DRIVER LICENSES NOW ON SALE
The new 1951 Series, three-year Driver Licenses went on sale on Sept. 5 in Plymouth at West's Wall Paper and Paint Store. All 1950 licenses expire on your first birthday following Sept. 30, 1950. You must obtain your 1951 license within 30-day period prior to your birthday.

Plymouth's License Bureau, located at West's Wall Paper and Paint Store, will be open during the regular store hours.

A driver may renew his license within three months after the birthdate expires during which time he may not drive. If he allows more than three months to pass after expiration without renewing his license, the driver must take out a temporary driver's permit and pass a driving examination in order to obtain a new license.

NEW HUNTING Licenses On Sale
The 1950 Ohio hunting licenses are now in the hands of the 2500 license agencies throughout the state.

Harry West, chief of the Accounting and Budgeting Section of the Department of Natural Resources, has announced that a total of 600,000 licenses have been distributed among the agencies and may now be purchased by prospective hunters.

In a majority of the state's cities and villages the agencies are located in private business places, primarily in hardware and sporting goods stores. However, if there are no designated license agencies in the vicinity, they can be obtained from the county, township or village clerk's office.

Resident licenses are \$1.00 with a fee of 25 cents. Non-resident licenses are \$1.50 with a fee of 25 cents. Each hunting and trapping license is in effect, unless revoked, until August 31, 1951.

As in the past all hunters and trappers are required to carry and display their license on the middle of the back while hunting in the field.

West also urged hunters to get a copy of the 1950 Digest of Game Laws and Orders of the Wildlife Council, which are available at all license agencies throughout the state.

Locally they can be purchased at the Brown & Miller Hardware Store.

OHIO POWER TO CONSTRUCT NEW POWER PLANT

The American Gas & Electric Co. of which The Ohio Power Co. is a part will start construction immediately on a new 1,050,000 kilowatt super power plant on the Kanawha River near Charleston, W. Va.

The initial installation at the new plant will consist of two 175,000 kilowatt high pressure, high temperature generators. The first unit is scheduled for completion in 1952 and the second in 1953.

Capacity from the new Kanawha River plant will be available to The Ohio Power Company as well as the other operating companies of the American Gas & Electric System, which serves 90,000 sq. miles and 2100 communities in the six states.

Authorization for the new plant is part of a \$251,000,000 budget projected for the years 1951-1953 by the American Gas & Electric Co.

Included in this program is the first section of a 300,000 volt transmission system. The first section will connect the new Kanawha River plant with the Philip Sporn plant at Graham Station, W. Va., near Pomeroy. It will be the highest voltage transmission line in the United States. Construction details of the new line were developed at the American Gas & Electric high voltage research laboratory at Brilliant, Ohio.

With the new expansion program American Gas & Electric system will have a total generating capacity by 1953 of 3,325,000 kilowatts, about triple the system's capacity twelve years ago.

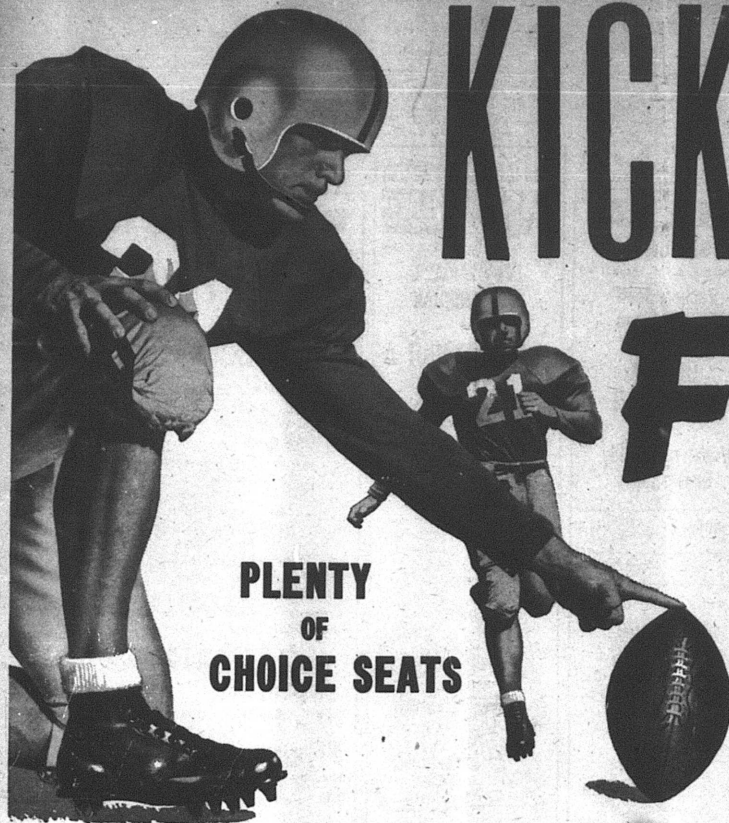

GUNS AND BUTTER

Americans were a people lean and hard when they carved out of the new-world wilderness a republic which was both a boon and a beacon to the bureaucrat-ridden peoples of the old world.

By old-world standards we were an illiterate lot. But our education was of the kind that came from daily contact with the hard facts of life. So it developed a simple logic that first amused, then irritated, and eventually routed in confusion the theoreticians who dominated the chancelleries and universities of the old world.

During the years when America was growing to greatness, neither politician, publicist nor average citizen wasted time worrying about whether we should have guns or butter. Being practical people they accepted the fact that the successful individual, must keep a well-oiled gun over the mantel if thieves are to be prevented from raiding the pantry. Neither our founding fathers nor any other clean-limbed, practical, hard-working people have ever worried about providing both guns and butter.

