KENT, O.—Over 1000 students will attend the Tenth Annual Northeastern Ohio Scholastic Press Clinic at Kent State University this Saturday, April 22nd.

Taking part in the program at the "campus on the hill" will be Sid Thomas, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Thomas. He, along with Ben Strang, of Rising Sun, O., has been appointed student co-chairman for the event.

High School journalism pupils from sixteen Northeastern Ohio counties will participate in round-tables, lectures and practical experience during the day.

State Treasurer Don E. Bright is the main figurehead of the clinic and will give the students an opportunity to practice professional news writing by interviewing a mass interview before the press.

Prof. William Taylor, head of the KSU school of journalism and executive secretary of the clinic has announced that this year's program will top all previous records in attendance and performance.

This hospital serves approximately an area of 31,000 people, and any one who has visited or knows the town of Willard, Ohio, knows how very badly this addition has been needed.

The cost of the addition will be \$500, and the state granting \$20,000 towards the total. The dedication for this new addition has been set for May 12th and the committee in charge of local contributions is making a strenuous effort so as to be able to turn the fund over to the Willard hospital not later than April 25th.

Over in our neighboring village of Greenwich, a sum of \$435.00 was turned in this past week towards their goal, and it is hoped Plymouth will do equally as well.

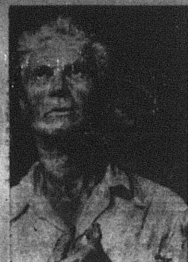

John C. Davis Addresses Huron-Richland County Sheep Men

Approximately 155 sheepmen and their guests from Huron-Richland Counties attended the spring banquet of the Sheep and Lamb Improvement Association at New Haven on April 13th.

John C. Davis, Farm Editor at the Cleveland Plain Dealer, gave a very inspiring talk on his recent trip to Europe. Mr. Davis pointed out the stake that people in Huron and Richland Counties, as well as those in the entire Mississippi Valley, have in the present fight for peace. The fact that farm people living in this area have the most of everything, compared with any other class of people any place in the world, makes it imperative that they understand the present national issue and take a stand to foster peace in the world. Mr. Davis

stated that 65 percent of all the raw materials used for manufactured products come from the farm, that 60 percent of all jobs are directly dependent of the farm, and that one out of every fifteen people employed work at a job made possible by the dairy cow. These and other facts presented by Mr. Davis were summarized to the people present as the reason why they should be well informed and take an active part in all national issues.

James Taylor, sheep and lamb buyer for Armour and Company, praised producers in this area on the type and quality of lambs that were marketed at the Greenwich Pool. He stated that lambs weighing over 100 pounds were the hardest to sell on today's market.

John Bricker, Manager of the Cleveland Producers Livestock Cooperative, reported that 5500 head of sheep and lambs brought a total of \$116,000 during this year's Pool season. Of the total lambs marketed 74 percent were in the Blue class.

The settlement of New Haven was named by the emigrants to the Firelands country, after the town of New Haven, Connecticut, and the architecture of community buildings followed the New England style. The little church originally had a high steeple until in the early 1900's.

Choir In Balcony

When it was built, the church was considered quite a good sized meeting place and it yet has a balcony across the back of the meeting room for use by the choir in antiphonal singing. This is now used for two Sunday School classes.

The lot where the church was built cost \$25, and the building to cost \$1500. The paint was \$25 and the plaster and chimney came back in 1841.

At that time the church was the center of all social as well as spiritual life of the country and community, and this little church has remained very active down through the years. There is always an air of friendliness there as well as one of true worship. Visit and worship with the congregation one of these Spring Sunday mornings.

At one time this balcony was arranged in such a way that the choir benches were on successive steps so that each line of singers was on a different level. The benches were of black walnut and when the balcony was remodeled took cases for the parsonage were built from the wood.

WHAT DO YOU KNOW

A One Minute Sermon by
Rev. L. E. Smith

The oldest of all the oddities in Ripley's "Believe It or Not" column concerns the King of Juju, West Africa, who must not snifle, sneeze, cough or fall off a horse. If he does one of these things he loses his throne, for being a king he must never show the slightest infirmity.

Being "wiped up" to such human frailties it is our conviction, that the King of Juju uses some artifice to hide such human weaknesses. In contrast to his Highness we would call attention to the One whom Christians crown King of their lives—Jesus of Nazareth, who acknowledged his human frailties: "He was weary with His Journey." "He hungered," He thirsted and asked for a drink of water. As to his moral character even His enemies could "find no fault in Him" though he had, like us, suffered temptation, but UNLIKE us He never yielded and by grace divine He is able to help us in our moments of weakness and temptation. His sinless life and character stand as a challenge to every man and woman to live a life unfettered by mortal decay. Hence we are admonished in the scripture that, "we have not an High Priest, who is without sin, but one who has felt our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need." (Heb. 4:15-16.)

Kite Flying May Be Hazardous

In the spring a young man's fancy may lightly turn to thoughts of love. But if he is very young, he is more likely to go fly a kite.

When that happens, there is a serious risk to himself and to the people in the neighborhood should he engage in the sport near electric lines. This fact was confirmed recently by H. M. Speck, safety supervisor of The Ohio Power Company's Northern Division.

"No one would deprive boys and girls of the enjoyment and the beautiful exercise they get from kite flying," Mr. Speck said, "but every effort should be made to inform them of the hazards of flying their kites in locations where the kite, its tail or its string may come in contact with power lines."

"There have been many cases throughout the United States of children being electrocuted or seriously injured in this manner. In addition to the risk to the life and limb of the kite flyer, there always is the possibility of inconvenience and sometimes danger to the people that the electric line supplies with power," he said.

The safety man told of a recent incident in Mt. Vernon, where a kite-flying accident cut off electric service to approximately 500 homes and one small industry. The kite flyer, a young boy, had used Christmas string which contained metal tinsel. When the string came in contact with a 4,000-volt distribution line, it short-circuited the line. The boy was knocked down but unfortunately was not seriously injured.

In another near-tragedy on the system lines, a boy's kite became entangled with a 33,000-volt line. It caused a short circuit and considerable inconvenience to the surrounding area for three hours. Fortunately, the boy flying the kite was not electrocuted, as too frequently happens.

"If children realized not only their own danger but the risk to the community, I am sure they would cooperate," Mr. Speck said. "To cite a couple of examples," he added, "consider the plight of a patient in a hospital operating room when the lights go out, or the helplessness of a fire department during a fire should the electrically pumped water supply fail."

He emphasized that kites can be flown with safety if the following six simple rules are remembered:

1. Don't fly kites near electric lines.
2. Keep string and tail dry and never use when wet.
3. Don't use metal or wire in any part of the kite.
4. Don't use kite string with wire or tinsel in it.

Never climb a pole or tree near electric line to recover a kite. Better lose your kite than your life.

"It would be most helpful," concluded Mr. Speck "if these warnings were posted in schools, and impressed upon parents at Parent-Teacher Assn. meetings, and discussed in school rooms, boys' clubs, Scout meetings and other places where groups of children can be informed of kite-flying hazards."
