

Mayor Proclaims "Poppy" Day

Saturday, May 27, was set aside as Poppy Day in the city of Plymouth in a proclamation issued today by Acting Mayor, Whitney J. Briggs.

The proclamation urged all citizens to observe the day by wearing memorial poppies in honor of those who gave their lives in the two world wars. It stated:

"Whereas, the City of Plymouth in 1917 and 1918, and again in 1941 to 1945, sent many of its finest young men and women to serve in the defense of our country; and

"Whereas, some of these made the supreme sacrifice in that service; and

"Whereas, the memory of their service and sacrifice should be forever kept bright for the inspiration of our own and future generations; and

"Whereas, the wearing of memorial poppies on the Saturday before Memorial Day brings to our minds and hearts the memory of these gallant dead;

"Now, therefore, I, Whitney J. Briggs, Acting Mayor of the City of Plymouth, do hereby proclaim Saturday, May 27, to be Poppy Day in the City of Plymouth, and I urge that all citizens observe the day by wearing the memorial poppy throughout the day."

Memorial poppies will be distributed on the streets on Saturday by volunteer workers of the American Legion Auxiliary, who will receive contributions for the Legion and Auxiliary activities in behalf of the disabled war veterans and needy children of veterans.

MILLIONS TO WEAR POPPIES SATURDAY
Millions of Americans will wear bright red poppies Saturday to honor the memory of America's dead in the two world wars. Women of the American Legion Auxiliary will be on the streets here early in the morning with baskets of the memorial flowers to pin on the coats of passers-by. They expect practically everyone in the city to be wearing a poppy before nightfall.

More than 35 million crepe paper poppies have been made for the Auxiliary by disabled veterans for this year's observance of Poppy Day. Approximately 150,000

women and girls, all serving as unpaid volunteers, will distribute the flowers throughout the country. Contributions to American Legion and Auxiliary rehabilitation and child welfare funds, given in exchange for the poppies, will reach a total of \$3,500,000, it is estimated.

Employment for thousands of disabled veterans confined to hospitals or unable to do other work has been provided by the Auxiliary's poppy-making program. The work has given these men the encouraging experience of earning money again and has filled empty hospital days with interesting, beneficial activity.

Poppies to be distributed here have been made at Veterans Hospital, Sandusky, where patients have worked in their beds and in the occupational therapy shop. The flowers are lifelike replicas of the European wild poppy which Col. John McCrae, Canadian medical officer, made into the war memorial flower of the English-speaking world with his poem which begins:

"In Flanders fields the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row,"

"Here Saturday, we hope to see the poppies blooming over every remembering heart."

The June bride of fifty years ago was the daughter of William and Alice Berry Traxler whose home was near Butler, Ohio. The bridegroom was the son of Henry and Elvira Wilson Phillips of Knox



county, near Fredricktown. Before her marriage Miss Traxler taught music.

Attending the wedding couple were the bride's sisters, Miss Ethel Traxler and Miss Nina Traxler, and Frank Secrist and Arthur Mohr, all of Butler, and Miss Edith Rush and Percy Maboe of Ontario. Rev. Fred Stevick officiated at the ceremony.

The bride chose as her wedding dress a lovely blue summer gown, and the hat she wore was of white, trimmed with light blue flowers. It was made by an aunt in Pittsburgh who was a milliner by trade.

A wedding dinner was served by the bride's parents at their home near Butler, and a large wedding cake graced the table. A wedding supper honored the young couple at the Phillips home near Fredricktown.

Mr. and Mrs. Phillips began their married life in Butler and he was employed there by the Telephone company. In 1918 they moved to Plymouth, where he had been working as an electrician. Their first home in Plymouth was in the property now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Harold Teal. After a year and a half there they moved to the big house on Dix Street where they have lived since. It is very near the school buildings, and because they had any trouble with the children who have attended classes in the old building or the new grade school.

Mr. and Mrs. Phillips are the parents of three sons. Wendell, the eldest, was taken by death in 1939, leaving his parents, his brothers, and his widow, Mrs. Lois Willet Phillips.

Earnest, the second son, lives in Mansfield, and is the father of five children, Robert, Richard, Roger, and twins Jack and Judith and two grandchildren, making Mr. and Mrs. Phillips of Plymouth great-grandparents.

Herbert, the youngest son, makes his home in Cleveland and is the father of two sons. He and his wife, have assisted in the plans for the Golden Wedding, and they, along with Ernest and his family, will all be home for the celebration.

