WASHINGTON, D. C.—The question of governmental controls over wages, prices and allocation of strategic materials for the war effort has held the spotlight in the Nation's capitol the past few weeks.

There have been many proposals put forth trying to establish a concrete plan for halting the inflation spiral and gearing our economy for full mobilization if the need becomes evident. Both the Senate and the House of Representatives would give the President extensive authority to regulate the pation's economy. nation's economy.

A few of the provisions would give him the power: to require that government defense contracts be accepted and given priority over other orders; to take over equipment and wur plants if needed for production of defense materials; to take whatevey action he deemed necessary to settle labor disputes that might jeofardize national defense; and to exercise control over consumer credit and on private credit for new real estate construction.

The most controversial part of the whole control discussion has been how prices and wages should be treated. Many legislators wanted a provision included that would require the President to place controls on all wages and prices if he thought it was necessary to regulate any one aegment of the economy.


