Facts About Our School Enrollment

The largest class in the school is the second grade with 50 youngsters. The second largest is the third grade with 48. The class with the smallest enrollment is the eleventh grade with 24.

A look in the future two years indicates that the high school will have in it a capacity crowd of 208. In five years there will be 239. The elementary school enrollment now is 233. The census indicates that there will be classes coming to the school in the next four years as follows: 1951-38; 1952-37; 1953-54; 1954-57. When this group of youngsters are in school the enrollment of the elementary school will be 265.

During the past six weeks the ninth grade had the highest percent of attendance with 98.8. The first grade was low with 94.5. The high school had its greatest number of absences Oct. 23 with 21 not reporting for classes. For the six week period ending Oct. 13, 208 of the pupils were not absent or tardy.

The present school enrollment is 421. Five years ago it was 384. Four years ago the enrollment was 383. Four years hence will be 492.

Let's get to the truth of the charges made by Mr. Sobers and The Ohio Education Association, against Representative Peirce. Report says:

Peirce voted against all O. E. A. bills—Misstatement - - No. 1. Peirce voted against sick leave benefits for teachers—Misstatement - - No. 2. Peirce voted against bill for equalization of tax assessments—Misstatement - - No. 3. Now let's look at the record:

House Bill - 267 provides "that full time employees of boards of education, be allowed up to five days sick leave annually, without loss of compensation." Vote taken, May 18, 1949 - Page 950 of the House Journal. For - 109, against - 2. Peirce name recorded as voting YES.

House Bill 644, "to equalize the real property valuation within the state, for the purpose of taxation." Vote taken June 21, 1949, Page 1312 of the Journal. For - 90, against - 29. Peirce name recorded as voting YES.

The present democratic controlled administration has failed to pass a single bill for financial benefit of the public schools. Passing only O.E.A. bills which have forced local school districts to vote themselves deeper into debt. Thus placing the burden of support on home owners and tax payers.

I plead guilty to voting against these measures. It is deplorable to think, that so fine an organization as the O. E. A., which has accomplished so much for the teachers and public schools would lend itself to misstatements.

To make clear to the teachers and the public at large, I wish to state: In my five terms in the Legislature, I have voted with the O. E. A. for every bill for salaries and financial aid to the public schools. Even going so far in the session of 1945 as to vote to over-ride the governor's veto.

In my voting, I endeavor to be ever mindful that I represent ALL the people of Huron County, regardless of party affiliations.

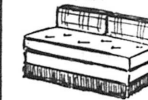

WHY I JOINED

THE CIVIC CLUB

SHILOH, OHIO

Monday night while enjoying the parade I heard Dave Hughes announce that the Civic Club would like some more members.

The night I had called on the Civic Club they had called a Community Meeting last summer to try to "do something for the good of the Community." I, of course, did nothing about it, not even attending the meeting. I thought "What's wrong with the Community?" It was alright so far as I could see.

But somehow, no thanks to me, they managed to set up a program and a part of it was witnessed on Monday night.

It seems that some of the signs announcing the name of the town of the corporation lines had been removed as a test to determine whether or not people could find the place without them. They did, and in fact more people found the town than when the signs were up.

So there was "Main Street, America," extending East to Route 13, west to Spring Mill Road, North to the County Line and South to Ganges Bridge and London. They came from the entire Community and from surrounding towns as well, and I saw no evidence of disappointment. You can usually tell when people are just curious or bored. But not Monday night! This was opportunity night. The Civic Club had given the younger generation an opportunity to present its case about the School Bond Issue and they did it well with signs and floats.

Suddenly one realized that they were also presenting the case of the whole Community. Here was the Future of the Community marching and riding before us to the music of the school band. Here was our pride and our hopes mingled together to mean what every Community needs—solid agreement on the things that are for the public good.

We sometimes feel that our children have so much more than we did but when we realize how much more they need it all adds up to not enough. The one thing that is one can ever take from them is education, but it can be kept from them. And when we consider the cost of having to send them out of the Community to be educated it is a frightening prospect for future property values.

So anything spent to add to or improve our local school is a sound investment in the future of the Community. This Monday night, if weather had been bad, would have been held in the school auditorium—the center of our Community Life.

It is like a man told me Monday night. He said he learned in that any of its parts. He didn't think so much about it at the time but in later years has come to realize that it means more things. "Take for instance," he says, "this whole Community is greater than any of its parts and I'd be pretty small if I didn't feel that something good for the Community as a school that a whole is greater than the whole is also good for me. And a good school is like good roads or electricity—the closer they are to you the better. It makes you a larger part of the whole because your property is worth more and your living is better. It makes you a larger part of the whole because your property is worth more and your living is better."

Believe he had something there. When you stop to think of it your property would depreciate in value without a good local school many times more than the amount of tax increase.

Education is something that cannot be postponed and is much cheaper on a pay-as-you-go basis. A vote for the School Bond Issue next Tuesday is a vote for the general good of the whole Community—and that is important to everyone.

My membership in the Civic Club is a recognition for its reminding me Monday night that ours is a Community to be proud of and that neither the Community nor its school are to be just taken for granted.

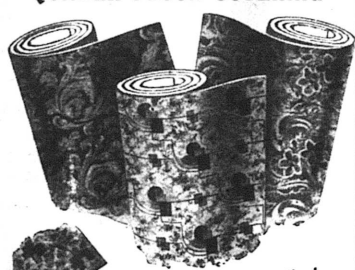

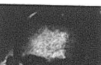

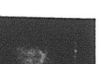