Open House will be observed in honor of the Golden Wedding, at the Methodist Church Sunday school rooms, on June 17, in the afternoon from 2 until 4 o'clock, and all friends are invited to attend and extend their congratulations. Mrs. Phillips served as organist of the church for many years. The Bethany Class is assisting with the Open House.

Although the young couple who were married fifty years ago next month were unable to have a honeymoon the year they were married, they made the honeymoon trip to Niagara Falls twenty-six years later, in 1926.

This celebration is the 53rd Golden Wedding on record in the Phillips family.

for incidentals for his return trip home.

Mr. Berghuys landed at Rotterdam and soon went by taxi to Groningen, in northern Holland, a trip of four hours, to visit with relatives of Martin Kruger's. All of his papers were in order apparently, but upon applying for passage back to America, he was detained until a health certificate had

been sent here to Dr. Faust to fill in certain statements and return.

Old Friends

In Kampen he was pleased to recognize an old friend in the taxi driver who met him at the train. As he had once been a personal family friend a party was arranged for Mr. Berghuys to meet and visit with other former neighbors and townspeople, and by listening to the conversation and arguments at the gathering he was able to learn more of the actual conditions in

Holland, than by the tourist method.

Bureaucratic System

As in any government system, in any country, there exists the big problem of graft, with a capital O. Between the graft and the excessive taxes on everyone and everything, there is little incentive left for any business or any worker. This situation cuts out any future for young people because the government bureaus have such a secure grip and will not willingly give up their position and allotment even to better the future of the nation.

This was the situation that caused Mr. and Mrs. Dirk Gootjes and their family of five to come to Ohio last year. After living for a time near Celeryville, they moved to Grand Rapids, Michigan, and are now engaged in the tulip bulb business besides their other employment.

Tulips Still Beautiful

Mr. Berghuys visited many of the tulip fields and found them still beautiful as he had remembered. The fields are privately owned and the business is still a major one for the Netherlands. There is something about 'tulips from Holland' that adds a little more adventure to bulb planting in your garden. The father and mother of Dirk Gootjes met Mr. Berghuys at the station of Heerhugowaard, near Alkmaar, not too far from the North Sea coast. Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Gootjes are yet raising tulips and he visited their home and tulip fields.

Free Religion

There is still complete freedom of religion in Holland, and this is not surprising as this little country was one of the leaders to throw off the yoke of a national church, which at that time was the Roman controlled Catholic power, and to say that it is the right of man to

worship in the church of his choice. There is no government control of radio either, and if one is able to afford one, they are extremely expensive—about \$100 for a very small one—you may listen to any program that can be tuned in. Radio owners are also taxed for listening. A stamp a month must be purchased and at the end of the year a complete book of twelve stamps must be turned in to the bureau controlling and taxing such.

No Large Bank Accounts

There are no large bank accounts and for a very good reason. Let us suppose you have \$40,000 in the bank representing profits and savings of many years. The government inspects all bank accounts and informs you in due time it will take \$30,000 and give you an I. O. U. for the balance of your lifetime at 2% interest and you pay 8% to the government on the total \$40,000. They need the money for government expenses and you may have the \$10,000 to spend in HOLLAND. This compulsory tending that is forced on the people does not tend to encourage any business, rural or urban.

One tinsmith with whom Mr. Berghuys talked, solved the problem by taking out some type of insurance which assured him of a little income throughout his life and which the government could not confiscate. He quit his business as any profit he made was so highly taxed that he felt he would rather not work.

Difficulties

A nephew who had accumulated enough to make the trip to Switzerland discovered that he could get permission to leave the country, but that he could take no money out of Holland with which to buy food. He must pack and carry his own food with him for the trip, which he did.

Farmers are emigrating in large numbers to Canada and elsewhere because of the scarcity of land to cultivate, and the problem of overpopulation. The Zuider Zee has shrunk considerably in size as it has been reclaimed by new pumping methods, etc., and made available for cultivation in order to help feed the large population.

Even the emigrant farmer is discouraged at the start because he is allowed to take no money or have no income with which to begin their new homestead and work. This was the tragic situation which Mr. Berghuys saw on the return trip to America, though large numbers of farmers had decided to make the one-way trip in spite of difficulties.

Young People

The attitude of the young people toward their elders and to discipline was found to be more respectful than that which we have in the States, but there is more of a loose attitude since the war to leave everything than was once the case.

The orphanages, which since the war are filled to capacity in every country, dress their children in a way which designates them as orphans unmistakably. The boys have bi-colored trousers, one leg

being dark and the other orange or some such shade. The girls too have a two-colored badge in apparel in some way. We do not consider this to be good, psychologically, but it is the custom in Holland and still followed.
