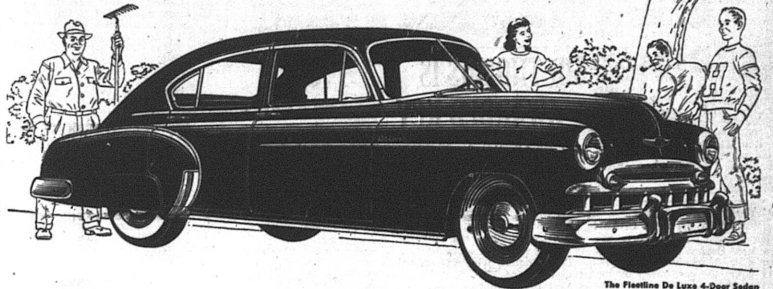

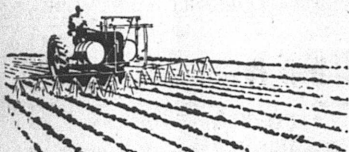

All sixteen Seniors, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Pittenger, left Mansfield Tuesday evening at 9:41 for New York City. They expected to arrive and have breakfast at Pennsylvania Station, thence to the McAlpin Hotel where rooms were being reserved for them. Their itinerary is as follows:

Wednesday 9:30 a. m. by city bus to West 42nd Street Dock; 10:30 Circle Line Tour around Manhattan Island; 1:30 Board a sight-seeing bus for a tour of Upper New York and LaGuardia Airport, points of interest along the way include Radio City, St. Patrick's Cathedral, Central Park, Harlem, Cathedral of St. John the Divine, Columbia University, Grant's Tomb. At LaGuardia Airport a visit will be made to the observation deck where they may see the big planes come and go.

Returning, they pass through Queens and Long Island City to the New Queens Midtown Tunnel into New York City. 7:00 p. m.—Observation Roof of the Empire State Building.

8:00 p. m.—National Broadcasting Co. Studio and Television Tour. Thursday 9:15 a. m.—Leave by sight-seeing bus for a tour of Lower New York, points of interest, including Grand Central Station, Public Library, New York University, Greenwich Village, Trinity Church, Wall Street, Customs House, Battery Park, (short stop to view Statue of Liberty), Fulton Fish Market, Bowery, Little Church Around the Corner.

12:30—Leave New York. 2:00 p. m.—Arrive in Philadelphia, board a sight-seeing bus for a three-hour tour of that city, leaving at 7:11 p. m.

Friday 8:00 a. m.—Take a chartered bus to Arlington National cemetery, Mt. Vernon, Alexandria, Virginia. 1:30—Chartered bus to the U. S. Capitol, Supreme Court, Pan American Union, Bureau of Printing and Engraving, Washington Monument and Lincoln Memorial.

Saturday a. m.—Walk to Lincoln Museum where Lincoln was

shot, then across the street to Peterson House where Lincoln died. 10:00 a. m.—Visit the Smithsonian Institute have lunch at the Cafeteria in the Department of Commerce Building.

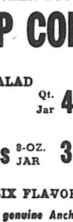

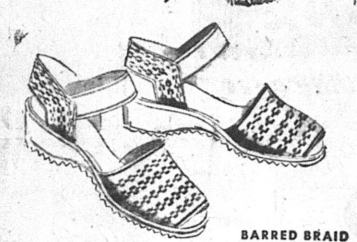

All this under the hypocritical lip service of democracy—of the hypocritical plea that some people are incapable of governing themselves. Well, our answer is that they existed for a long time, and managed to get along before they were subjugated by so-called cultured nations—subjugated for exploitation.

It is the same old story over and over again—that because certain people have a different way of life than we have, they are incapable of governing themselves. Wrong-doers always convince themselves first that they are right, and then they justify their actions by spreading their false ideologies throughout the world.

In the meantime, we are continuing our stupid foreign policy—the policy of an international WPA. President Dutra of Brazil is in the country for a week-end. I am wondering whether he is here to play us for a sucker the same as the European and other

Latin American nations have done, or whether he is here for sincere friendship. That will tell.

I am wondering whether shortly after he leaves, there will be a loan of several hundred million dollars of the taxpayers' money to Brazil. I am just wondering whether there will be another loan to further deplete our natural resources, that belong to unborn generations, with the American taxpayers' money paying for this reasonable job.

Of course, we want true and sincere friendship, not only from Latin America, but from all the nations of the world. However, we know that handing out sandwiches and dishing out dollars does not produce friends, but, in the end, enemies. History repeats itself and so do suckers.

## DYNAMITE USED TO OPEN DITCH

The modern use of dynamite was invoked last week by Leo Barnes in opening a 3500 foot long, two miles east of Plymouth on land belonging to several property owners. The ditch is just west of the Updyke road, and south of the Shiloh road, and runs through property belonging to Ralph Rhodes, Dallas Brickley, Warren and John Heifner, Albert Myers and others.

Barnes states that the explosive was used at a distance of 14 to 16 inches, the depth of which was according to the type of soil, whether it was hard or soft. Work was started last Wednesday, and charges were placed for several rods at a time and then set off, opening the ditch with an average six-foot top, tapering down to a width of three feet, with a depth of 3 1/2 to four feet.

On the Heifner farms, John and Warren Heifner estimate they will reclaim approximately ten to twelve acres of fertile land which they have never been able to plant. The ditch will drain several acres which heretofore has been under water most of the time, especially during the rainy season.

Mr. Barnes was assisted in the operation by several of the property owners. It is estimated that it took 700 pounds of dynamite for the job.

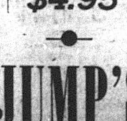

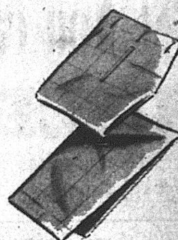
