

ALEX SPEAR, NEW YORKER CALLS PLYMOUTH 'HOME'

A beautiful tribute to HOME (which means Plymouth) appears below, and is written by Alex Spear, in a letter addressed to Mary Fleming. Mr. Spear gives the Old Home Town much praise, and recalls many memories of his former home.

Mr. and Mrs. Sol Spear were among the pioneer families which established Plymouth, and the name is still synonymous among the older residents of the town. There were four boys and two girls in the Spear family. All became very successful in life, and the boys, Joel, Alex, Maurice and Nathan, made their annual trek back to Plymouth for many years after they left home. Only Alex Spear remains, and he is comfortably snuggled away in Bedford Village, N. Y., where, as he says, memories of Plymouth are ever present to him. And there is every reason to believe they are highly cherished memories, especially those summer days when he would join "the boys" down at Kappenberg's and Bachrach's slaughter house which was located in a cool and comfortable spot down on Huron River. Plymouth was to him a place of great rich not bustled, except perhaps, temporarily. Chancy was his pet dog, and he and his brother, Carl Lofland and Sam Simmons made up the group which Alex arrived at in Plymouth. From their association and friendship, and perhaps a little game, Carl Lofland and Sam Simmons, two brothers of Plymouth Shores on Lake Erie, which developed into quite a summer resort, and was known as a Girls' Summer Camp.

Twenty-five years ago, it is remembered by the author, a newcomer in town for only a few weeks, that Sol Spear extended a cordial invitation to him to work in the garden. He was marked: "If you spend five years in Plymouth, you'll make it your home the rest of your life." Words and the memory of Sol Spear will remain with us always.

It is gratifying to those of us who reside here to know that those who have been away for many years, still have a good home ties which they knew in their younger years, and Plymouth will always be a part of its own. We know our readers will be glad to hear from one who not only lived in Plymouth in life, but still calls Plymouth home. The letter from Mr. Spear is as follows:

Bedford Village, N. Y., June 6, 1949

Dear Mary Fleming: A blustery day it was—year of the Spanish-American war, 1898. How I can recall the day, and how reluctantly I left Plymouth only to go to school, then, to visit my parents, and to continue those visits during their lifetime and until the death of my father (Mr. A. Fleming) in 1912.

For over thirty years, excepting for a few years in foreign lands, I have been reading the Advertiser. In the beginning I knew every name in the paper, and in its print. Gradually, however, as the years passed and I read the history of Plymouth, and the strange names appeared among the personals, while many familiar ones, I began to feel that I belonged to the children and grandchildren of them that I knew as a boy.

In last weeks issue of the Advertiser, I read your splendid report of the Alumni banquet with its many and interesting personalities, that surely made the night a memorable one for all who were fortunate to attend. I never, mailing my yearly small check to Mr. Helen R. Sams whom I haven't the pleasure of knowing, I neglected to add a short note regretting my inability to be with you in person, and thereby missing the great opportunity of seeing my name in company with Mrs. Edna Stretcher, Homer Ruggs, Letta Brewbaker, Mrs. Ruth Andrews Thomas and Mrs. Eleanor Seare Whitney. Of the latter names, I remember that I met her in 1895 of Los Angeles, was graduated one year ahead of me. So, that means that I was a member of the class of 1894.

The man who gave Richland County one of the first community hospitalizations plans ever established in Ohio today was named manager of the Akron Hospital Service enrollment department.

He is John D. King, who conducted the recent county-wide enrollment in the Blue Cross Hospitalization Plan and Blue Shield Surgical Care. Richland was among the first Ohio counties to be offered the non-profit, pre-paid health protection plans on a community-wide basis.

Since the war, Dill has been associated with the Mansfield Tire & Rubber Co. and the Connecticut Life Insurance Co. in Mansfield. He joined AHS last October.

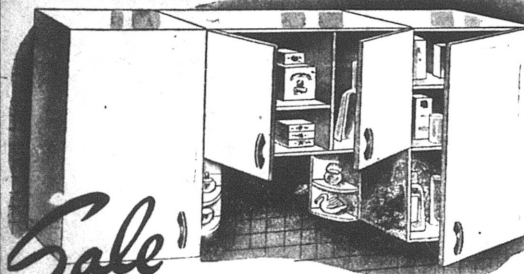

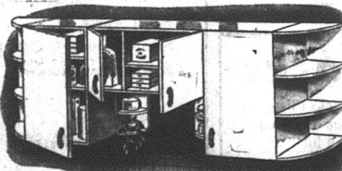

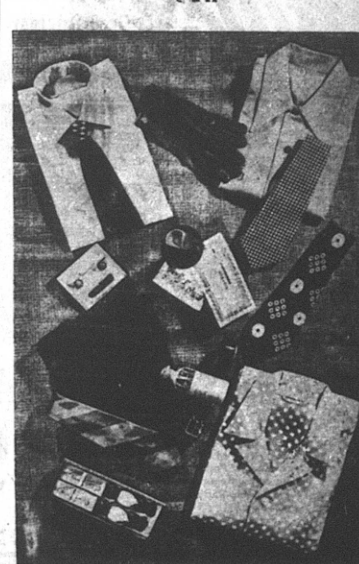
