

Chief Session for Council

A discussion of sidewalk improvement revealed that several walks in Plymouth are badly in need of repair. Necessary steps will be taken to get the walks in shape before winter. Glen West, chairman of the committee, pointed out that tree roots have pushed many walks out of place, making a hazard for pedestrians. Those property owners whose walks need fixing will be notified.

There was one traffic violation recorded in the mayor's monthly report, and this was only a fine of \$1.00 with costs suspended.

Messrs. Harold Chasman, B. R. Scott and P. W. Thomas, members of the Board of Public Affairs, met Tuesday night at the city hall to discuss business for the light and water departments. Monthly bills were approved and the board's construction of the Wilco-Root water line extension will probably begin in two weeks.

Boards are also making a survey of another six inch water line from the pumping station over to the line on Brown. The line will give two water outlets from the plant, and at the same time give added protection to the city in case of a breakdown, as well as improve the water system in the north part of town.

Further improvements in the future will be an automatic soda ash feeder for the softening plant. This will probably be installed some time in September at an estimated cost of \$200.

Local Couple Home After 8,400 Mile Tour of West

Leaving Plymouth June 5th, the Browns selected the northern route, which brought them into the Wisconsin Dells and the Bad Lands of South Dakota. The phase of the journey let them see some of the fine corn land and dairy herds of the great midwest. At Mitchell, S. D., they visited the Corn Palace, a building of which the exterior is entirely made of corn cobs. The corn on the cob is placed in layers, and a special compound is used in cementing them together. The only objection to corn as a building material is that the birds have a habit of pecking the ears, and every spring the corn house needs a check up. New ears replace damaged ones, and workmen use all operations in the cement. The building is more or less an auditorium and is about the size of the Plymouth high school auditorium. With outstanding colors, the Corn Palace attracts many visitors from far and near, and then comes the uniqueness of a building made with corn.

After a mile or so of Rapid City, Iowa, the Browns observed lifelike animals on top of a hill. 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Graves Changes For Circulating New Petitions

With August 10th as the closing date for filing petitions for village offices, the political pot in Plymouth is becoming somewhat turbulent within the next week or so there is no doubt that sufficient petitions will be passed to cover all offices within the village.

There is a change in the method of circulating petitions this year. In previous elections it was permissible to list a complete set of officers, from mayor on down, and a list of signatures all that is necessary. This year, a single petition must be passed for each office only.

If the circulator wants a complete ticket, mayor and six councilmen, then he must carry seven petitions which must be signed individually, and ALL signatures must be from one county. However, if duplicate petitions are carried, one from Richland and one from Huron, then it will be a complete ticket.

The new system, it is not necessary to carry a petition within a petition from each county; ten can be on the Huron county petition and ten can be on the Richland county petition, in each county making a total of 25 signatures.

There is one important thing to be noted, as a circulator, the individual carrying a petition for a candidate MUST have two signatures on which the candidate must be a resident of one for Richland county, and one for Huron county. In other words, the circulator must have two petitions properly signed and sworn to if he is to be eligible to file out with five.

Loan Rate On Wheat Now Being Harvested Set At \$2.06 By AAA

The loan rate on the crop of wheat now being harvested in Richland county is \$2.06 per bushel, Guy L. Taylor, chairman of the Richland county AAA committee states.

The present market quotation for number one wheat is \$1.70 Taylor said. A loan may be obtained from the government on wheat testing 14 per cent or less in moisture and grading number three or better, or on wheat grading number four or five on test weight only.

An emergency loan equal to 75 per cent of the county loan rate will be made by the county AAA on wheat meeting minimum grade requirements. This

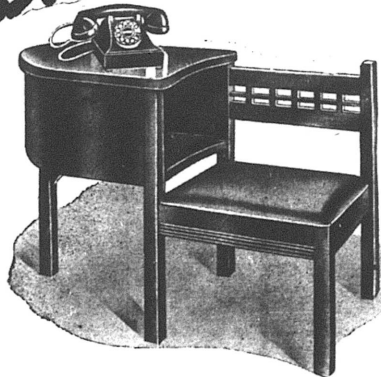

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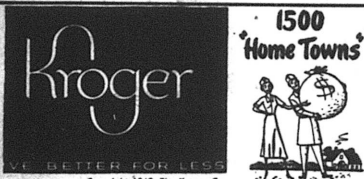

Stiff together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Combine egg, orange rind, shortening and fruit. Add egg mixture to flour and pour batter into greased 2 inch muffin cups. Bake in hot oven about 20 minutes. Serves six.