It is only after America has grown soft, has placed security ahead of opportunity, has abandoned the principle of self-discipline and self-government for the doctrine of discipline by the state and government by bureaucrats, that the specious cry "guns or butter" is raised.

The Swiss have had guns and butter for three centuries. Nor have they labored under back-breaking taxes or lessened freedom for the individual as a result.

It is absurd and the counsel of defeatism to say that America, with all of its tremendous resources and proven abilities, cannot have both guns and butter. But we can only achieve that goal if we put our resources and our abilities completely to work in the fashion which built America out of the wilderness. We have got to eliminate "made work" from every phase of our industrial, financial, and governmental lives. We have got to quit spending the taxpayers' money to dredge creeks and to surface roads that bring votes to the politician but add nothing to our productive capacity. We have got to face the fact that in trying to live down our old-world reputation for illiteracy we have wasted millions of dollars and millions of man-hours "educating" good late operators into poor mechanical engineers. We have got to change the weird tax structure which makes it more profitable for the successful producer to invest in ivy-covered dormitories than in additional laboratory and plant facilities to produce more and better guns and butter. In brief, we have got to get back quickly to the faith of our fathers, to the sound practical philosophy which created America and which has made Switzerland the longest-lived democracy in the history of man.

There is no middle ground, no compromise. We will discipline ourselves as free men working and fighting for our individual opportunities and security or we will be disciplined by harder men and we will find ourselves working and fighting to provide opportunity and security for them, our masters.

We face a long, hard struggle. We will work off some excess fat but we will be stronger and healthier for it. We faced and conquered problems relatively tougher in 1776 and in 1865. Now, as then, the key to victory is faith, not fads; hard work, not hysteria.

The Communists outsmarted themselves in Korea by showing us our military weaknesses while there was still time to correct them. They have also outsmarted themselves where it hurts them even more—by showing the world that they must choose either guns or butter. Free men, if they will, may have both guns and butter.

THE COMMUNIST CONTROL BILL

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Communist Control bill, passed by the House of Representatives recently, takes a step in the right direction by requiring the registration of all followers of the Communist party line in this country.

This anti-subversive bill, drafted by the Un-American Activities committee, not only provides for Communist registration, but also denies passports to party members, requires labeling and identification of all Communist propaganda, bars Communists from government jobs and prohibits contributions by government officials to Communist-front organizations.

Although this legislation is more stringent than President Truman recommended, it is essential with American fighting men engaged in the Korean conflict must be the homefront protection against this same menace be strengthened.

Congress has seized the initiative in this fight and, as evident by the large majority with which the Communist bill passed the House, there is strong sentiment here to continue the Communist battle either in this country or abroad.

DRAFT OF MEDICAL MEN

ALSO passed last week was an amendment to the Selective Service Act of 1948 providing for a draft of doctors and dentists who received all or a portion of their training under a government program.

Included in this act are men deferred from service in World War II so they could finish their education.

Congress definitely does not want to pass class legislation since our doctors and dentists are one of the outstanding professional groups in this nation.

But a total of 14,000 medical men were trained at government expense in the last war and they should be the ones who should serve now. Thus far 6,000 men in the above group have responded to the call by enlisting. There remains 8,000 more to serve a year or 18 months of service duty in return for their government sponsored training.

ADJOURNMENT OF CONGRESS

FINAL adjournment of Congress is one of the subjects under discussion at the present time in the Nation's capital. Some Congressmen want to adjourn in 1951 (final adjournment), but others, including myself, feel that we should not adjourn during this emergency.

I am willing to accept a compromise of three-day recesses, or a resolution granting the leadership of each legislative body the power to recall members of the other body if it is necessary. This subject should be decided upon at an early date.

ONE DISH MEALS

The one dish meal is the answer for economy of money, time and energy. With a crisp green salad and a fresh fruit dessert, this type of meal can be tried in nutrition and satisfaction.

Rice Supreme

- 1 C. rice (uncooked)
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 C. dried green pepper
- 1 C. celery
- 12 stuffed olives, sliced
- 1 small can mushrooms
- 1 7-oz. can tuna
- 2 bouillon cubes
- 3 C. hot water

New Zealand Eggs

- 2 C. dried cooked potatoes
- 1 C. minced onion
- 4 Tbsp. butter or margarine
- 6 eggs
- 1/2 C. milk
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 Tbsp. minced parsley
- 4 tomatoes
- 1/2 tsp. sugar

Melt 2 Tbsp. of butter in a skillet. Cook onion and potatoes in this until a golden brown. Combine beaten eggs, milk, 1 tsp. salt, pepper and parsley. Pour over potatoes. Stir and cook over low heat until eggs are scrambled. In another skillet melt the rest of the butter with the sugar. Heat the tomatoes in this until glazed all over. Arrange egg and potatoes in center of large platter with tomatoes around the outside. Garnish with parsley. Serves 6.

In large skillet, arrange rice, salt, pepper, green pepper, celery, olives, mushrooms and tuna in order given. Dissolve bouillon cubes in hot water. Pour over mixture in skillet. Cover and place over high flame until steam escapes. Immediately turn to simmer and cook 20 minutes. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

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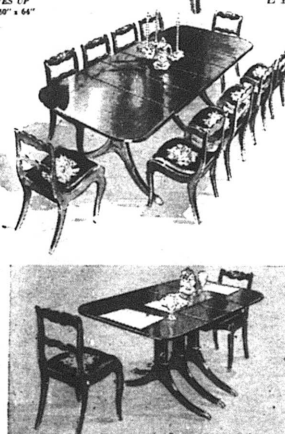
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
