Board Has Busy Session

The monthly meeting of the Plymouth school board was held on Tuesday night and many matters received discussion. Because of a crowded routine at the high and grade schools, the board passed a resolution permitting Supt. Dennis to hire a secretary. This position will be filled by Mrs. Kenneth Myers. She will assist in handling correspondence, telephones, and bookkeeping.

The board also approved the purchase of an automatic washer for the Home Ec department. The use of the washer will be of much value, not only during hours of instruction, but when banquets are served at the school. Purchase of an automatic hot water heater from the Ohio Fuel Gas Co., was also approved. A gas dryer has been donated to the school by the gas company. The added equipment will bring the facilities of the Home Ec department up to a high standard, and the equipment is not only appreciated by the staff, but also the students.

The board granted Guy Bishop, English teacher, an indefinite leave of absence. Mr. Bishop has entered the services of his country. Mr. Gilbert, who has been directing the band this summer on Saturday nights, will continue his activities with the band. On Friday nights during the football season, Mrs. Stansberry will be in charge of the "twing band" at the gym during the year.

Gym Floor Completed
The laying of the new gym floor at the high school auditorium has been completed. The installation and finishing was done by the Richards Construction Co., of Willard at an estimated cost of \$3,000.

The old gym floor, which was placed when the high school was built many years ago, buckled last year when water flowed beneath it, and rotted moisture was under the wood. It was found that the subfloor and the hardwood on top were in good condition, except for the rotting of the subfloor. The board decided to saw into the floor at various places and screw the old floor into the subfloor, thereby giving it a new lease on life. In the meantime, drainage of surface water has been re-routed, and under pipe conditions have been improved. The drainage should last for an unusually long time.

The new gym floor is made of hard maple, beautifully matched in its natural colors, and is highly finished. The regulation basketball marking is in black, while in the center of the floor appears a large letter "P".

Basketball fans and players will delight in seeing the teams in action on this new floor, and Supt. Dennis expects that the new floor will be made before and during the basketball season to keep the floor in its present perfect condition.

The new floor was presented by Earl Cashman, and they were approved and ordered paid by members John F. Root, Paul Stodt, Harry Schreck, and J. V. Miller, and William Root, president.

The present board is to be congratulated for the condition of the new school, and the facilities and improvements that are to be found in Plymouth's new grade school, which is to be one of the most beautiful of the best school systems in northern Ohio. The teaching staff this year is one of the highest rated in the history of the school, and the work done by the custodians during the summer should not be overlooked. In fact, the present board has spared no time and effort in giving the community one of the best school systems the village has ever enjoyed.

