

200 Plymouthites Enroll in Blue Cross-Shield Drive

More than 200 Plymouth residents obtained pre-paid hospitalization and surgical care during the Blue Cross-Shield Drive Community Enrollment. A total of 6,448 enrolled throughout the county.

The enrollment figures were announced today by Mayor Carroll Robinson. Mayor Robinson said the results "far exceeded expectations."

The Mayor reported that 80 contracts were signed in Plymouth. They covered 208 residents.

Mayor Robinson praised the new subscribers for "their foresight in making certain that their families will not be forced into heavy debt by hospital bills arising from serious illness."

Richland County is now one of the nation's leading areas in providing health protection for its residents," Mayor Robinson said. This protection benefits the health and welfare of the entire community, as well as each individual family.

Enrollment figures for other Richland communities showed 170 Shelby residents subscribed under 300 contracts. In Belleville, 150 contracts were signed, covering persons and families amounting to 300 persons.

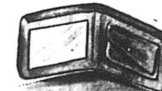
