ASK JUDGMENT FOR ACCIDENT

Judgment of \$38,000 for wrongful death is sought in a suit filed in Erie County common pleas court by John J. McKown, administrator of the estate of Leroy J. Metcalf, rural Plymouth, O., against Harry B. Frederick, Jr., a minor, S. Columbus-ave. Sandusky.

Petition states that early Oct. 3rd, last year, defendant, against whom three specific counts of negligence are cited, operated an auto at excessive speed and struck the car driven by Mr. Metcalf with such force that the latter died about an hour later. The accident occurred at the intersection of Polk and Shelby-Sts. Sandusky. Murray and Murray, et al., are attorneys for plaintiff.

CIGARETTE TAX IS DISTRIBUTED

Following the sale of wholesale and retail dealer's cigarette licenses for 1949-50, the annual distribution to municipalities and townships will be made as soon as the settlement is approved by the Auditor of State.

After one percent is deducted for Auditor's and Treasurer's fees to cover postage, applications and receipts for handling this tax three-fourths of the remainder is distributed to the locality of the dealer, and one-fourth to the County. Huron County municipalities and townships will receive \$5,638.65 and the County \$1,879.53. Effective with last year the State of Ohio vacated this field of taxation in favor of the corporations and townships.

Farmers May Secure Displaced Europeans

Farmers interested in securing displaced persons from Europe may apply at the Agricultural Extension Office, Court House, Norwalk.

These displaced persons will be people who have entered Germany, Austria, or Italy on or after September 1, 1939 and on or before December 22, 1945, or other persons who have been in the Western Zones of Germany and Austria or in Italy on January 1, 1949. Farmers who have the facilities to take care of the entire

family may make this request and if the rest of the family is qualified under immigration laws they will be permitted to enter the United States.
The majority of these displaced persons are between the ages of 18 and 44. All persons selected by

the Church World Service Movement to come to the United States must meet health requirements before leaving Europe and must be skilled in the occupation that is desired by the farmer.
All persons making application must give four assurances.

1. A job without displacing any other worker.
2. Housing that is safe and sanitary, available without displacing another person.
3. Transportation costs from port of arrival in the United States to place of final destination.
4. That the displaced persons will not become a charge on public funds.

Any farmers interested in securing further information should contact the Agricultural Extension Office.

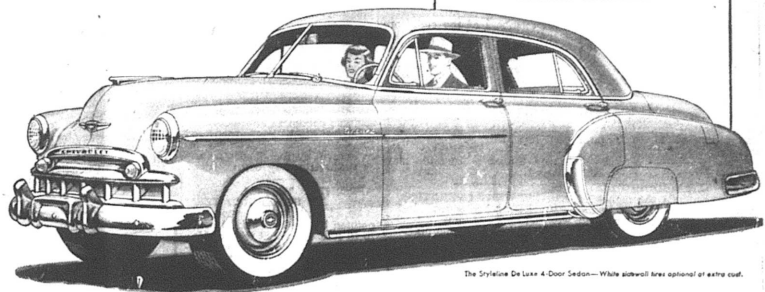

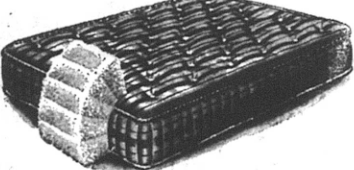

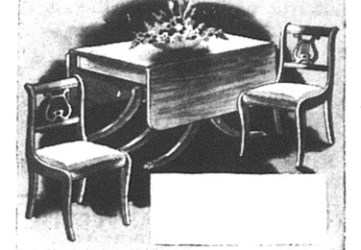
