

## 200 Area Scouts Will Meet Here Sunday For 'Round Up'

Approximately three hundred Cub Scouts, Scouts and Explorer Scouts and their parents and friends will meet in Mary Faye park Sunday afternoon to hold the first Shelby District "ROUND UP." Packs and Troops from both Shelby and Plymouth will participate.

At this time, in conjunction with the new age requirements now in effect in the Boy Scout program, youths from 8 through 10 will be taken in Cub Scout Packs. Boys from 11 through 13 will be taken in the Boy Scout Troops, youths 14 and over will be taken in the Explorer groups. At the same time Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts will be graduated if they are 11 or 14 into their respective groups.

Area Commissioners from Mansfield will be in charge of this part of the program and it promises to be one of the largest gatherings of Cubs and Scouts to have ever assembled at one time in the Shelby District.

The afternoon will start with soft ball games, two at a time, between the Troops in this district and the Packs in the District. The winner in each division will be given an award, in addition to a new soft ball as a memento of the occasion.

Immediately following the soft ball games, at 5:00 p. m., the "Round Up" ceremony will be held with all local Scouts and Cubs participating.

At the completion of the "Round Up" there will be a pot-luck supper. Each family is asked to bring their own table service, a covered dish and sandwiches if they so desire. Soft drinks and ice cream will be furnished by the District Committee.

## Plan New Water Line

Bids are being asked for an additional water feeder line this week by the Board of Public Affairs.

The new line will run from the pumping station east to the water main on Sandusky street. At the time the water pumping station was constructed there was only one main line placed to take water to the tower. This line has been in constant use, luckily, with no interference or break-down.

The Board has felt for many years as a precautionary measure that an additional line should be placed. The state health department has also suggested at various times an additional main to the tower. The new service line will be an additional circulation to water mains on Sandusky street, and at the same time be a safeguard against any emergency that might arise.

The bid call for a six-inch main to be laid for a distance of approximately 160 feet and to tie in with the water line on Sandusky street. The new line will have to go under the Baltimore & Ohio tracks. Cost of the improvement is estimated by Consulting Engineer Blosser at \$6,000. Finances for the extension are secured through revenue bonds, and do not affect the tax rate of the village or property owners.

Work on the Willo-Root addition which includes a 4-inch water main, and an extension to the Lysle Grabach and James Root properties east of the river, will begin shortly. The Grabach-Root line will be laid this week-end. Messrs. Root and Grabach have financed the two-inch water line to the homes and the board has agreed to supervise construction.

With the two new water lines in operation several sites in the north end of town will become suitable for building.

## DOINGS IN CONGRESS

General Vaughan has had his tussle with the Senate investigating committee. He was called upon to explain his connection with the five percenters. The General was asked why and how he became so closely associated with these financial and political manipulators — the manipulators that are all mixed up with deep freezers, perfumes, race tracks, income tax, petty graft and political favoritism. It is not a pretty picture and a picture of which our Nation ought to be ashamed. It is the result of one administration in power too long.

On the other hand, the people themselves are largely responsible. They have become accustomed to political graft. In fact, they knowingly condone it. Often they support politicians who have no shame — politicians that are total strangers to the truth, and have the gall of a Government mule — who know the five percent racket from A to Z.

Those of us who have struggled for a higher standard of public morals are amazed at this indifference. We are reminded of the Roman orator when he exclaimed, "Oh the times, oh the morals!" We wonder how much longer it will be before the pendulum will return. The things that are going on today would have shocked the Nation from ocean to ocean just a few short years ago. Now they are passed with nothing more than a shrug of the shoulders.

Even our schools and churches have ceased to protest, and silently frown upon graft. They no longer point at the five percenters and other wrongdoers with the finger of scorn. There are many political abuses besides the five percenters. We now have hundreds and thousands of Americans gallivanting around in Europe, in China and in Asia at the taxpayers' expense. We have thousands of educators and politicians trying to reform the morals of other people rather than to correct our own.

You cannot take a train but what you will bump into two or three individuals that are either on their way to Europe or Asia, or are returning at Uncle Sam's expense. These are not connected with the military establishments, but are civilians traveling on passports from the various Departments of Government and at the taxpayers' expense.

