Complete Plans For Red Cross Campaign

Mrs. Dewey Reynolds of Shiloh was named chairman for the Red Cross membership campaign, opening March 1st, for the northern section of Richland County including Plymouth and Shiloh. Her appointment was announced by Mrs. N. J. Marion of Mansfield, who will direct the membership campaign in all of Richland County outside of Mansfield and Shiloh.

Under the direction of Mrs. Reynolds, residents of the northern section of the county will be asked to help raise their share of the township quota of \$4,870, to assure a full schedule of Red Cross activities during the year.

The quota for the entire county is \$52,792, with the city of Mansfield expected to raise more than \$41,000 of that amount. Mrs. Reynolds said.

The campaign in the southern section of the county will be under the direction of Mrs. Howard Forbes of Belleville. Her duties will parallel those of Mrs. Reynolds. County chairman for the campaign is H. N. Reilly of Mansfield.

The entire month of March will be devoted to the campaign if that length of time is necessary, Mrs. Reilly said. He expressed the hope that the goal could be reached in less time, pointing out that over the year Richland County had all ways maintained a position of leadership in Red Cross membership.

The scope of the Red Cross program of disaster relief, first aid, safety instruction, and the operation of the blood program, in which Richland county benefits, will depend to a great extent on the support given the Red Cross during the forthcoming campaign.

Lyle Hamman & Son, Boyd Hamman, have made outstanding records the past years in producing pedigree Poland China hogs. For many years they have held a fall sale of their hogs to the farm throughout Ohio and neighboring states.

Lyle Hamman announces that he and his son will have a Spring sale on April 27th at Shiloh. The sale will be conducted at night, which will allow farmers in this part of the state to attend without interference to their farm work.

Last Poultry Meeting Monday

The last in a series of four poultry meetings will be held Monday evening, February 27th, at the Court House, Norwalk, Ohio. Mr. Mahlon West, Extension Poultry Specialist, will discuss Spring feeding and management of the Poultry Flock. New features in feeding, such as MPF and B12, that have recently been publicized in farm magazines, will be discussed.

In the last meeting, at which Clayton Albright was the principal speaker, it was generally agreed that poultrymen must increase the size of their flocks to have an economical unit of production. The increase in the size of the flock brings on many more problems in feeding, management and labor saving.

John K. Wells, County Agricultural Agent, urges all poultrymen and their wives to attend this meeting for the purpose of setting up a long-range poultry program.

David Dividian To Speak At Com-Club's 'Ladies Night'

Stacy C. Brown, chairman of the entertainment committee of the Community Club, has secured Simon M. Davidian as guest speaker for the annual Community Club Ladies night on Tuesday, March 7th.

Mr. Davidian is an authority on the Near East problem, and has just returned from another visit to Europe. He was an observer at the U. N. Summer of 1946; attended Youth Festival at Prague 1947 and in Palestine toward the Near East during the winter of 1948 and 1949.

Mr. Davidian was born in Constantinople, Turkey, an Armenian. His people escaped from Armenia during the Turkish massacre, lived in Paris for a time, then emigrated to America where Mr. Davidian was brought up at Worcester, Mass. He is a graduate of Bethany and Yale, and has traveled extensively. He has had many years of outstandingly successful platform experience, seven years with the Rotary Institutes of International Understanding, talk of the month speaker — University of Minnesota, Midwest Bureau—National Lecture Bureau.

He will probably talk on "What is Russia Trying to Do?" which will be a very timely subject and of interest to men and women. Other subjects on which he has spoken and which he no doubt will touch on are "The New Slavia," "The New West Looks at the Near East," "The U. Pilgrims Rally To Take Final

With Larry Schreck and Jack Root, between the way with 49 points showing the way, the Plymouth Pilgrims won their final game of the season last Friday evening as they defeated the Butler Bulldogs 45-30. The game was played on the Butler hardwood.

In league play, the Pilgrims broke even in 14 1/2 this season and ended up in fifth place in the Richmond County league. On Tuesday the Plymouth club ended upon the losing side of the ledger with an 8 win and 11 loss overall record.

In this tilt it was the fourth time this season that the Pilgrims have broken the 60 point mark and three times these scores have ended in victory. Also it was the second and third times the season that local basketballers have broken the 20 point mark in individual scoring.

It was anybody's ball game for the first three quarters of the game but during the last 8 minutes the ball game was never in doubt as Shiloh took all the way in.

Butler took an 11-10 first quarter advantage and at halftime the Plymouth team was on the short end of a 27-22 count.

The Pilgrims rallied to knot the score at 37 all late in the third period. Then Jack Root dumped in a field goal and Alan Ford added 2 more and the Plymouth hoovers were in the van as the final stanza got under way 43-39 and from here on in Butler never threatened to catch up.

Larry Schreck racked up 28 points while Jack Root added 21 and between them they outscored the Butler reserves 24-12.

