WATER SYSTEM IS DISCUSSED

Cool Buries, Kills Worker

NORTH FAIRFIELD — Howard Lee Earl, 26 North Fairfield native was killed at 9:30 p. m. on Tuesday when twenty tons of coal fell on him while he was working in the Baltimore and Ohio railroad coal docks in Deshler.

Dr. B. L. Johnson, Henry county coroner at Deshler, returned a verdict of death by suffocation. The coroner reported Mr. Earl, working foreman for the railroad, went into a coal tippie to loosen the coal at the time of the accident.

DOINGS IN CONGRESS

By CONGRESSMAN WM. LEMKE

At last after weeks of filibuster and dilatory practice, the House at 3:20 in the morning disposed of the FEPC—the so-called Fair Employment Bill. This after it extracted its teeth and loaded it down with amendments. When the bill was finally passed, it looked as if it had been keeping bad company the night before. It was plastered and battered.

This bill has delayed the work of Congress. It should long ago have been disposed of on its merits or rather on its demerits. Both parties because of pressure groups have played cheap politics. It is time that not only the Members of Congress, but intellectuals, church and Parent Teachers organizations, be on guard and not permit themselves to be used as a catspaw by these groups. The purpose of these is not fair employment but rather to divide the American people and to create hatred.

When I first came to Congress, we were all just plain Americans. No nationality or religious group asked for special legislation. During the war, however, it was not safe for you to say that you were an American. Then the reds and foreign ideologies had infiltrated and virtually taken over the executive branch of our government. In 1942, when I made the statement on the Floor of the House that I preferred Americans to foreigners, some Members came to me and said "we agree with you but how dare you say it."

There are some things that are strictly personal. You like or dislike for another person is your business. They are part of your pursuit of happiness. In regard to these, the nation's liberty ends where yours begins.

Under the constitution, the police power belongs to the states. To take this power from the states not only violates our constitution but will create a totalitarian police state at Washington. As Senator Borah observed, these various bureaus start in very innocently with a few jobs for deserving politicians, and in the end the number is increased by thousands and thousands.

If we take the police power from the states and concentrate it in Washington with a beautifully dressed FEPC lady, it will not be long before we will have to pass FEPC's for all nationalities and religious groups and each individual D. P. We will soon be passing FEPC's to punish blondes who discriminate against the poor boy by marrying the rich boy. We will have to pass FEPC's for the brunettes, baldheads, grayheads and for the elderly people. There are personal privileges which belong to the individual. These must be respected. We must not fall for all the false and dishonest propaganda. There are minority groups that wish to dominate our individual lives. The greatness of our nation is due to the fact that we respect the individual's taste and desire. Let us all again be Americans. If anyone needs an FEPC, it is Congress and the American people from vicious propaganda and defamation.

DRUGS FROM ANIMALS

A short time ago the American Meat Institute, which represents a large number of the nation's meat packers, urged that its members save increased quantities of cattle gall. This gall is the source of a new drug called cortisone which has, in some cases, effected spectacular relief in persons suffering from arthritis. Gall from nearly one hundred cattle is needed to produce enough cortisone for but a single week's treatment for the average patient.

The drug is still in the research stage, with the medical profession seeking to find ways to prolong the dosage effect, and to establish factual data on secondary side effects and possible toxicity. However, research is being hampered by the fact that too small a quantity of the drug is now available—there has not been enough for repeated and prolonged dosages for even a moderate number of people. This situation led to the Institute's request to its members to save all the cattle gall possible.

A great amount of processing is necessary to produce cortisone. One packing company, which is working closely with a leading medical clinic, must carry out thirty-two different procedures before the raw gall is reduced to the powdered acid form from which cortisone is extracted. A hundred pounds of raw gall produced only eight-tenths of a pound of acid—of which but one per

cent is cortisone.

By products of the meat packing industry have long been the source of various medicines, of which insulin, the only drug yet discovered that will control diabetes, is the best known. Cortisone may be an equal boon to those afflicted with arthritis.

CAN'T BUY UTOPIA OVERNIGHT

A New York Herald-Tribune editorial discusses the government's proposed vast social security program with its emphasis on protection against loss of income for the ill and unemployed, better housing for the people, better health and medical care, an insured income for the aged, and the rest of it. It then says: "No one disputes the desirability of the goals, no one doubts that the American system has within itself the power to attain them to a degree known to no other nation. But to achieve them demands more than mere faith, more than a political formula, more than the denunciation of 'reactionaries' The programs which Mr. Truman puts forth . . . is as complicated, difficult and costly as anything which could well be imagined. Combined with the vast commitments for defense and foreign aid which the United States has undertaken, it would constitute a crushing burden on the productive energies of America. This is not what 'the will of the people' demanded, nor what Mr. Truman told the voters in the 1948 campaign. He spoke then, and he speaks now, as if a goal as only to be stated in legislation to be won, painlessly and finally. The experience of too many countries with this kind of wishful thinking, however, has proved to be futile and dangerous."

What the Herald-Tribune is saying, in essence, is that men of good will, impatient to immediately attain some great end, have unwittingly created economic ruin for millions. In no country in the world has the life of the masses of people been so greatly improved as in ours. That life will in the normal course of events, get better, happier, more secure. But if we try to buy utopia overnight, the consequences will be disastrous.

DO IT NOW
"War-time excise taxes, still in effect four and a half years after the war ended, are depressing certain lines of business," says the Houston Press.
"The original chief purpose of these taxes was to discourage travel and business as usual, thus releasing transportation facilities, manpower and materials for war work. They continue to serve that purpose when all lines of business need every possible encouragement to produce and sell, thus providing more jobs and more government revenue from individual and corporate income taxes."

