Plymouth Market Buys Grand Champ

The grand champion steer of the Seneca County Fair was purchased last week by the Plymouth Cash Market, operated by Dan Hohler and Jerry Caywood. Along with the purchase of this champion steer, the local market also purchased the Blue Ribbon champion of Monroe County. Both steers were raised by members of 4-H Clubs.

The local market paid a premium of 5 1/2 cents per pound, and the choice cuts from both steers went on sale this week at the local market at regular prices. Ben Seigley, Old Fort high school F. F. A. boy who raised and exhibited the steer at the Seneca County Fair won the handsome trophy with his champion steer, which brought a top price of \$53.50 per one hundred pounds, or a total of \$531.60 for the 960 pound steer.

F-R-H EMPLOYEES GET PAY INCREASE

After months of negotiations between the Plymouth Order of Mechanics and the Fate-Road-Heath Co., a settlement was reached on Tuesday night when a contract was signed giving a general increase of five and one-half cents per hour. The agreement covers some 230 employees in all departments.

Along with the pay hike employees will receive three paid holidays, and employees with twenty years of service will receive three weeks' paid vacation. For some time employees with twenty years continuous service have received a two-week's paid vacation. The general increase will amount to around \$2,000.00 per month for the 230 employees on a 40-hour work basis.

CONTROLS, UMT AND VETERANS' BILLS

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The question of governmental controls over wages, prices and allocation of strategic materials for the war effort has held the spotlight in the Nation's capitol the past few weeks.

There have been many proposals put forth trying to establish a concrete plan for halting the inflation spiral and gearing our economy for full mobilization if the need becomes evident. Both the Senate and the House of Representatives would give the President extensive authority to regulate the nation's economy.

A few of the provisions would give him the power: to require that government defense contracts be accepted and given priority over other orders; to take over equipment and war plants if needed for production of defense material; to take whatever action he deemed necessary to settle labor disputes that might jeopardize national defense; and to exercise control over consumer credit and on private credit for new real estate construction.

The most controversial part of the whole control discussion has been how prices and wages should be treated. Many legislators wanted a provision included that would require the President to place controls on all wages and prices if he thought it was necessary to regulate any one segment of the economy.

Senators and members of the House differed on what they thought should be included in the final bill. Some House members said that the President should put ceilings on wages and prices at his own discretion and even provided for a rollback of prices to the May 24-June 24 level if necessary.

The House bill would give immediate powers over scarce commodities to the Chief Executive, while the Senate bill gave them to the Secretary of Commerce.

House members came in for their share of the legislation when an amendment was made to the controls bill providing for a \$10,000 fine and/or a year in jail for those hoarding more than the normal amount of "necessary" goods.

UNIVERSAL MILITARY TRAINING

ANOTHER controversial piece of legislation being considered by Congress is the question of Universal Military Training for the nation's young men between the ages of 17 and 20 years.

With the present critical international situation, sentiment here is strongly in favor of some kind of training, but the main problem at the present time is whether an attempted passage of the bill would hamper the war effort.

There is no doubt that the United States must maintain an adequate reserve of manpower until real peace has been achieved in the world.

FURTHER VETERANS' BILLS

SPECIAL income tax exemptions for the pay of servicemen on duty in combat zones has been brought up recently. The provisions of the bill would apply to all military pay of enlisted men in Korea and would give a flat \$250 monthly exemption to officers in the same zones.

A move is being made to consider a possible draft of doctors into the armed forces. A bill which would have given free medical attention to dependents of servicemen has been shelved for the present.

NORWALK, O.—Health promotion will play an important role at the 28th annual Huron County Fair which opens in Norwalk for five days beginning Sept. 12, Elfreda Crayton, secretary, announced.

Two special educational exhibits on venereal diseases have been scheduled as well as a blood typing program for Norwalk Memorial hospital, sponsored by the Huron County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

The exhibit on venereal diseases, provided by the Ohio State Health Department and sponsored by the Huron County Health Commission, will consist of a display and continuous movies which will emphasize the deleterious effects of syphilis.

"Many residents think that Huron county is free of syphilis, but nothing could be further from the truth," Dr. W. W. Lawrence, county health commissioner, declared. "We have on record an average of 50 reported cases each year, which is a considerable percentage for the population size of our county."

"Public education on the vicious effects of this disease, in many instances not detected until later and dangerous stages, is of vital importance to the community. We hope every adult visitor to the fair will see this instructive exhibit," Dr. Lawrence added.

The exhibit on polio will be sponsored by the Huron County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Blood typing by the Red Cross will be conducted from that organization's booth in the Exhibit Building daily from 2 to 4 and 7 to 9 p. m.

All persons 18 to 50 years of age are urged to stop at the booth, which will be staffed by a capable technician and a registered nurse from Memorial hospital.

emphasis will be on "corn and soybeans" and "disease and insect control of vegetable crops" during the program.

Visitors will have a choice of several discussions at each hour of the day starting at 10:00 a. m. (E. S. T.)

First will be the discussion on insect and disease control of vegetable crops; a tour of the arboretum and experimental woods; and a tour of the orchards and small fruit plantings. At 11 o'clock another insect and disease control discussion; feeding and management of poultry; discussion on corn and grass silage; pasture experiments for dairy cattle; and a tour of the orchards and small fruit plantings.

The experimental work on beef cattle, dairy cattle and swine will be open for visitors at any time during the morning.

In the afternoon, starting at 1 o'clock, there will be a discussion of corn and soybeans; insect control of vegetable crops; and disease control of vegetable crops. At 2 o'clock another discussion of corn and soybeans work; and the pasture experiments for dairy cattle.

The program is being planned to give those people who have not visited the station this year a complete picture of activities carried on at the station.

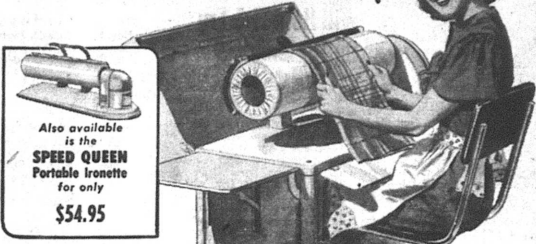

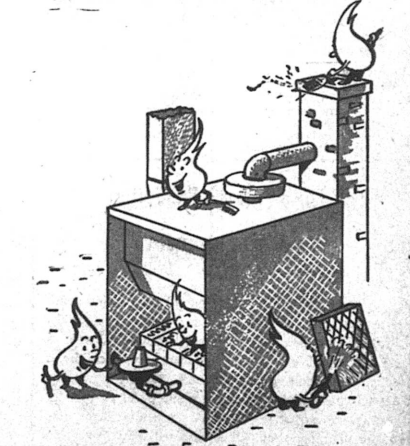