AERIAL VIEW OF NEW FOOTBALL FIELD

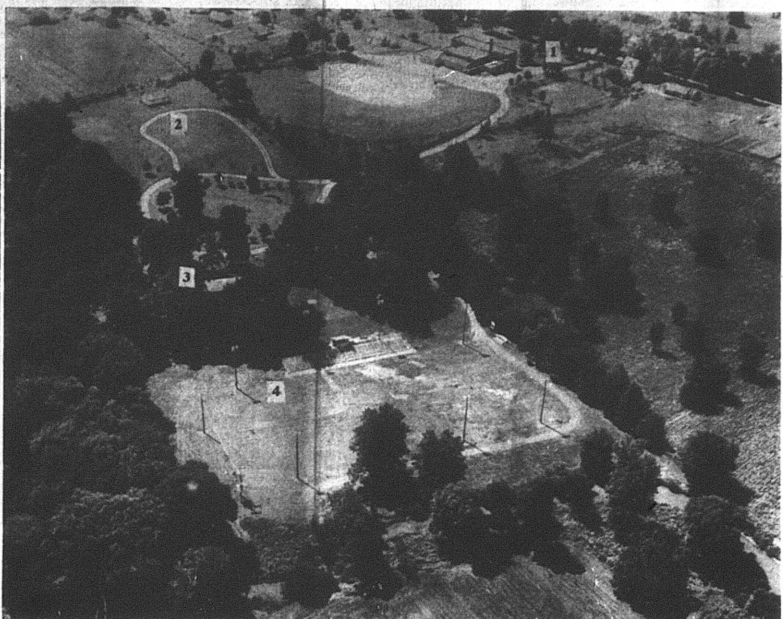

How To Get Your Football Ticket

The tickets you received are your passes to the home games during the 1950 football season. Books will be issued again next year. Those who have memorial seats will sit in the same section and seat number for all home games for the next five years. The fair for two years will be re-assigned next year. If you are a holder of a bond book, each sheet or ticket in the book may be exchanged for a reserve seat ticket to any home game. For example, bring the bond book to the ticket window for your reserve seat ticket.

Rain Holds Up Huron County Fair

The Huron County fair got off to a bad start on its opening night Tuesday when a cloudburst storm in Norwalk flooding the fairgrounds and fields in a wide area.

The fair was scheduled to open Tuesday and run through Saturday. Another mishap occurred at the fairground Tuesday night, when a horse-tender from the fair was injured by a horse that had been broken.

The man was sitting near a truck unloading horses, when one of the animals became frightened and reared up into the air. The horses and foot landed on the animal-tender, breaking his leg.

The attractions at the fair this year are said to be the biggest and best offered for many years, especially the livestock division, which includes many registered purebred horses, Holstein, Richland and Ashland counties.

Huge Crowd Expected When Pilgrims Tangle With St. Paul Friday

A cool and clear night is all that's needed to make a perfect setting for Plymouth's official opening of its stadium and lighted football field. The honors of the opener comes to Norwalk's St. Paul and the Plymouth Pilgrims when they meet for the first tilt of the season here Friday night.

The lights were turned on and tested Monday night and the home squad went out for an hour's practice. Scores of onlookers were on hand to view the field for the first time under lights, and local enthusiasm is running high in anticipation of the game here, which is expected to fill all the bleachers.

Vale Reed and Don Ray, both probable starters, are sidelined with injuries. Vale, a full back, has an infected tooth, and Ray, a tackle, has a badly twisted knee. Both boys hope to be able to get into the second game when the Pilgrims meet Huron Saturday at Huron.

Coach Fraill points out that the lack of experience and depth will probably hamper the home team in some of the games, but that the boys are showing up good as an overall team.

The Christian Approach To The Federal Debt Problem

The enormous debt of the United States Government is a matter of deepest concern. Most citizens know how and why the greater part of this debt has been incurred during the last twenty years. Politicians glibly state how it can be paid next year. Statesmen must demand a reduction now. A great part of the present so-called prosperity of the people has been at the expense of the federal government. Instead of the present prevailing attitude of trying to get out from under it, we must get under the load and begin to lift, recognizing the debt as a moral obligation. The Christian approach is one trying to be of real service to the country. I hereby give to

the Government of the United States the sum of . . . dollars provided that during the present fiscal year, the Federal Government will balance the budget and pay off at least 2% of the debt due at the close of the fiscal year. Also providing no lottery or any other scheme of chance to be used as a means of raising federal revenue. It is recommended that the balance of the budget announce the amount pledged on Feb. 1st, May 1st, Aug. 1st, and November 1st of each year. Here is the opportunity for individuals, churches, organizations of every description to make a patriotic contribution to the Government with the assurance that the debt will be reduced. Herbert W. 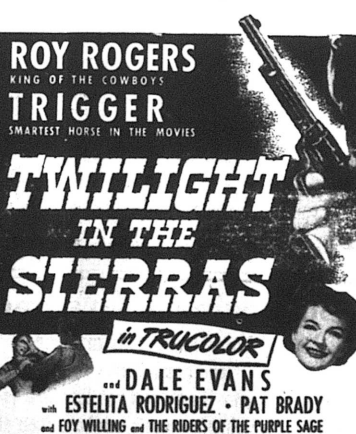

Squirrel Season Opens Sept. 15th

Squirrel hunters! That time is almost here again.

