TOUGHER WHEAT CONTROLS
FOR THE FARMER

The American Farmer is losing his big foreign market for wheat. This spells trouble ahead.

According to agriculture officials in Washington the United States will not be able to export more than about 325 to 350 million bushels of wheat ending this coming June 30. This will be the smallest wheat export in five years and 30 per cent less than last year's smashing shipments. If the shipments are cutback, it will somewhat curtail the optimistic forecasts issued by the Agriculture Department last summer.

With the additional cutbacks in export it means that this country will have a stock pile of well over 400 million bushels of wheat on hand when the new crop comes in next summer. Current predictions indicate that the new 1950 crop may even surpass that of last year's bumper crop.

This foreshadows tougher government controls on wheat production. The new controls would be aimed at cutting deeply into 1951 production to hold down the government's price support investment in surpluses.

Apparently the world wheat pool which was formulated some years ago isn't working out so well.

NEW TAXES MAY COME

The tax boys down in Washington are at it again. After nearly seven years experimenting with withholding taxes from wage income, congressional tax committees are said to be studying the extension of the system to dividend income. Some members of the House ways and means committee are favoring a proposal to have corporations withhold for taxes 10 per cent of the dividends they pay to stockholders. The new plan would not increase the income tax liability of stockholders for they would get a credit on their tax payments for the amount withheld as shown by a withholding slip from the company issuing the dividend.

Advocates estimate that the new system would enable the government to collect as much as 150 million dollars a year in taxes on dividend income that would otherwise go unreported and unpaid.

If the committee adopts the proposal it will receive approval of administration tax officials who regard the wage withholding system as being practically indispensable to tax collecting.

One of the complaints being made by industry as to withholding taxes is that the average worker is now assuming his take-home pay as the amount he is actually earning, overlooking the taxes that he is paying before his pay check gets to him. Constant complaints are also being received in Washington from employers doing the withholding about being "required to do the government's accounting without compensation and at their own expense."

With new tax sources in view and a continuance of the burden of collecting taxes thrust upon the small businessman, there isn't much incentive for a continuance of any small business, and some day, perhaps, big business will start a revolt.

Even our own Ohio Tax Committee is studying an income tax for the state, simply because cities like Toledo, Columbus and other communities have sponsored a payroll tax which is used for maintenance and improvements of city government. Well, we should think a long time before our state government is given the approval of this kind of state tax. While it may work fine for cities, we do not believe that the rural areas should be penalized for something on which they receive no return.

LET'S STUDY OUR CANDIDATES

The time is getting short before the primary in May at which time we select candidates for our state and federal offices. We will do well to find out as much as possible how these candidates feel about our government, whether they stand for statism or real American democracy. If we're ready to follow through with a good case of socialism then we should make it a point to choose those candidates who will go along, and there are plenty of them.

If we want to return to a sane state of living, to try and prepare our state government for a program of economic operation, to make some of our citizens understand that they can't go on living like kings forever without some personal effort to earn their living, then you will find candidates who will promise their cooperation. A continuance of high wages, unheard of pensions and foolish government subsidies do not mean anything to anybody but the politician.

There apparently might be some hope in adopting our old form of government in that the recent registration of voters in the metropolitan areas was the largest in history, and hundreds of them didn't hesitate in making expressions of how they felt about some of the things our government is doing.

Even if President Truman tells us that we can look forward to the time when we'll be earning \$12,000 a year, we'll trust bet the last nickel we have that it'll take \$12,000 a year to barely live, and we won't have any more of the material things in life than we have now.

In our more wistful moments we like to think back to the prediction of '33, that "a tax on legal beer will quickly lift the entire public debt. Yet in spite of our noble experiment in drinking ourselves out of debt, here we are with a \$250 billion hangover.—Rochester Democrat & Chronicle, Rochester, N. Y.

In North Carolina

Huron County T-B Association Holds Annual Meet; Chose Officers

At the annual dinner meeting of the Huron Co. T-B & Health Assn. held Tuesday evening in the First Baptist church, Norwalk, Wayne, Allentown of Norwalk was elected president for the year 1950 and 1951, with Kenneth Buckley, Wakeman, Vice President, Mrs. R. C. Earl, North Fairfield, secretary, George G. Oblander, Norwalk, Treasurer, and L. F. Pagel, Willard, Representative Director.

The meeting, looked forward to by an increasing number of Association members, marks the high spot of the year in surveying work accomplished and planning for work ahead.

Following the dinner, served by the ladies of the Church, annual reports were read by the Secretary, the Treasurer, and the Representative Director.

Miss Pauline Bick, R. N., of the Huron Co. Dept. of Health, giving TB statistics for 1949, reported two persons in Huron County had died of the disease, eight cases were in Sanatoria, and eight new cases were discovered. 3209 persons were examined in the mass X-ray of December.

Mrs. P. E. Henderson, Ex. Secy. of the Association, reported an all time high Christmas Seal Sale of \$594.25.

Mr. Robert Harris of Bellevue, Mrs. Blanche Rounds of Collins, Mrs. Milton Smith of Greenwich, were elected to the Executive Committee.

New members elected to the Board of Directors are as follows: Mrs. Clay Stuckhouse, Don Kirkton, Mrs. Mary Howe, Harold A. Smith, Miss Mabel Little, Mrs. Mary Sweeting, Mrs. Arthur Leak, Arlo Swinburn, J. S. Burington, Miss Janet Miller, Harold Keiser, Mrs. Wm. Henry, Mrs. John Steve, and Mrs. Charles Douglas. Dr. Wm. M. Morgan of Alliance immediate president of Ohio TB & Health Assn. and Ohio's Representative to National TB Assn., was the speaker of the evening.

The title of Dr. Morgan's speech "Where Are We Now?" traced TB control through the years. The first problem, that of control, is now conquered — today we are faced with how to bring about complete eradication of the disease. The TB death rate is continually declining. Ohio this year will probably have a death rate in the low 20's per 100,000 population.

Mass X-rays are given credit for this. However, with the discovery of more cases than ever before, we have the problem of providing more hospital beds.

In the treatment of TB with drugs, there were no encouraging results until the antibiotics were tried—such drugs as streptomycin, PAS, BCG, etc. some of which have been widely used in Europe and which are being thoroughly studied in this country.

Dr. Morgan described the correlation of the National, State and

County tuberculosis associations. 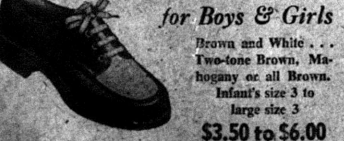

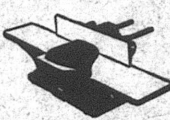
