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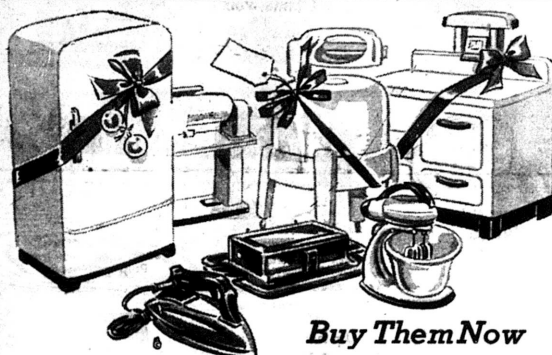

PIGRIMS FAIL TO BELLEVUE 48-41

A 17 point outburst in the first quarter enabled the Bellevue Bluejays to win a 48-41 decision from the Plymouth Pilgrims in a Richland County League game played on the Bluejays' hardwood last Friday evening. It was the first loop tilt for both teams and made the Pilgrims record on the season stand at 0-3 in games won and lost while the host club extended its record at 1-1.

With the Pilgrims behind 17-4 at the outset of the second quarter, the visitors went to work and with Louie Root hitting for six points the local club had narrowed the host club's advantage at halftime to a 26-18 count.

SOCIETY-CLUB NEWS

Plymouth's "Doll Lady" Exhibits Her Hobby To Twentieth Century Circle

Dolls and Christmas being almost synonymous, an unusual program for the Christmas party of the Twentieth Century Circle was arranged for Tuesday evening.

Mrs. E. L. Earnest as hostess had informed all members to be ready at 7 o'clock when a car would call for them and take them to the "secret" meeting place. The destination was the country home of Mrs. Walter Chatfield of the Shiloh Road, and the program was on "Dolls," a hobby of Mrs. Chatfield.

Before Mrs. Chatfield spoke on her hobby, Mrs. S. C. Brown read a short story on the "Little Star," Mrs. R. C. McBeth read "Why the Chimes Rang" and Mrs. Brown again read "The Old Rag Doll."

Mrs. Chatfield who could easily be described as the "Doll Lady" has devoted the past eleven years to her hobby and now has a collection of eighty-five dolls, which includes a prized German bisque (china not glazed) doll, a 100-year-old pink luster one, a 70-year-old bonnet doll, a 65-year-old doll with ears pierced for ear rings and an American doll with buckskin body, paper mache head, wooden hands and feet and is indestructible as it has no strings. It is 120 years old.

Dolls, as we think of dolls today, were not always playthings. They date back some 4000 years and were not always pretty. There were the ancestry dolls, the fetish dolls and those used in religious rites. Only after being discarded did the children have them. The Eskimo have the oldest known doll. The European doll dates back to 1627 and was first brought to America in 1914. As far back as 1883, the Goodyear Company made rubber dolls. During the period from the 5th to the 12th Century there were no dolls but in the 17th Century the French doll was used for styling purposes.

The doll hobby is fifth in import-

ance and Mrs. Chatfield's oldest doll dates back to 1830 or 120 years old.

Each doll is dressed by Mrs. Chatfield in the period of its age and as near as possible to the original style and each doll is stood on a standard made by Mr. Chatfield. Some have been repaired by experts and some bodies made and stuffed by her with hands and feet furnished by antique shops of the same style doll.

"In olden days only woman dolls were made. Mrs. Chatfield explained, "children dolls are a modern trend and collector's prizes—there being only one in 50 dolls of this type with brown eyes."

In her collection, Mrs. Chatfield has numerous German dolls and one beautiful French bisque doll. Most was dolls were made in England and she possesses a number of these.

Besides her antique collection, Mrs. Chatfield has about 10 or 12 dolls which she has dressed and donated to children in Rainbow hospital in Cleveland each Christmas. She got the idea for Yule doll gifts to confined children from a newspaper appeal about 10 years ago and since then outfits them completely and takes them to the hospital where attendants distribute them to children who are deserving and more apt to give them better care. The children take the dolls home with them when discharged.

In this collection, the bride doll is outstanding and her No. 1 project. She buys material for the bride doll but the rest of the material is donated by neighbors from scraps left in making their own new dresses. Each doll, regardless of who receives it, is outfitted with hat and coat, suit and a day dress and a party dress, nightgown and slippers and a dressing gown and shoes. Her mother, Mrs. Blanche Rattenbury of Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, who visits here each

summer, does most of the knitting and crocheting for the doll's outfits, and as her Christmas gift to her daughter this year, a replica of the Olympic skater, Mary Beth Scott, was received this past week and added to her collection.

The dressing of dolls is only part of Mrs. Chatfield's Christmas preparation to enlighten Christmas for hospitalized children. She also donates stuffed animals and yarn balls which are now ready to go to Cleveland this week or next.

