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GLORIOUS SOUFFLES

By BETTY NEWTON

Asparagus souffles that will impress one and all.

This may be a new idea or an old one—but you'll think it's good once you try it. It is an especially good way to use the first asparagus which the markets offer. Your family has to come to dinner on time when these are served, or they will miss the puffed up glory of the souffles.

Tomato Souffles with Asparagus
1 Tbsp. butter or margarine
2 Tbsp. flour
1/2 C. hot tomato juice
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 lb. American cheese, sliced
Dash cayenne or Tabasco sauce
2 eggs, separated

Buttermilk Breakfast Cake
1 1/2 C. flour
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
4 1/2 Tbsp. shortening
1/2 C. sugar
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 egg
2 C. buttermilk or sour milk

Mix and sift flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Cut in shortening until fine. Stir in sugar and cinnamon. Add slightly beaten egg and buttermilk and stir just enough to mix. Pour into a greased 8 x 8 inch square pan and bake at 400 degrees about 25 minutes.

Make a sauce of the first four ingredients by melting fat in a double boiler, adding the flour, then mixing in the tomato juice and salt, and cooking until smooth and thickened. Add the diced cheese and cayenne and stir occasionally until it is melted. Stir in the beaten egg yolks and cool.

1949 Highway Maps Now Available

Director T. J. Kauer of the Ohio Department of Highways stated that the new 1949 Highway Maps are now available and free to the citizenry of Ohio.

The new map is complete in every detail, inclusive of the type of highway, route numbers, county seats, incorporated municipalities, points of interest, state forest parks, state conservation division parks, roadside parks, major airports, and other such data. There is also included a small map showing a downtown area of the larger cities, namely, Columbus, Akron, Youngstown, Toledo, Cleveland, Canton, Cincinnati and Dayton.

There are many beautiful pictures of scenic and historical

spots of Ohio, a national map, an index of counties of Ohio, a compilation of Highway Patrol posts and an Ohio mileage and driving time chart.

Director Kauer said that he felt that the emphasis should be put on the fact that the maps are free and can be obtained by writing a postcard to the Director of Highways, State Office Building, Columbus, 15, Ohio.

Under no circumstances must postage be included. Heretofore, people have included a three cent stamp, but it is not required, and serves as an obstacle to rapid dissemination to the many requests, he said.

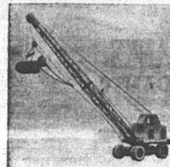
