

1200 Hear Sen. Taft

More than 1200 people gathered last Friday night at the high school auditorium in Norwalk to hear Robert A. Taft, Ohio's senior senator speak on the issue: "Liberty vs. Totalitarianism." It was the biggest McKinley Day gathering since the inception of the organization some forty-four years ago.

Taft did not ridicule the present administration, nor did he throw any mud during his discourse. He simply pointed out the uncertainty in terms that it is time for the remnants of the Republican Party and real American citizens to combine in their effort to prevent another "brown squeal" with the social-labor type government which the administration is now courting.

The issue is "liberty vs. totalitarianism." Taft declared, as he described in detail "the theory fostered by PAC and the Truman administration that a totalitarian type of government is necessary to the needs of the people."

Taft pointed out that the same forms of relief to education, agriculture and to workers can be made and yet give the people their freedom. He made it plain that he was in favor of state rights.

A number of outstanding Ohio Republicans were present at Friday night's meeting. Taft was introduced by Toastmaster Delbert G. Housen after a brief opening address by Roland Faulhaber, McKinley Club president.

January Mild, Wet Month

January, 1950 was one of the warmest and wettest Januaries on record. The average temperature was 37.2 degrees or 9.4 degrees above normal. The highest was 71 on the 25th (an all-time high); the lowest 7 on the 19th. On only five days did the maximum drop below freezing.

Rainfall totaled 8.24 inches, or 6.12 inches above normal. Rain fell on 18 days including one inch or more on four days. The greatest was 2.26 inches on the 19th, 4th, 1.38 on the 10th and 1.05 on the 24th.

Snowfall was light, measuring only 1.8 inches. For December and January total snowfall has been only 4 inches.

Wheat made rapid growth during the month but needs a good blanket of snow to protect it from the freezing and thawing.

Music Guide For Elementary Schools In Ohio

A music guide for all elementary schools in Ohio has just been issued by the State Department of Education. Within the next week some 3,000 elementary schools in Ohio will receive this publication—the first of its kind that has been done for the schools in this state.

"This elementary music guide," said Dr. Hissong, "is the work of a representative group of music educators and is presented with the hope that it will meet a definite need in enriching the program in this field. Not every child can make a contribution to music but music can make a definite contribution to the life of every child."

The table of contents also includes: development of all phases of the music program, music in the field of special education, types of performances, teaching aids, the outline program, the music library, administration and supervision and finally music in the home and community.

The Ohio Elementary Music Guide was prepared by Dr. Edith M. Keller, supervisor of music, under the direction of R. M. Garman, chairman, division of elementary and secondary education.

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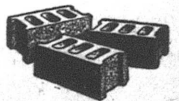

FRIGIDAIRE Announces New Models Soon

New Ideas In New School Buildings

By Edward L. Hoan

It's fun to visit the new schools which are going up all over the state. One of the most interesting that I have seen recently is the new Favorite Hills elementary school which will soon be opened in Piqua.

A one-story structure, it would

probably look like a letter "X" if viewed from the air. The most unique feature, however, is the care which has been taken to provide play space. Each classroom is close to a play area. These play areas are paved with asphaltic concrete. Heating pipes have been placed underneath so that snow or rain can be readily cleared away.

The building will be completely modern throughout. It has radiant heating, fluorescent lighting, glass chalkboards, aluminum sash and trim, and all the classrooms and halls have been treated with acoustical tile. The unique arrangement of the classrooms permits bilateral lighting. The use of insulating multiple glass in all but the bottom sash eliminates the necessity for window shades.

Every classroom has windows on two sides. On the occasions when it is desirable to darken the room, draperies on transverse tracks will be available to be drawn across the windows.

Planning for this and the new high school addition in Piqua started about five years ago. The first step was to make a comprehensive survey of population growth and trends, school enrollments over a period of years, and the condition of the present school buildings.

A series of public meetings were held to discuss the report of the survey staff. Superintendent C. M. Sims told me that these meetings were well attended. People realized that their suggestions were being given serious consideration. Some changes were made in the original survey report as a result of these meetings.

Mr. Sims says that folks were impressed with this rather new procedure and showed it by their increased interest. The spirit of co-operation inspired those working on the building plans.

"The building is not an expensive structure," he told me. "It carries out the simple structural lines of the home, which it serves. It is as functional as months of study can make it. Now that it is completed, we feel that the peo-

ple in other sections of the city will want similar structures to replace some of the ancient piles of brick that we are now using for school housing."

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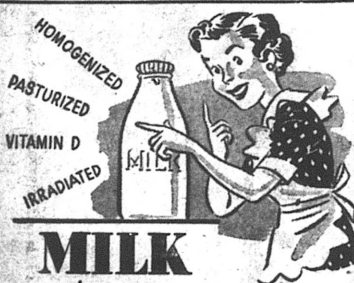

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A GOOD STAND TO TAKE

The people of the 17th Ohio District should be proud of the recent stand taken by their representative, Congressman J. Harry McGregor. In opposing the "me-tooism and gag rule," which was the much-heated subject recently in Washington, Congressman McGregor had this to say: "Mr. Speaker: Under leave to extend my remarks I would like to discuss House Resolution 133 which was recently defeated by action of the House of Representatives. This Resolution, if passed, would have given a majority of the Rules Committee, comprised of twelve members, veto power over every legislative committee in this Congress, and the Rules Committee would dictate to the Congress just what bills would be presented to us for our consideration. It should be remembered that before a bill reaches the Rules Committee it has already been considered by the appropriate legislative committee, after possibly many weeks of hearing, and has already been recommended by the majority of that standing legislative committee for House consideration.