With Duane Wilson again leading the Pilgrim reserves with 14 points the local reserves outlasted the Butler reserves to win 24-21 in the preliminary game. Butler led 13-12 at half time, but the Pilgrim Juniors were back in the lead 16-15 at the third period mark.

The Plymouth five outscored the host club 8 to 6 in the final canto to provide the winning margin.

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DOINGS IN CONGRESS

Secretary of State Dean Acheson, at long last, has discovered that one could not believe Stalin or his satellites. After the world was betrayed because of his stupid advice to Roosevelt, at Quebec, Teheran and Yalta, and to Truman at Potsdam, he finally woke up. He discovered what every eight year old school boy knew twenty years ago. That is, that the communist doctrine is to say or do anything that is necessary to fool the gullible.

He now understands Stalin's diplomatic policy. He now knows that under the communist doctrine, if you ask a person whether he is a communist that that very question automatically makes him a non-communist, and his denial is considered proper. Then when the conversation is over he is automatically reinstated.

Dean Acheson now tells the Communist Chinese that they are living a fool's paradise. That the treaty they made with Russia was made but to be broken. Yes, a treaty that Mr. Acheson's blunders in connection with China made possible. A treaty that means no more to Stalin than the treaties under which he gobbled up other gullible nations.

What a different world this would have been if there hadn't been too many Achesons advising our President at Quebec, Teheran, Yalta and Potsdam. If there hadn't been so much gullibility among these advisers. Better still if our Presidents had had the good judgment to surround themselves with real Americans rather than with British, Russian and other foreign stooges.

What a different world there would have been if Russia had been kept within her own boundaries and General Patton had been allowed to take Berlin. What a different world it would have been but for the cruel and brutal words "unconditional surrender." What a blessing it would have been if we had accepted the surrender of Germany, rather than permit Stalin and his gang to take Berlin and march 150 miles beyond.

Then there would be no problem, or necessity of an airlift. Then there would have been no Russian army to stop transportation of food, clothing and other products into Berlin. Then an armament race would have been unnecessary. What a blessing it would have been if we had accepted the surrender of Japan before we dropped the atomic bomb. What a different situation there would have been if we had not given to Russia the secrets of the atomic bomb. This, by permitting our executive departments to become not only infiltrated but saturated with Russian spies.

As a result of these mistakes, we and the world now face the greatest crisis that civilization has ever faced. Let us hope that these blunders may yet be corrected peacefully for the sake of mankind.

LAW MUST PREVAIL

For months the nation has been kept in a state of confusion by uncertainty about its coal supplies.

Under the rule of the United Mine Workers normal coal production has been prevented while contract negotiations were pending.

The issue has been used as a political football until the flouting of the public welfare has become a national scandal.

At last the Taft-Hartley Act is being invoked to bring the situation under legal control. It will determine whether organized revolution in one branch of industry, or the flow of the land will prevail—whether one union leader or the courts will govern.

Many coal miners are being misled. By subterfuge or otherwise they are incited to disobey the law. They are told "you can't dig coal with the Taft-Hartley Act."

That is true, but men who disobey the law are subject to its penalties or the nation faces anarchy.

If the United Mine Workers won't work pending settlement of their demands, other men should be allowed to work. If they disobey the findings of the courts they should suffer the penalties the same as any other citizen who breaks a law.

So long as laws are on our statute books they should be respected and enforced.

The country is now face to face with the spectre of mob-rule or rule by law.

There should be no question of the outcome—law must prevail.

BLOCKING FREE ENTERPRISE

Certain government agencies are actually doing everything possible to block private electric power development—in order to open the field for more socialized power plants, to be paid for and subsidized by the taxpayers.

A current situation in California illustrates that. The Federal Power Commission has given permission to a large private utility (Pacific Gas & Electric Co.) to build a \$60,000,000 hydro-power installation. This would be part of a very large and costly expansion program the utility has been carrying on. The power generated would be sold to consumers at publicly regulated rates—and, of course, it would be subject to heavy taxation by government.

However, the Bureau of Reclamation—which has been a haven for socialized power advocates—sees matters differently. It opposes the license and has asked the PFC for a rehearing on the ground that water resources should be reserved "exclusively for the United States on the possibility that at some time in the future a more economic plan of development may be worked out." Thus does the Bureau, once again, try to block private development and delay progress. In doing this, it has been supported by the Secretary of the Interior.

Here is an example of a destructive policy which, if it is successful, will be applied eventually to the whole nation. Private development would be stopped. State and local rights would be destroyed. Basic sources of tax revenue would be lost. And, sooner or later, the Federal bureaus and corporations would hold a political monopoly of a service which is absolutely essential to agricultural, industrial and economic life.

A whole philosophy of government and free enterprise is involved in this problem. What will a free people decide?

General Marshall sends this important message over the United States:

It is rather significant that Plymouth will see the outstanding minstrel show which was produced in Shelby this week. Through the cooperation of O'Brien Post, American Legion of Shelby, the show is being brought to Plymouth through the sponsorship of the Community Club. Proceeds of the show will be used for sending local scouts to the National Jamboree at Valley Forge this spring.