There is even abuse by Congressional delegations. Undoubtedly some of the trips are justifiable and in the best interest of the Nation. These are the delegations that have a mission to perform — to get first hand knowledge. However, some of these are just political junkets. The Members would serve a better purpose if they would remain at home and get acquainted with their own country. It is not proper for Members of Congress to join these junkets, at the expense of the taxpayers, for personal pleasure.

## SCHOOL TIME...

There is a half-century new school building in the village of Brunswick in Medina county. For months, as I have driven by on U.S. Route 42, I have wondered why construction work was so standstill. Curiosity finally got the better of me. I stopped one day recently to find out. Here's the story:

The folks in Brunswick voted three years ago to construct the building in order to handle the additional youngsters crowding into the lower grades. They voted and issued more than \$125,000 worth of bonds. Then, with the building half-completed, the Brunswick people ran out of money. They found that it just costs a lot more money to build school buildings, and all buildings, than it did several years ago. Now they are considering an additional bond issue for \$65,000 to raise enough money to finish their building.

Only experts can tell exactly how much a new building will finally cost when the plans are still on the drawing boards. They tell me that the rule of thumb used to be "35 cents a cubic foot." A reasonable idea of the cost was determined by multiplying the number of cubic feet in the proposed building by 35 cents.

During the war some architects, to be on the safe side, began to use 50 cents as a rough guide. Since the war it has jumped to 75, 85, and now it is 85 to \$1.00 per cubic foot. Schoolmen tell me that the same kind of building you could put up for \$100,000 back in 1940 will cost \$250,000 or more today.

I find that lots of communities are in the same fix as the citizens of Brunswick. They just can't find the money to build the kind of school buildings they need with the money which can be raised from taxes. There are other buildings either partly finished or still on the drawing boards. Some communities are resorting to "temporary" portable buildings.

But this really is not a temporary situation. Our population is expanding. The census bureau says that we have one-fourth more married couples than in 1940. As Al Johnson says, "We ain't seen a thing yet." They tell me that there will be as many youngsters in the elementary grades alone by 1953 as we have in the whole Ohio school system today.

So this means a larger school system and more buildings in practically every community. There's probably a building problem in town.

It might help you to understand what's going on if you'd go by and visit your school. The teachers, the PTA, and the school board are going to need your interest and your

The Richland Township is sponsoring the Richland group for which William Wolford, Mansfield, R. D. 2, will act as counselor.

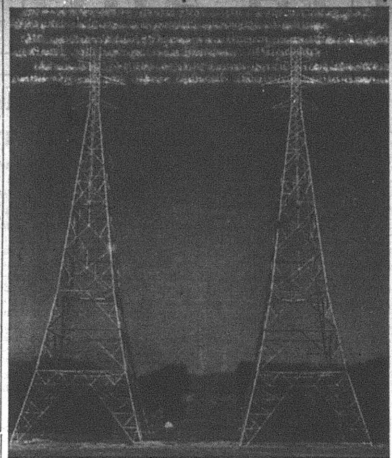

## Ohio Power Erects "Super Towers" Near Pomeroy



Towers as high as a 20-story building support high-voltage lines that soon will carry electricity to customers of The Ohio Power Co. These towers, erected at the new \$10,000,000 Philip Sporn Plant, near Pomeroy, are the tallest transmission structures used to supply electricity anywhere in Ohio.

The twin "super-towers" (see photo), located on bottom land on West Virginia side of the Ohio River, are 240 feet high. In contrast, Niagara Falls at its highest fall is only 175 feet high. Most transmission towers used throughout the United States today are only 100 feet high.

The unusual height of the towers is necessary to support two 132,000 volt circuits stretching almost half a mile (2,400 feet) across the river. This span is half again as long as the channel span of the Brooklyn Bridge, which extends 1,600 feet over the East River.

The towers must be tall enough so that the "sag" of the lines can-

not interfere with river navigation. At their lowest point in mid-stream, the steel-reinforced aluminum cables are more than 70 feet above the water. The line's river crossing at Sporn Plant, although requiring higher towers, is about 600 feet shorter than another Ohio Power river crossing several miles west of Pomeroy. That 3,000-foot crossing is made by the 132,000 volt line connecting Philo Plant (near Zanesville) and a substation in West Virginia. There, however, the towers are set on cliffs overlooking the river, thus eliminating the need for higher construction.

