys and highways.

SECTION 6. All taxicabs and vehicles used in taxicab service shall at all times be kept in good mechanical repair.

SECTION 7. Once each month the marshal of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, shall inspect each taxicab as to its safety and good repair, and he shall make and keep a record of such inspections.

SECTION 8. The Council reserves to itself the power to suspend or revoke any license as herein provided for on what it may consider good and sufficient cause.

SECTION 9. The number of licenses to be granted and issued under this ordinance shall rest entirely within the discretion and judgment of the Council.

SECTION 10. Each holder of such license shall post in a conspicuous place in each taxicab operated by him a schedule of the rates for his service, and in addition thereto, shall file with the Clerk of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, a schedule of the rates for his service.

SECTION 11. Any person, partnership or corporation found guilty of violating Section One of this Ordinance shall be fined not to exceed the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) and costs for each and every such offense.

SECTION 12. The violation of any other section of this ordinance other than Section One shall be ground for the suspension or revocation of the violator's license.

SECTION 13. This ordinance shall go into and become of full effect, force and operation from and after the earliest date allowed by law.

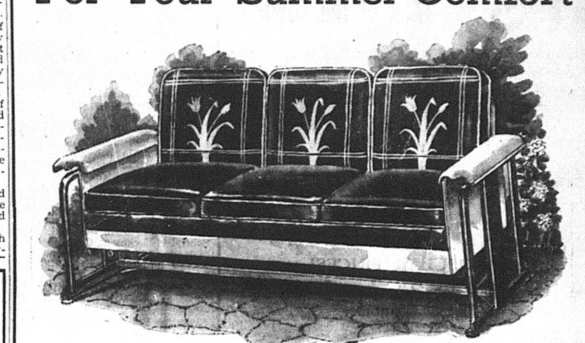

ORDINANCE NO. 134 AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, CREATING A THREE MINUTE PARKING ZONE IN THE AREA IN FRONT OF THE UNITED STATES POST OFFICE IN SAID VILLAGE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1. Hereafter a three minute parking zone is established in the area immediately in front of the United States Post Office in the Village of Plymouth, Ohio. The said three minute area shall consist of two parking spaces in the location herein mentioned.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the earlier period allowed by law.

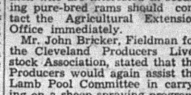
Lamb Committee Decides On Pool Dates
