We docked at Sandusky at 7:30 in the evening with a tired but eager bunch of people on board. Everyone said the most beautiful and welcoming sight was the lights of Sandusky glowing against the sky.

We left the boat, tired but happy. Happy to be home knowing better than ever before what the simple word "Home" means to us all.

Sometimes that which is done or said unintentionally is more to the point than the studied act or word. So called gossip or talking about people can be a help and not a curse if it is kind and generous. We can say the appreciative thing, make the complimentary remark, give voice to the praiseworthy and beautiful thing about our neighbors and friends, as almost everyone has some good qualities. Gorgeous and many are the floral tributes lavished upon our friends and loved ones when they depart this life and all the nice things we can think of are said about them; why not give the verbal flowers while they are living and thus let your "gossip" as well as a Gospel light shine.

ITEMS ON SCHOOL PROGRESS BY SUPT. G. R. DENNIS

Now and then one should stop, look over the situation, reflect on progress and make sure that all gains are secure. It occurred to me that just one short year ago, Monday last, we had opened a new elementary building. It was far from complete that first morning your youngsters walked through the halls.

Since then the building has been finished, dedicated, landscaped, the playground started and some of the proposed playground equipment installed. The furniture in all rooms is new.

An attempt has been made to understand the abilities of all the young people in both schools. A series of standardized tests were given last year to determine the reading level of each child.

At the high school changes are in evidence. A shop and a shop program have been recognized as a must in our high school program for several years. Music was established in the schedule so that it was available to all last year, and continues during the 1950-51 term in a special room. A band was started in 1948, made some progress in 1949-50, received valuable instruction and gained in playing experience this summer past and is now making regular appearances at football games. Other courses, either new or reinstated, into the school curriculum are Consumer Economics, Journalism, and Shortland.

Buildings, grounds, equipment, curriculums and music have all received special attention. The Home basketball court will have a new look during the present winter campaign. Football has become more firmly established since the Booster's Club has furnished a lighted field.

These signs of progress can be attributed to the interest of the people in better schools. Cooperation between the various village interests has been excellent.

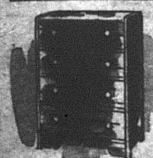

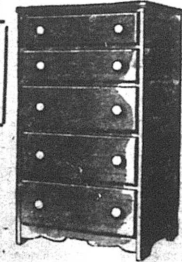

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Here Are The Facts About Gas For Space Heating

To avoid any misunderstanding by our customers as to the regulations covering the installation and use of gas space heating equipment, we publish the following:

1—In the planning of our financing, purchasing, construction, and operating programs, we anticipated that 60,000 additional space heating installations would be completed in the year 1950. We felt that this estimate was the maximum reasonably to be expected.

2—Of the unprecedented number of notices of intent for space heating installations already filed, we have approved about 72,000 for completion in 1950. This will further tax our abilities and facilities to render adequate service during severely cold periods this coming heating season.

3—The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio held a public hearing on September 11 to investigate the situation with respect to the probable demand for natural gas during the coming winter and the ability of the operating utilities to meet the demand. Upon the basis of evidence obtained at this hearing, the Commission has issued a Seventh Supplemental Emergency Order, which contains the following provisions:

A—The Company has the obligation of approving written notices of intent for space heating installations in new homes.

B—The Company also has the responsibility of approving conversion installations equal in number to the new home installations, with priority to be given to proven hardship cases.

4—It is required that a notice of intent be filed with the Company, in writing, and that approval be granted by the Company before additional space heating equipment can be used. Also, it is made mandatory for the Company to discontinue all service to consumers who install and use space heating equipment without approval.

5—The approval by the Company of a written notice of intent, filed by the consumer, is valid for six months after the date of approval.

6—The Public Utilities Commission's order emphasizes its Administrative Order No. 46, which makes it mandatory that service to industrial customers be curtailed if and when it becomes necessary to do so to protect the service to domestic customers.

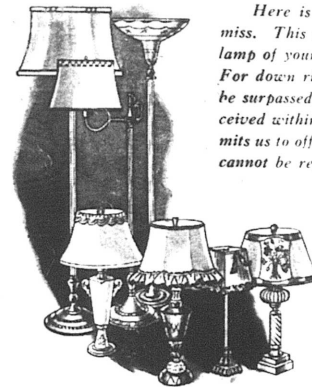