When the first of four 184,000-hp. generating units at Sporn Plant goes into service early next month, the new river crossing lines will carry electricity to the 555 communities served by Ohio Power. The other three units are expected to begin operation in June 1950 and March and July, 1952, respectively. All four units will make 736,000 additional horsepower available for the increasing demands of industrial, commercial, farm and domestic users.

These new lines and two others emanating from Sporn Plant will transmit the plant's output of electricity to strategic tie-in points on a transmission network covering seven states, served by affiliate companies of the American Gas & Electric Co. Sporn Plant is jointly owned by two of these affiliates, Ohio Power and the Appalachian Electric Power Company.

## Sheep Day At Wooster Announced

With economic factors more favorable to lamb and wool production than any time during or since the war period, farmer-interest in a flock of sheep is increasing rapidly, says D. S. Bell, in charge of sheep investigations at the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, announcing a Special Sheep Day to be held at Wooster, September 23. The program begins at 10:00 E.S. T.

On recent buying trips over the state in search of some yearling ewes, one farmer summarized his attitude toward sheep by saying, "even though you offered me \$50 a head, mine are not for sale." In another case a farmer who owned a nice flock of cross-bred yearling ewes was pressed by a prospective buyer to quote a price. As a means of saying "no," a price of 35 dollars was quoted whereupon the buyer pulled his book and wrote the check and a sheep sale was completed. These incidents, continues Bell, not only reflect the value placed on sheep by those who own them and those who want them for grassland farming but they indirectly reflect the serious depletion in number which comes about now as a result of war-time liquidations.

Western type ewes have long been popular with farmers. The western areas suffer the same depletion in number, however, and the question is one of producing the kind. Can Ohio produce a western-type ewe? Will this native grown western type produce as well as the western ewe? The answer according to recent tests at the Experiment Station is YES, as those who attend the Sheep Day can see and hear for themselves. In producing this type, a new use is found for the Merion, long popular in the hilly areas of south-eastern Ohio. To breed the ewes added to Ohio's sheep population will give added impetus to purchased ram sales. The results of the research make it appear that a self-sustained industry can be built within Ohio to meet the farmer's need under the rising grassland agriculture.

The above is only one of the many features included in the full program for the Special Sheep Day. The event is sponsored jointly by the Experiment Station, the Agricultural Extension Service, and the Buckeye Sheep Association and its affiliated organizations. Those farmers who own sheep, and those who are beginning to feel that maybe they ought to own some, should find something of interest at Wooster on September 23rd, concludes Bell.

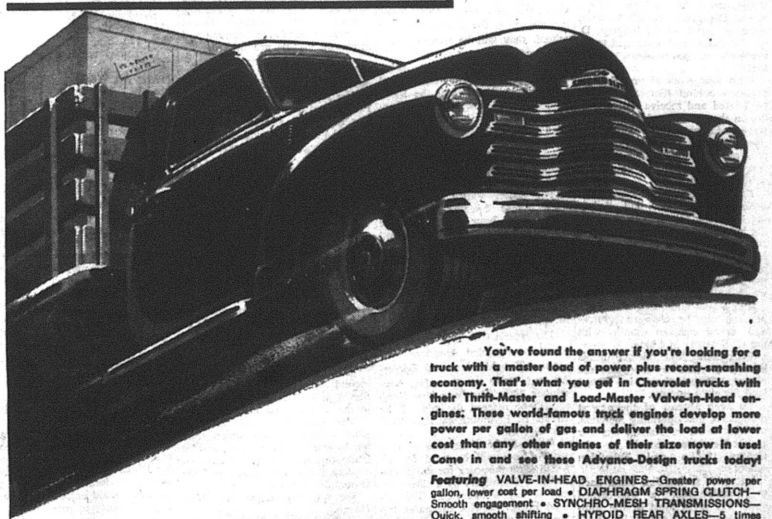

## Group Holds First Field Day At New Experimental Station in Celeryville

The Celeryville Muck growers, the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station and the Agricultural Extension Service cooperated to make possible the Field Day that has ever been held at the new Experiment Station, at Celeryville, in Huron County. Muck growers from several other counties attended to get up-to-date information on the experiments now being run by specialists at Celeryville.

Mr. John K. Wells, County Agent of Huron County, acted as chairman of the Field Day and introduced Dr. E. K. Alban, of the Department of Horticulture, who started off the afternoon's program by relating the results of weed control experiments.

