## Heariest Snow In Years Blankets State

All northern Ohio is still struggling from one of the worst snow storms in 57 years which hit the state over the week-end. According to news dispatches emanating from Cleveland that city is still fighting hazardous traffic conditions. Tuesday Cleveland's mayor ordered 150 firemen to assist the police and only those motorists on emergency trips were allowed to use the highways.

The storm area covered the entire state, and at the height of the storm on Saturday, more than 22,000 automobiles were stalled on highways over the state. Emergency services were called in the larger cities of the state, with Cleveland suffering severely from the intense snow fall. Highway workers with snow removal equipment were kept busy day and night trying to keep the main roads open.

The only lucky thing about the storm for the state is that there was no wind, which cut down the possibility of high snowdrifts. Despite the calmness that prevailed there were a few drifts reported over the state.

Train, bus and plane transportation was at a halt over the week-end and Monday morning. The state halted except those that tried to get through the highways with bread and milk and foodstuffs. While most of the main roads of the state are open, travel remains hazardous.

Grocery stores were running out of bread and milk by mid-afternoon, and householders started buying dry yeast and boxed roll and muffin mixes, anticipating a shortage of bread. The deep snow made a heavy demand for overhauls and rubbers, and Cashman's Shoe Store, the only place this merchandise could be bought in Plymouth, was crowded Friday and Saturday, and up through Tuesday noon, when the supply of overhauls and rubbers ran out. Customers had to be turned away. However, Mr. Cashman expects a big shipment in Thursday or Friday of this week.

Practically all the stores in Plymouth are doing a good business, even while the storm is still going on, and this is as late as Wednesday afternoon. Merchants state that the buying is possibly due to the fact that rural residents are finding roads to Plymouth a bit more open, and a short distance to other towns. And there are those who are wanting to get their Christmas shopping done early, and are finding that the local stores are supplying their demands and wants.

Schools Are Closed Plymouth schools, as well as many rural schools, will be closed for the week-end. The schools remained closed from Monday up to Thursday. Plymouth schools did operate on Tuesday until 2:00 o'clock. In place of the snow, the children went to ski, sleds and building "snowmen." The big snow is the answer to the wish of many youngsters, who are really taking advantage of the fun it affords.

Many Plants Close While Cleveland and surrounding territory suffered mostly from the storm which closed practically all stores and plants in that area, Plymouth's local manufacturing concern, The Fate-Roll-Heath Co., operated over the week-end and Monday at about 85 percent of capacity, according to James Root, personnel manager. The plant employs around 350 and most of the employees have to travel several miles to their work.

There are tons and tons of snow on the Shiloh Road, even though it started falling Friday as the "stuff" began to fall. Chief of Police and Street Commissioner Robert Meiser and his crew of workmen kept the curb, keeping traffic and walkways through the Square open. While many truckloads have been "leaved away, there remain "mountain ranges" of the white glistening snow which make appropriate decorations for the Christmas holidays. The snow this year came for most of the populace who always want a "White Christmas."

Unfavorable Despite the ten-inch snow, which was reported for the week-end by Plymouth's weather observer, John Root, the weather man's prediction that the report was "ten inches of snow" was not far from the mark. "Many of the 'old-timers' have been recalling heavy snow falls that have occurred but most were for the week-end. That another five or six-inch snow will cause undue hardships. ## Sign The Petition To Help Schools

## "RELIGION IN THE NEWS" DISCUSSED BY 20TH CENTURY CIRCLE LEADERS

There were twenty present for the meeting of the Twentieth Century Circle, which was held on Monday evening, at the home of Mrs. Belle Bachrach.

After the regular business had been taken care of, Mrs. Anderson, the president, turned the meeting over to the leaders of the evening. Mrs. Edna Smith's topic was Nehru. She said that Nehru was the most prominent political figure in India and that he belonged to the Brahman caste, the highest caste Hindu religion. 97% of people of India belong to the untouchable or lower caste. As a young man he attended school in England. His father wanted him to be a lawyer, however when in 1916 he returned to India he fell under the influence of Mahatma Gandhi and became a revolutionary politician. He calls himself a Democrat and a Socialist, but with a little persuasion he could turn into a Dictator. Nehru lives with simplicity and leads a very busy life.

The topic of Mrs. Nimmons, who was not able to be present was New Israel and was given by Mrs. Marian Cashman. She said that New Israel, a country about the size of Connecticut was established in 1948. Immediately fighting started among the Arabs and the Jewish people. She said that Dr. Ralph J. Bunche of the U. S. A. was responsible for the peace in the near East. Every month new citizens are coming from many lands to live in New Israel. Jerusalem was really two cities now, Jews living in the new part and Arabs living in old part.

New Israel is trying to become a self-supporting country. Help mainly comes from U. S. A. She

also reviewed the life of Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, who has received the Nobel prize this year for his part in bringing peace between the Arabs and the Jews.

Mrs. Cordelia John's topic was a Hymn of Thanksgiving. She said the Rev. Martin Rinkart who died in 1649 wrote about sixty-six hymns. A few appeared in German hymnals but one found universal acceptance both in Germany and in English-speaking countries. This hymn is "Now Thank We All Our God." It was originally a short grace before meals. Today it is used every Sunday in Anglican, Episcopal, Lutheran and whatever churches follow a liturgy. These origins show that the impulse to thank and praise whatever Gods there be, whether it be the one God of the Jews, or the Trinitarian God of the Apostolic church tradition, is instinctive and universal.

AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING THAT IT IS NECESSARY THAT THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, PROVIDE FOR THE WATER PLANT, AUTHORIZING THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS TO EXPEND MONEY TO ADVERTISE FOR BIDS, AND ENTER INTO CONTRACT THEREFOR, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, STATE OF OHIO:

SECTION 1. That it is deemed necessary to purchase a year's supply of water softening salt for the year 1951 for the use of the Village water softener at the Water Plant. That the entire cost of this purchase is to be paid solely from the Water Fund. Said entire cost authorized by this ordinance shall not exceed \$10,000.

SECTION 2. That the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs and the Village Clerk be and they are hereby authorized and directed to advertise for bids for the purchase of said salt, and that the Village Clerk and the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs be and they are hereby authorized to open any and all sealed proposals to said advertisement and to enter into a contract with the lowest and best bidder or bidders, as provided by law, for the purchase of said salt.

SECTION 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law. Passed Nov. 7, 1950. WHITNEY J. BRIGGS, President of Council. Attest: D. G. CUNNINGHAM, Clerk.

ORDINANCE NO. 215  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, PROVIDING FOR SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION OF \$5,000 FOR THE CEMETERY FUND, AND AUTHORIZING THE TRANSFER OF THE SAME FROM THE GENERAL FUND OF THE VILLAGE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE VILLAGE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1: The sum of \$5,000.00 is hereby appropriated from the General Fund of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, for the Cemetery Fund, and the Clerk and Treasurer are hereby authorized to make said transfer.

SECTION 2: This ordinance is an immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety and shall go into effect immediately.
