Russian Imports Affect Ohio Furs

Above is the large storage room at the fur storage and processing plant owned by Henry Fackler. Felt, baled and hangings are upwards of 5,000 coats skins that will eventually find their way into midland's coat another season.

Mr. Fackler has been in the fur business for thirty-five years but despite the impressive appearance of the array of furs above, he finds this season to be one of his most unsatisfactory.

The Plymouth fur dealer will have bought about \$18,000 worth of skins this season. That is in contrast to the purchase of \$103,000 worth three years ago.

Not only is the volume of fur business dropping in northern Ohio, an area throughout which Fackler buys extensively, but the price which the dealer can pay has also fallen to a depressing low. "Coon skins now bring the hunter and trapper but 50 cents to \$1.50 each. They used to average \$7. The price we can afford to pay now is the lowest in my recollection and is a crime," Fackler asserted. It used to be a \$2,000,000 animal industry in Ohio.

Russian Imports
Mr. Fackler laid the fault at the door of the federal govern-

ment. In 1948, there were \$158,838,000 worth of undressed furs imported into the United States free of duty. Mr. Fackler quoted from a report provided him by Congressman J. Harry McGregor. Of that report, \$38,823,000 worth were sent in free of duty by Russia.

During the first nine months of 1949, the United States had imported free of duty a total of \$78,467,000 worth of undressed furs, of which \$21,537,000 worth came from Russia.

The fact that the United States is importing so large an amount free of duty from Russia makes Mr. Fackler, long a critic of left-wing practices in the federal government, see an unusually bright hue of "Red."

"When a kid comes in with a nice muskrat or coon and you have to hand him but a dollar, it hurts," Fackler said. We give 25c for a possum and sell it for 35 cents. Oftentimes we prefer to give the kid a quarter and tell him to keep the carcass, if it is not skinned."

Keep Felt Cool
Mr. Fackler has in operation a recently-installed 12x22 foot cooler 14 feet high in which he keeps fresh pelts until they can be

scrapped. The unusually mild weather during the middle winter months made the cooler a necessity this season. The temperature runs about ten below in the big box.

The season runs from November 15 to March 15.

When visited about two weeks ago, there were three men scraping and preparing the skins.

If the carcass is brought in, the first job is to skin it. Then the fat is scraped off. The skin is stretched and put in the drying room, for two days at least. The skin is then taken off the board and hung up to dry out.

The skins are allotted and combed and graded as to size: extra large, large and medium. 250 of the three grades are placed in each box.

One box is sent to a large furrier in New York state where traders have an opportunity to look at them. The rest are kept in storage until sold.

There is always the danger of loss through heating. Some skins have been lost in the automobile after being bought during the day's route.

Mr. Fackler had a number of mink, he says, bring about \$18 each for the grower or trapper. Mr. Fackler is chairman of the Ohio Fur Dealers' Association.

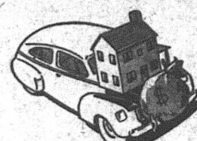

Do you think this is fair to your family? Remember all social security payments are figured on the wages shown on your record. Your job is to see that your employer shows it on his reports, w your wages. Do you want your child to say, "Well, Daddy was a good-hearted man. An Ordinance authorizing and directing the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, to advertise for bids and enter into a contract for all of the electric energy which shall be required by the Village for its own uses and for resale to its own customers.

Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same, that the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs of said Village be and are hereby authorized, directed and empowered to advertise for bids and enter into a contract for obtaining all of the electric energy which shall be required by the Village for its own uses and for resale to its own customers, in accordance with specifications dated March 7, 1950, which are on file with the Clerk of the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs of said Village, and which have been presented and read at this meeting, and which specifications are hereby approved and ordered to be identified by the presiding officer and clerk.

SECTION 2. Payment for said electric energy shall be made by said Village in accordance with the said specifications and as specified in the accepted bid.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the expiration period allowed by law.