Mrs. Chatfield has displayed some of her dolls in various exhibits and belongs to the Cleveland Doll Club which recently held a wonderful display in that city.

Boys and men are also interested in the hobby and Mr. Chatfield encourages her in her hobby, assisting in whatever way he can. Mrs. Rexford Baxter's little boy who was visiting here from Elmira, N. Y., could understand why one particular life-like doll "doesn't say something to me."

Mrs. Chatfield purchases old magazines and delves deeply into the history of any doll which she purchases or receives, before attempting to dress it correctly, one doll in her collection taking approximately a year and a half to complete.

Miss Joy Bethel modeled the original "old time" dress from which one of the doll's dresses was copied, and following the lecture, guests were permitted to inspect the unusual and wonderful display.

After the Christmas exchange, the hostess, Mrs. Earnest and her assistants, Mrs. Brown and Mrs. McBeth served a very nice lunch with dolls as favors and the group dismissed to meet in January with Mrs. Margaritha Anderson, as hostess.

KNOW YOUR CHRISTMAS TREES

At present time the Christmas tree is "King." It becomes the center of attraction during the holiday season. The decorated Christmas tree has become the symbol of Yuletide festivities in many parts of the world.

Each year about twelve million trees are cut, neatly bundled, and shipped from the forests to American cities. The harvesting starts as early as August.

While practically all evergreens can be used for Christmas trees, some are better than others. Here are some tips about selecting a tree in your locality.

Pines make nice Christmas trees and are used when the more popular Christmas trees are not available. Lodgepole pine is a favorite in the Rocky Mountain area and scrub pine is used often in the Potomac area.

Cedars, like pines, are found in many localities. Incense cedar is used in California and northern states, while cedar is used in the East. While not a traditional tree, the cedar tree holds its foliage much longer than many other evergreens. True fir and Douglas fir needles feel soft when you grab a handful.

The Balsam Fir is the most popular Christmas tree in the East. It has a beautiful triangular shape, fairly rigid branches and dark green needles that do not fall off. The Douglas fir, perhaps the most popular Christmas tree in the West and is popular in the Rocky Mountain region. The tree is pyramidal in shape, has well-spaced branches to support ornaments and lights easily.

Spruce makes beautiful Christmas trees and are the favorite trees

of many. They are popular in the Midwest and Eastern states. Spruces make up about one-fourth of America's Christmas trees.

Hemlock trees have flexible, drooping branches and dark green needles which have a lacy effect. Because of their flexible branches, they are not as well suited for Christmas trees as other species; they make better wreaths.

Look over the trees before purchasing one to make sure you get one which will suit your needs.

Real Estate Tax

Rates Decreased

Richland County auditor Norman Wolfe has announced that thirty-one districts will have their real estate tax rates decreased next year. This reduction has been brought about by a reduction in school debts.

Rates are not uniform throughout each township because of school districts. A state levy of 20c on the thousand dollars evaluation is being levied to pay the soldier's bonus.

The county rate next year will be \$2.00 per \$1,000 valuation. The 1950 rate was \$3.10. A 20-cent reduction in the Tuberculosis hospital board retirement fund cut the rate.

Anyway it is no secret that the Continentals aren't liked here even though the USA pours millions in here each month but when most of the population has little to eat and sees the 'foreigners' having everything, what can one expect? 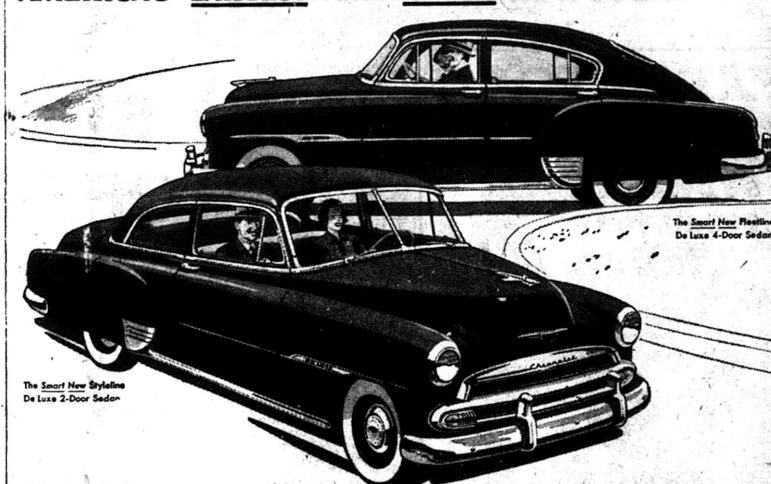

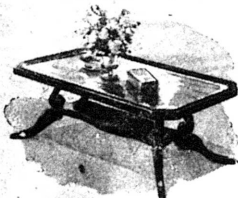