This is the first "home talent" show staged in Plymouth for many years, and it is believed that the community will enjoy this entertainment to the fullest. The Community Club should have the financial support of this project in the fullest, for after all it is a community affair that ranks high in service and in the building of good will and fine citizens.

PERSONAL TAX FILING TIME IS HERE AGAIN

Personal Tax returns were in the mails in time for filing for the 1950 year, between Feb. 15th and March 31st. On January 1st, personal tax effective date, farm inventory forms were in the hands of most farmers, for preparation on that date. Most farmers are familiar with farm prices because of Federal income tax requirements and many of them are making the farm inventory form for personal tax use both requirements. Those who saved last year's farm inventory, many of which were completed through the courtesy of Auditing Office personnel, will have very little difficulty with the farm machinery inventory.

As a guide to those who have not kept up on farm prices there is advertised in this issue of Plymouth Advertiser a list of farm prices. It is impossible to tell from the Auditor's office, what the value of live stock is, and the owner has the best idea of its value. In many cases live stock will be worth much more than the average prices quoted, and in some cases less.

Shortly after January 1st, farm inventories were sent to a long list who did not file returns in previous years. This list was compiled from several different sources, including the real estate duplicate, in an all out effort to cause all to file returns. In some cases owners of farm property use the building for residential purposes only and do not file returns. On the other hand, some farmers who now file returns, and there are other instances where those who received these inventories should not file a return. In such cases the blunders, either inventory or personal tax returns should be mailed or brought back to the Auditor's office with a complete explanation.

The practice of accepting returns from most farmers, while others filed no return, has long been obvious and the cause of much dissatisfaction, and very unfair to those who were honest or who knew they should file a return. After a three year effort toward the objective of returns from all, the enforcement of the personal tax laws in Huron County are now complete.

The Auditor's office expects the inventories to be prepared at home, as the law requires as of January 1st. Last year, the first year of the farm inventory, several were complimented upon the complete inventory submitted, and upon inquiry these folks had little or no formal education. On the other hand, some college graduates claimed they could not understand the form. There is no one in the County so lacking in education that they cannot at least enter the number of articles they had as of January 1st. Where inventories are completed, it is a simple matter for the taxpayer or Auditor office personnel to transfer the totals to the personal tax return.

While emphasis is made in this item on filing of farm returns, every business and professional service, every manufacturer, every holder of mortgages, notes and owners of stock also file returns.

There has been no significant changes in the personal tax laws since they became effective in 1932, but enforcement was not universally enforced. Kenneth W. Reed, deputy Auditor is in charge of personal tax in Huron County, and through his efforts, during the past three years, there has been an increase in personal tax receipts of three hundred percent, which has a significant bearing on the tax rate in all fifty-nine taxing districts of the County. With the enforcement program on personal tax, rates on real estate would have to be much higher, but more serious than that, the tax load was unfairly distributed.

Most tax payers do not realize that it is their obligation to secure a personal tax return, if they do not receive a form in the mail. The Department of Taxation can go back to 1932 and make assessments and apply the penalty for those years. Where there is any question in regard to personal tax, the Auditor's office will furnish the information, and will not require a return, unless a return is legally required.

Willard Hospital Plans Campaign

The committee for raising funds to equip the hospital has completed most of its organization plans according to John Wallace, General Chairman. He states that much the same procedure will be followed as when this same committee handled the Willard Diamond Jubilee last Spring except that this hospital drive is of greater interest to neighboring communities such as Atica, Plymouth, Greenwich, Shiloh, North Fairfield, New Washington and others. In this connection, committees covering nearby towns have been scheduled and several of these have already indicated a desire to help the hospital, it is reported. The General Planning committee has announced the following sub-

committees. Business Men: Lodges, Fraternal Organizations and Ladies Auxiliaries; Church and Church organizations; Rural and Township Groups; School Groups; Social Club Groups. Others will be added, the committee states. Rev. C. D. Wright, who has been appointed to handle funds during the campaign, states that a complete record of contributions will be kept and a full report will be published after the end of the drive May 1st.

The total required is \$60,000 but the General Committee points out that assistance from the State has been promised up to \$20,000 if Willard raises \$40,000. State assistance will be on the basis of \$1 for each \$2.00 raised locally. State officials report that their part up to the \$20,000 has already been earmarked so it is now up to the local community to raise their \$40,000 states Mr. Wallace. It is understood that equipment will be purchased against competitive bids. The hospital points out that the addition of 25 beds increases the load on the kitchen, laundry, sterilizer, surgery, laboratory, etc., to the extent that these departments will need some new equipment to service the new wing along with the present unit.

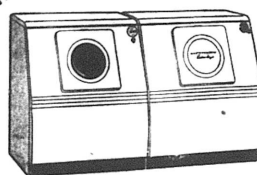
