

Boy Scouts To Hold National Jamboree

It is entirely possible that during this coming summer, three local Boy Scouts will participate in a Scouting event that will top any they will ever have a chance to participate in. The National Jamboree. More than forty thousand Scouts and Scouters from all over this country and from foreign lands, will converge in 1,088 Troops, into 4,400 Patrols.

This mass encampment will be at historic Valley Forge near Philadelphia. Scouts will come prepared to fend for themselves, living and cooking in the outdoors. They will camp by Troops, living together as Patrols.

To be entitled to attend this gigantic event a boy must be at least a Second Class Scout and two years of age prior to January 1st, 1950, he shall show evidence of Scout camping experience either in short term or summer camp.

Local scouts will receive pre-jamboree training at Avery Hand Jr. with a four day camp starting June 22nd. On the 27th they will leave Mansfield for a special train trip to the jamboree, and will be filled to the gills with enthusiastic Boy Scouts all headed for Valley Forge. By noon the following day they will be on a camp spot approximately 90-ft. square set aside for the Scouts of Johnny Appleseed Area.

Scoutmaster Ed Wilmouth will lead the group assisted by Scoutmaster, J. J. Swisher, and other area officials. Each troop will be self-contained and self-sufficient as to equipment, new tents, beds, mess gear, cooking and feeding.

Scouts will have a chance to visit other camps and boys from California, Maine, Alaska, Texas, Canada, and many other states.

Dog Tags Sales 4633 In County

As of Saturday the sale of dog tags amounted to 4633 in Huron County. Before the end of the year an additional 500 will be sold, as arrests are made for lack of tags, inspires a boost in sales in the county.

Every effort has been made by the Auditor's office to make tags available prior to January 20th, the final date to secure tags without penalty. An agency is placed in Huron County to handle tags, and a convenient mail service is offered advertised in every paper in the County. Civic Club Is Seeking Freight Receiving Post

Following a report by Mr. Moorehead, general manager of the C. C. C. trucking firm in Mansfield, at the first monthly meeting of the Shiloh Civic Club, Wednesday evening, Feb. 8, President Garrett appointed George Page, Jay Moser and Robert Boock, to seek a site for a freight receiving center in Shiloh.

Mr. Moorehead explained that his trucks make two regular weekly stops, Tuesday and Friday, in Shiloh, and if a center could be obtained where farmers and other out-of-town shippers could leave freight, the company would be glad to pick it up.

The company provides very efficient service. For example, Mr. Moorehead pointed out, a shipment picked up in Shiloh on Tuesday evening would be delivered in Detroit the following morning.

Asks Mayor To Appoint 3 For Air Supervisors

The Department of Defense in Washington has requested the governor of Ohio, along with the governors of twenty-four other states, to establish a volunteer auxiliary to the United States Air Force for the purpose of manning a civilian air warning system, such as is presently organized in ten eastern states. 775 air observer posts will be set up throughout Ohio. Each post will consist of a supervisor, a chief observer, two assistant observers and two observers.

A request has been made by the assistant general's department of Columbus, to Mayor Swanger, asking for the nomination of three

candidates for supervisor of the air observation post at Shiloh, between the ages of 35 to 55, to avoid the draft age.

All expenses in connection with operation of the warning system will be borne by the United States Air Force.

Experience developed in the ten eastern states has shown that excellent results are obtained by using from 50 to 75 per cent females in the organization of observer posts.

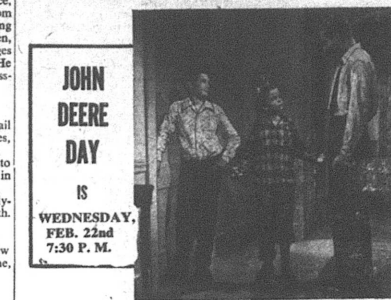

DOINGS IN CONGRESS

BY CONGRESSMAN WM. LEMKE

The farmer is again being made the goat—the shock absorber for the mistakes of the Secretaries of Agriculture from Wallace on down to Brannan. He is blamed for the disastrous results of Brannan's potato and egg program. He is now confronted with more regimentation and absurd allotments.