## Many Specialists Speak Here

The group attending the Field Day received a lot of valuable information from Dr. J. D. Wilson, Associate in Botany and Plant Pathology, and Dr. J. P. Slessman, of the Department of Entomology, in the results obtained with the use of the new fungicides and insecticides. Dr. Wilson stated that DDT is still proving to be one of the most economical and practical insecticides on the market. The onion experiments regarding thrip and tip burn were complete and the results showed that yields could be increased by 40% by the use of sprays to control these insects. Muck growers at Celeryville who had the opportunity to watch these tests throughout the summer expressed their appreciation many times on the value they are receiving by having an Experiment Station working with Muck crops.

Dr. Francis E. Johnstone, Jr. of the Department of Horticulture, displayed several varieties of celery now under test. He stated that Ohio growers need a celery variety to compete with the shipped in California celery. The development of a new variety will take a number of years in order to carry out a thorough study on the number of stalks per bunch, wilt after pulling, and attractiveness to the consumer.

One of the interesting events of the afternoon occurred when Mr. Wells introduced Anton Rookmaker, who spoke to the muck growers in Dutch. Mr. Rookmaker is one of the Dutch farmers now receiving practical experience on the Fred Albright farm in Huron County.

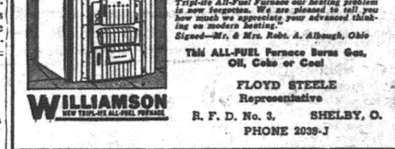

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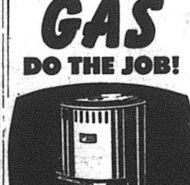

## Quaker Miller To Speak At Willard Sunday

Perry Hayden, the "Quaker Miller" of Tecumseh, Michigan, who planted a cubic inch of wheat in 1940 that fed thousands of starving people in Europe in 1946, and

with Henry Ford thus staged the most dramatic timing experiment in history, will speak and show his famous color sound movie "God Is My Landlord" Sunday evening, Sept. 18 at the Grace Methodist church in Willard, Ohio at 7:30.

Mr. Hayden will also conduct a "Stewardship Clinic" in the 9:30 Sunday School hour and speak in the 10:30 worship service at the same church.

Mr. Hayden, inspired by a sermon in his local Quaker church, September 22, 1940, based on the text John 12:24, decided to "take God at His word and see what would happen." Plenty did happen.

That very week he planted one cubic inch of wheat on a tiny plot of ground furnished by Henry Ford. The 1941 harvest of one quart was cut by sickle, the wheat heads cut off by scissars, and the wheat threshed by lung power by members of his family. A title of the crop was paid to Hayden's appear and the remaining 90% replanted.

Successfully for the next five years, harvesting was done by cradle, reaper, binder and combine, with the crop growing so fast that by 1946 the 2,666 acres needed for the project required the land of 276 cooperating farmers of all faiths and creeds. The total crop was 72,150 bushels of wheat, worth nearly \$150,000.

Robert Ripley in "Believe It or Not" stated that "if this project were continued for ten years it would require all of the land in the United States, and in thirteen years would cover the whole globe."

"God Is My Landlord" is a color sound film, requiring seven years to produce. Henry Ford, Captain Eddie Rickbacker, R. G. LeTourneau, Dr. Walter A. Maier, James L. Kraft, and others, appear and speak in the picture which is both educational and inspiring.

Perry Hayden, President of Hayden Flour Mills, Inc. of Tecumseh, Michigan, is a dynamic speaker himself, and has shown the picture from coast to coast, and in Mexico and Canada. There is no admission cost, the public is invited.

## DIGESTS OF OHIO

HUNTING LAWS AVAILABLE OCTOBER 1st

Hunters who have already purchased new hunting licenses which became effective September 1st and disturbed over not receiving digests of the hunting and trapping regulations are advised this week that the digests will be available from license agents and Division of Wildlife field men around October 1st.

Due to the Wildlife Council's preference of determining as accurately as possible the game population surveys, just completed, reveal before setting the regulations, the printing of the digests was delayed. Although the delay may cause some inconvenience to the early license buyers, hunters

will benefit generally with regulations which correspond more nearly to actual game conditions in the field thereby safeguarding the continuance of public hunting. Because of the more abundant game population indicated by the surveys this year, hunters will enjoy more liberal regulations.

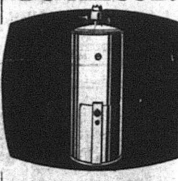