Atlanta is 120 miles southeast of Chattanooga, and we wanted to be sure of arriving there before noon as the folks were expecting us for dinner. After a most tempting meal Saturday night in Chattanooga we decided to drive a few miles before putting up for the night. We stopped at a very nice cabin south of Calhoun, Georgia, and only sixty miles out of Atlanta. We must admit that no matter how hot the day seemed the nights were always cool, and this gave us many hours of refreshing sleep. We were just a week late in coming through Marietta, Ga., for the week previous there was a gala affair celebrating the return of General Lucius Clay, who had charge of things over in Berlin until recently. The papers were filled with pictures of the parade, the General's family and many of the notables on hand for the occasion. The General's home town certainly felt nothing unholy to make his return home a most welcome one.

Sunday morning we started early enough to be sure that we'd arrive in Atlanta in time for dinner, and after being on the road two days I was ready for a real home-cooked meal. Pulling up in front of my sister's home it is needless to say that all my kith and kin were on hand to greet us. We dropped preliminaries of all kinds and made a rush for the dinner table.

Perhaps I'm a little selfish, but when I advised my sister that we would arrive in time for Sunday dinner, I didn't overlook telling her to ask "Minnie," the colored maid to prepare a menu of the things I liked most, which included spring chicken, friend southern style, hot biscuits, rice,

eyed peas, butter beans and rice, hot butter, but and jelly with plenty of feed tea and coffee. We finished up with a "special" which Minnie prepared just for the writer—a large peach cobbler pie, made of peaches fresh from the tree. We wound up the meal by partaking of ice cold watermelon.

After dinner Sunday, we took a ride over a portion of Atlanta, including a visit to College park, a suburb, and a visit to the municipal airport. At the airport we found facilities wonderful in every way. Unlike the Cleveland airport accommodations are made for visitors to go right up to the landing strips where Eastern Airlines huge Constellation planes land and take-off. More than 125 planes land and take off daily, and there are some eight airlines using the field. The waiting room has about everything one could wish for, and the attendants are unusually polite and courteous.

Well-kept Golf Greens
Time and space simply forbid us from describing every golf course, parks and drives which are found throughout the city.

We thought of Bill Juntz, Johnny and Jim Root, Pudge Miller and other local links as well as over the huge links of the Piedmont Country club, and the links at the Capitol City club, and at North Fulton park. We don't play golf, but from Atlanta fans, we learned that they are among the finest in the country. We stayed about two blocks from Piedmont park, where there are swimming pools, playgrounds, golf, soft ball, baseball, and many other facilities for entertainment. The grounds are well kept and there doesn't seem to be as much destruction of property of any kind, such as found in other metropolitan cities.

Our visit in Atlanta was made unusually pleasant inasmuch as we had plenty of chauffeurs in the family and quite a number of autos at our disposal. Each day, morning and afternoon, Mrs. Thomas and I were taken on sightseeing tours, and we never completely covered the city. We went to Emory university which is one of the best in the south, and I have to say that the beauty. Many of the buildings are made of Georgia marble, located in natural settings and surrounded by trees and shrubs of many kinds. Magnolia trees, mimosa trees, crepe myrtle, and pines predominate in all the campuses. These trees and many varieties of shrubs and hedges are used in the yards and on the streets of every home in Atlanta. The soil is red, and we marveled at the grass and plants growing in it. The lawns are thoroughly covered with robes of light and dark green grass, and around most homes the terrain is usually sloping away from the house, or there is a valley or ravine which spreads forth covered with grass

and shrubs and trees. The tours over the northside of the city were exceptionally interesting, and there are thousands of homes of the wealthy which make you feel that you're in a land of paradise as you drive past them.

We passed one huge estate around which a high concrete wall had been built. Vision into any portion of the yard was impossible, and this seemed a bit strange as the surrounding estates were open and the homes could be seen from any angle. We are told that the reason for constructing the fence was that the woman of the house had a yen for dancing in the nude out in the yard, and in order to let her continue this practice, the fence was built. She must have been a mighty pretty woman.