The Secretary now attempts to distract attention from his blunders with potatoes and eggs. He has a plan. He now, in addition to price support on non-perishables, advocates that thirty perishable farm products be sold in competition in the open market that the government pay the difference between the market price and one hundred percent parity.

The Secretary knows that Congress would never appropriate the billions required. Even if it did, then the farmer and his children would have to pay \$2.00 in taxes for every dollar they received, and the customer and his family would be compelled to pay \$2.00 for every dollar that his cost of living was reduced.

The whole agricultural problem has been fumbled by Congress under both Democratic and Republican Administrations. While both parties were chasing the will-o'-the-wisp of subsidies and price support, crop reduction allotments and regimentation, there was a bill pending that would have solved the problem permanently. This by giving the farmer cost of production for the principal agricultural products. This cost to include interest on farm indebtedness, soil depletion, depreciation of improvements, and wages for the farmer and his family equivalent to those received by industrial workers.

H. R. 1686, which I introduced, is a two price system bill. It would give the farmer the average cost of production on agricultural products domestically consumed. It would protect the family sized farm by giving the domestic market to all farmers up to \$1,000, on any one product. After that, those who produce more would get their percentage of the remainder of the domestic market.

The bill provides for the disposition of surpluses. These must be disposed of in foreign markets. It protects domestic industry and labor. It permits the processing or manufacturing of surpluses into finished products. These, however, must also be disposed of in foreign markets.

It provides that when the price of any product falls below the average cost of production, that then there be an embargo prohibiting importations of such product or substitute. It gives the domestic market to our own people who are entitled to it. It gives to the farmer cost of production as a floor below which the price on that part domestically consumed will not fall. It protects the producer and consumer alike. This without appropriations, regimentation or subsidies.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN AMERICAN BUSINESS

By Reynolds Knight

NEW YORK—The small business man is apparently just beginning to discover that the RFC, the government's liberal lending agency, is willing to underwrite small as well as large business undertakings. At any rate the number of little enterprises knocking at the RFC's door these days is the largest on record. A big lure is the fact that borrowers are given up to 10 years to repay, a tempting bait for many of the struggling little fellows in our land. And now Senator Lucas (D-Ill.) has introduced a bill to make the repayment period unlimited. Anyone wanting a loan, though, must meet one major requirement; he must have exhausted all private loan sources. This sounds sensible enough but, as one observer pointed out, what it amounts to is handing out taxpayers' money only for those enterprises on which private bankers have pinned a "too risky" tag.

Of course, RFC doesn't deliberately pick out the riskiest ventures as loan recipients. As a matter of fact, it wants plenty of assurance that borrowers will be able to repay before it opens its cashbox. In other words, the deal can be something of a gamble, but not too much of a gamble. And what is a "small loan"? Anything from a couple of hundred up to \$100,000.

WATCH OUT—

A credit problem on the big business side of the fence made news as February got under way when the RFC turned thumbs down on the Waltham Watch Company's bid for another whopping loan — \$2,000,000 this time. Not enough collateral, said the lending agency, backing up its contention that it won't run an unlimited risk gamut. Waltham, in the throes of reorganization for about a year now, promptly set up a howl to the effect that Swiss competition was breaking the main spring of the American watch industry. Significantly silent, meanwhile, were Waltham's competitors, Elgin and Hamilton, both of which have been ticking along profitably.

FAST WORKER

Some of the fastest-moving objects in the world have been largely overlooked in the midst of all the attention given to increases in speed of aircraft, railway trains and automobiles. They are small machine tools that can operate at speeds approximately 23 times that of sound! Industry may soon be generally utilizing these machine tools which make a jet plane, in comparison, seem like an early flying machine. This is forecast by W. W. Goehring, anti-friction bearing engineer of SKF Industries, Inc., who says spindle speeds of 100,000 revolutions per minute on machines that grind small holes are being touted in current tests. If it were possible to make an automobile equipped with a 7.00x15 tire go as fast as 200,000 r. p. m., the speed would be 16,560 miles per hour—some 23 times faster than the 780 mile-per-hour speed of sound. The small machines will be highly useful in the manufacture of such precision metal products as ball and roller bearings. They help eliminate surface irregularities and produce surface finishes to within a few millionths of an inch of perfection.