Tomorrow, September 15th, Buckeye hunters will be taking to the woods for the opening day of the 1959 squirrel hunting season. The season extends through Sept. 30th.

The Wildlife Division wishes all Ohio hunters a highly successful season. But in doing so they also remind prospective hunters to exercise courtesy and sportsmanship in the pursuit of the sport, in addition to abiding by the game laws which prevail.

Safety is a must on the list for all hunters. Safe and sane handling or shooting of guns will save many a life this season. Each year many Ohio hunters are killed or maimed by the misuse or careless handling of firearms while hunting, or preparing to hunt.

It is hoped that the casual list can be reduced sharply.

Courtesy is another factor on which many hunters do not place the proper importance. Be courteous to your fellow hunter and the farmer who has graciously extended the use of his woods or field to the hunt.

For those hunters who do not have a place to hunt here is a list of public hunting preserves which would be open to them, with the exception of game refuges in the areas, this season.

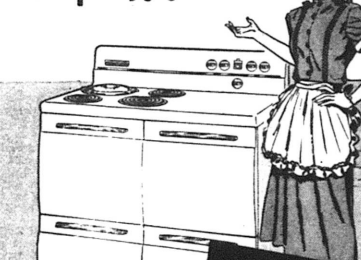

WASHINGTON REPORT

BY SENATOR ROBERT A. TAFT

THE Korean crisis has made crystal clear the conflicts within the Administration and the lack of a directing principle. This country is badly in need of an Administration with clear principles on foreign policy, military policy, economic policy and some ability to direct a practical, common-sense program in accordance with such fixed principles. The conflict in foreign policy is the most obvious. Secre-

tary Matthews apparently favors the preparation of an aggressive war against Russia, and he is promptly called down by Secretary Acheson. General MacArthur asserts the necessity of defending Formosa as a key to our whole position in the Far East, and he is promptly rebuked by President Truman with the acquiescence of Secretary Acheson. Now we are not certain whether we are going to defend Formosa or not. The Secretary Acheson of today is in complete conflict with the Secretary Acheson of January, when he announced that our line of defense was Japan, Okinawa and the Philippines, and not one step beyond.

We see the same conflict in military policy. On February 2, 1950, Secretary Johnson announced that this country's defenses were stronger at that time than at any time since 1945, and were getting tougher every day—"I want Joe Stalin to know that if he starts something at four o'clock in the morning, the fighting power and strength of America will be on the job at five o'clock in the morning." At that time he was talking about an army costing \$14,000,000, a year was sufficient to accomplish that purpose. Today the President wants \$30,000,000 a year and Secretary Johnson is privately talking about \$45,000,000 a year.

Of course we cannot take a chance, and the President will get what he requests, but the threat today is the same threat that existed six months ago. I would vote more enthusiastically to double the dollars if we could also double the intelligence at the top.

In the matter of economic controls we have the same conflict. The Federal Reserve Board con-

He did not compose the music, only the words. Key lived for twenty-nine years after he had written our national anthem.

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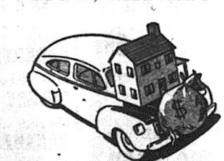

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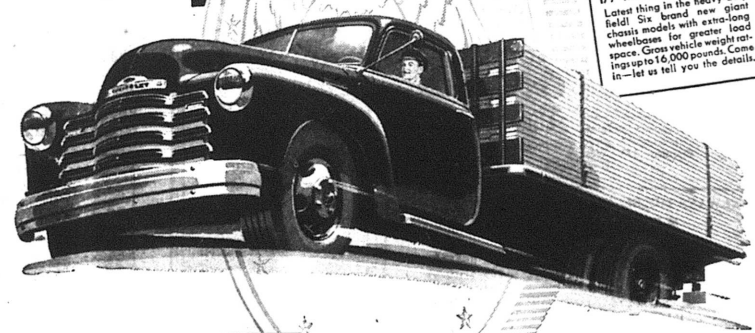