The Executive Secretary of the Illinois Federation of Retail Association said, "If these taxes are not eliminated at once, they are here to stay. They were imposed as a wartime measure, at which time promises were repeatedly made that they would be removed after the war. Anything less than outright repeal of them amounts to betrayal." He also said that many retail merchants were reducing handbag lines, discontinuing furs, and cutting jewelry inventories to a bare minimum, because of the adverse influence of the taxes on sales. The depressing effect of this is felt by manufacturers, distributors, labor and everyone else involved.

Time is a very important factor in this problem. Retailers find themselves faced with increasing buyer resistance to the affected items, because people are putting off the purchases in the hope that Congress will repeal the taxes. In the interest of our economic welfare, Congress should act without further delay.

POTATOES ARE POPPING ALL OVER
One of the saddest demonstrations of Government shenanigans in the past seventeen years is the spectacle of the pigs and the potatoes. First, Wallace warriors swarmed down on the little pigs and created the famous "economy of scarcity." When the public reaction against this program grew too hot, a new technique was devised. This time it took the form of paying for the "surplus" production at arbitrary rates to keep the merchandise off the markets where it would have caused normal price reductions.

Now this business has resulted in the potato predicament. Our Federal Treasury which means the taxpayers of the United States has paid out a total of \$495,169,000 to keep up the price of potatoes from 1943 to 1949. There is a National Potato Council composed of the folks who raise potatoes, and this organization is strongly in favor of maintaining present price supports. But many thoughtful farmers are downright worried over the future.

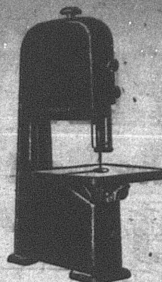

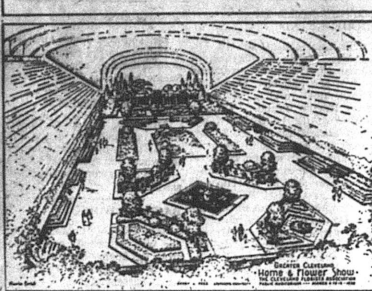

Dean L. L. Rummell Speaks Before Vegetable Growers At Celeryville

Over 160 muck growers and business men attended the first Ohio Muck Growers Banquet, at New Haven, Thursday evening, February 23rd.

The Celeryville Muck Growers School, which was started by a group of truck growers at Celeryville in 1946, was extended to other muck areas this year and termed the Ohio Muck Growers School.

Dean L. L. Rummell, Director of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station and Dean of the College of Agriculture, Ohio State University, discussed the marketing of vegetables to an audience of muck growers from the seven different muck areas in the state. He pointed out the responsibility of the producer to package his product in a size demanded by the housewife, as well

as keeping it fresh for the retailer. The School, which was held on February 23 and 24, was highlighted with talks given by specialists from the Horticultural Department at Ohio State University and the research staff at the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station.

Dr. W. E. Krauss, Associate Director of the Experiment Station, pointed out the progress made by the Celeryville Muck Experiment Station at the close of its first year. He requested that growers make known their problems so that the research people could make the best possible use of the Experiment Station.

Mr. Ernest Munter, Agricultural Engineer for William Gahring Inc. of Bensenville, Indiana, pointed out the value of developing machinery for a specific purpose in raising muck crops. He stated that the Rensselaer Farms followed a definite policy in using tractor power of a size that would be necessary to pull the implement required. In a large operation this in itself proved a great reduction in the cost of production.

Muck growers from other counties voiced their approval of the Muck School as it is now set up and appreciated the opportunity of getting first hand information from the research people who had been working at the Celeryville Experiment Station.

The committee responsible for setting up this year's School included John Stambaugh, chairman; Jacob Wiers, Vice Chairman; Jacob Hothouse, Secretary-Treasurer; Burr Knaus, Edd Wiers, Ben VanZoest, John Buurma, all of Celeryville; John E. Virgil, Eugene Vickers, Berlin Center, placed first among the senior boys in Ohio who participated in the general scholarship test for high school seniors given February 3rd and 4th all over the state. Alice Joanne Holloway of Akron Buchtel high school was first among the girls. Vickers score was 266. Miss Holloway's was 258.

Fifty seniors who ranked highest in the tests—25 boys and 25 girls—were announced this week by Dr. Clyde Hisson, state director of education who said that the test papers were scored and rated by the Department of Education's

division of scholarship tests under the supervision of Mr. Ray G. Wood. Seniors who received honorable mention were also listed.

"This year the test was taken by 10,042," said Dr. Hisson, "representing 6,616 boys and 5,426 girls. Each year the number of seniors taking the test shows an increase. Last year there were 9,513 and in 1948 there were 8,789. This is the 20th year for the scholarship tests."

The next two high ranking boys were John Lewin Young of Stow high school and Norman Lawrence Roullet of Devilbiss high school, Toledo. Their scores were 262 and 258.

Second and third in the girl's classification were Thelma Elaine Hauser of Bethel high school and Joanna Lawyer of Grandview

Heights high school (a suburb at Columbus). Their scores were 256 and 254.

Wakeley, 219, Mansfield; Milton Seifer, 215, Sandra Lindauer, 211; Allen Russa 207; Ann Hoffstatter, 205, all of New London; Patricia Brown 203, Norwalk; Judith Hoffman 202, Greenview and Margaret Twaddle, New London.

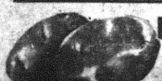