OFF BALANCE

Additional evidence of lack of balance between various states' taxes and license fees on heavy trucks, on the one hand, and the amount of trucking their roads have to take, on the other, is revealed in a compilation issued this month by Griffenhagen and Associates.

Some of the states whose highways support the heaviest burden of truck traffic levy the lightest taxes on those commercial users of the public roads, according to the tabulation by Griffenhagen, noted consultants in public administration and finance. Massachusetts, New Jersey and New York — all heavily truck-ridden—rank 48th, 47th and 46th, respectively, in size of fees collected from heavy trucks, despite the fact that highway experts maintain these vehicles cause the greatest amount of highway damage. Each of these states collected about half the national average of \$1,322. The "corridor" state of New Jersey, carrying the nation's heaviest truck load, collected only \$632 per heavy truck compared with \$2,760 paid to Colorado, where fees are the highest, the survey showed. Other heavily trucked-over states listed in the "bottom ten" of states collecting low fees are Rhode Island, Missouri, Illinois, Connecticut, Delaware, Ohio and Maryland.

It comes with a light that goes on when you step on the scale. . . . Outdoor furniture takes a beating in bad weather, but not if you get a supply of the newly marketed plastic furniture covers. . . . A versatile new electric hot air blower not only dries hair in jig time but also thaws frozen foods, defrosts iceboxes, dries nail polish, even heats the baby's bath.

BITS O' BUSINESS

Consumer credit outstanding has climbed to record heights. It jumped to about \$18.8 billion by the year's end, a 15 per cent boost over '48 marks. Car and television set sales accounted for almost half of the increase. . . . Looks as if the picnic is over for America's automobile dealers—for the first time since 1941 the buyers' market is back. From here on the big emphasis will be on selling, not order-taking.

Independence Hall and will see the famed Liberty Bell and the table on which the Declaration of Independence was signed.

They will also see Congress Hall, where George Washington delivered his famous Farewell Address and where the United States Senate and House of Representatives met from 1790 thru 1800. Not far from Congress Hall is the Betsy Ross house where the Flag of the United States was born. Scores of other historic and interesting sights are in Philadelphia and most of them will be seen by Jamboree Scouts. The tours are included in the Jamboree cost.

The most stirring tourist sight of all will be Valley Forge Park itself and each troop will have plenty of time to visit the many shrines which commemorate the first great camp, for some 172 years ago Washington's tattered soldiers dragged themselves onto this very spot.

Inside the huge arena at Valley Forge Park the first in a chain of stirring pageants will be the reenactment of the trials of Washington's army when they were on this same ground. A few minutes later well over one thousand lit torches will be born from this spot to each of the Troop sites and the Jamboree will be officially under way.

During the opening session, every Troop at the Jamboree will march into this huge arena. Flags of every state and many nations will be massed in attendance and this will be many very important personages of this nation and the scouting organization. On the Fourth of July, a most spectacular display of fireworks will be seen along with many other interesting features.

Scouts from Johnny Appleseed Area will travel to the Jamboree on a specially chartered train along with other scouts from the western part of the state, leaving Mansfield on the 27th of June. Many will be the stories and acquaintances that will be formed on this trip as scouting will be at a very high pitch at that time, most troops having had a pre-jamboree camp. This area will conduct this camp

at Avery Hand the four days preceding the departure for Valley Forge. During this period the final touches will be put to the organization of the Jamboree Troop and leaders will become acquainted with the scouts that are to live under their guidance for the coming week.

As for food, we say that each scout would eat only four flapjacks for breakfast. You who have been camping know what a keen appetite you can wait up in the out of doors will know that this is the minimum. Even this number per scout would add up to a pile that would exceed twice the height of the tallest building in the world. Carloads of food will be brought into Valley Forge each day to provide well over a million meals. This food has been specially picked for ease in preparation and balanced diet. This food will be distributed to the troops and each Patrol will cook its own.

Nothing has been spared to insure the health and safety or comfort of the scouts attending this Jamboree.

These scouts, who envoys to the Jamboree will have interesting stories to tell to their sponsors, The Plymouth Community Club, or organizations who want to hear the story of this great gathering, the story of this significant event. Truly a high spot in his life.

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