Atlanta doesn't get the admiration it deserves from the average tourist for a check reveals that the national highways are directed through the industrial and poorer part of the city. We took daily drives throughout the residential sections, and we do not hesitate to say that its cleanliness and beauty cannot be superceded

by any other metropolitan city, including Cleveland.

Two points of interest which we visited were the residence of Margaret Mitchell, the author of "Gone With the Wind," which is located just a few blocks from where we visited, and the home of Joel Chandler Harris, author of the "Uncle Remus" stories. These are cherished sites to Atlantians, and everyone always likes to speak of these places. It was very interesting Monday afternoon on our visit to Stone Mountain where crowds had gathered for a Fourth of July picnic. There were several colored people over on the east side of the mountain and it was a real scene to watch them open up watermelons and do a good job of cleaning the rinds.

I was somewhat amused as I observed people passing to and fro to see a stalwart girl girdling a pine in her bare feet. There wasn't any sand or clay, but just plain stone upon which she walked. But she didn't flinch even when she stepped on the larger stones with sharp edges.

Entrance Age To Scouting IS Lowered

Entrance age to Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting and Senior Scouting has been lowered, announcement was made at the National Council meeting of the Boy Scouts of America held in Boston in May. The age of admission to Cub Scouting will be lowered to eight, admission to Boy Scouting to eleven and admission to Senior Scouting to fourteen years of age. These changes will go into effect on September 1, 1949.

Cub Scouts who are eight years old may earn the Wolf rank, nine-year-olds the Bear rank and ten-year-olds the Lion, and in the last half of the tenth year, they may earn the Webelos rank. Present Cub Scouts will be permitted to complete their Wolf and Bear ranks in their ninth year, their Bear rank in their tenth year, and their Webelos rank in their eleventh year.

Under the new plan, boys eligible to join a Boy Scout Troop or Cub Scouts who are now eleven years of age and wish to complete the Webelos rank will be allowed a reasonable time. They may complete the Webelos rank in the troop if they wish to do so.

A new Senior Scout program to be known as Exploring will also go into effect on September 1, 1949. This will replace the present Senior Scout program. It will be broad enough to include land, sea and air activities as well as life exploration.

Those troops which specialize in seamanship or in aviation will be registered as Explorer ships or Explorer Squadrons respectively. Explorers may remain with the Boy Scout Troop as an Explorer Crew and carry on the Explorer program with all of its privileges.

The changes of age of admission provides an opportunity to greatly increase the number of boys served by Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting and Exploring. This greatly increased number of boys going into the Scouting programs will require more men as Scoutmaster leaders. If you would like to serve in some capacity in Scouting, please contact Mr. Wayne Carleton, Shelby District Chairman at 32 Auburn, Shelby, Ohio.

Slums Congress

By Congressman Wm. Lemke

It's in the air - slum clearance. The housing bill just passed by the House will clear many slums, if any. Let us make this clear that under this bill, the Government will build second class slums with the taxpayers' money, and the real slums will increase faster than they can be built.

Buildings as a rule do not make slums. People who have not been taught cleanliness or a desire for living in decent quarters make the slums. Grafters and unscrupulous landlords supply the slums. These have in the past made profits, without any effort, in maintaining slums and dives. There is hope, however. The public conscience is awakening. Slums have no business in America. They should be outlawed.

There isn't a city in the Union that hasn't ample power to outlaw and condemn slums and dives. These cancers on the public that infect our cities and towns must be weeded out - cut out of the body politic.

Labor unions, churches, schools, parent-teachers associations and social and condemn slums and dives. There is hope, however. The public conscience is awakening. Slums have no business in America. They should be outlawed.

Under this authority, Baltimore

has condemned buildings that do not have modern conveniences and that have become an eyesore. It has given the owners, who the Government have made huge profits out of renting these slums and dives, an opportunity to remodel and repair them, and to supply these dwellings with running water and electricity. If the proprietors fail to do this, the city condemns the buildings as a nuisance.

Other cities, I am sure, will follow Baltimore's example and in a very short time the public conscience, with the aid of the above organizations, will clean up our slums. I feel that the Federal Government should assist financially in seeing that these eyesores are removed, but it should only do it with the full and complete cooperation of the city. The city should take the first step by condemning insanitary buildings and eyesores.