"Mr. Speaker, I am opposed to dictatorship in any form which certainly includes this legislative body. I do not believe in 'gag' rule of any kind that prevents the membership of the House from expressing, by their speeches and votes, what they believe to be right. I have been sent to Congress by the people of the 17th Ohio District to express their views, both by voice and vote, and they do not expect me to relinquish my powers or responsibilities to any small group of individuals. I am of the firm conviction that we have some in Congress who are fearful of taking sides, or taking a definite stand on some of the issues confronting us. I recognize, had the Resolution been passed, that a great many controversial issues would not be presented to us for our consideration. In other words, as stated on the Floor of the House, by passing the Resolution we would be 'taken off the hot seat.' But, Mr. Speaker, it is time for the membership of this body to be willing to stand up and go on record so that the people that elect us will know how we stand on various issues. Then, after we are recorded either by yes or no vote, the people will have the opportunity to determine whether or not we express their views and they will so tell us at the next election. The argument has been put up that only by passing this Resolution and giving the power to these twelve men will we be able to stop our enormous expenditures. THIS STATEMENT IS IN ERROR because of this reason, legislation covering our expenditures is considered by the Appropriations Committee and they report bills covering appropriations directly to the Floor of Congress for our consideration and completely by-pass the Rules Committee in accordance with long established legislative procedure. We, by our vote on the Floor of this Congress, determine whether or not we are in accord with the expenditures and I reiterate, THE PEOPLE SHOULD KNOW HOW WE STAND. We should be honest enough to come out in the open and put ourselves on record in voting on legislation before us for our consideration. It is time for all of us to be willing to stand up and be counted so that the people can decide by our record whether or not they want us to represent them in this legislative body."

HIGHWAY COST HEADACHE

More is being spent each year on the nation's highways — four billion dollars — than the total spent by the railroads of the nation in the past 25 years for all freight cars. And 56 cents of every dollar of this highway expenditure comes out of your pocket as a taxpayer. This is in addition to the taxes you pay on your automobile and the gas and oil for it.

Senator Taft has had the courage to face many situations which has placed him in the spotlight. And at the same time, he has been fair to labor and management in his Taft-Hartley Bill. We are confident that the clear-thinking normal American citizen of Ohio will give Taft the support he needs to be nominated and elected.

DOINGS IN CONGRESS

Last week was a rather exciting week for Congress. There was the attempt to again gag 435 Members by the Rules Committee. This failed as should have. There was the President's tax message. A message trying to figure out how to get more taxes and at the same time reduce the excise tax. There was nothing in the message that would curb the Alices in Wonderland at the other end of Pennsylvania Avenue. Then there was the F. E. P. C. filibuster.

Last but not least came the conviction of Alger Hiss. He was convicted for perjury in an attempt to conceal the betrayal of his country. High governmental officials again attempted to whitewash Hiss. Query, are some of these men implicated with him? Or was Hiss simply an innocent victim of their stupidity when they went to bet with Stalin?

In recent years there was not only Alger Hiss and Judith Coplon but many others who attempted to betray the government in which they held positions of trust. Wherein have we failed these youngsters? Why should they prefer a dictatorship of liquidation to our republic. There is something wrong somewhere. Is it our educational system? Most of these people have had high school and college training. These people should not be permitted to occupy positions so that they can impress foreign ideologies on the plastic minds of the youth. There is something wrong with our educational system that turns out Hisses and Coplons. Maybe these people are the innocent victims of negligent or misled parents, or misguided instructors in our schools and colleges.

On the other hand we must be tolerant. We must protect independent thought. There must be no shackled or canned education. There always will be difference of opinion. These opinions must be respected as long as they do not teach the forcible overthrow of our government. It is only by difference of opinion that a nation grows. We must not permit ourselves to call every suggested improvement or change socialistic or communistic. The suppression of legitimate ideas is even more dangerous than communism.

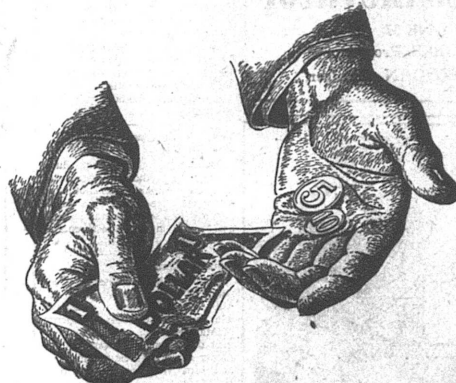

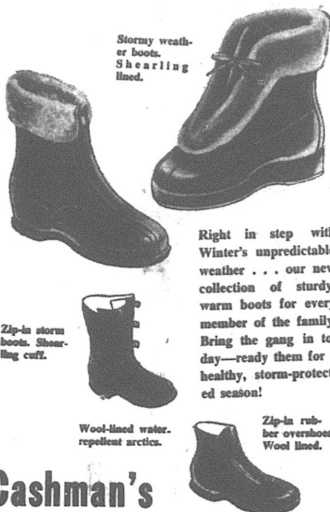
