Joe Moores Writes Of Trip Across The Atlantic To India

Plymouth friends of this former Plymouth man and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph H. Moore, will be interested in the story which he has sent back home, telling of the journey which took them across the Atlantic, through the Red Sea, and on to Bangalore, India.

"Dear Folks:—

"Guess I had better start at the beginning and tell you the story chronologically or I will forget something.

"We pulled away from the dock about 9:00 a. m. on Nov. 1, Tuesday morning. We were all kind of sad, from leaving, etc.—and it was such a misty morning that we didn't see much of the coastline as we pulled away. The sea gulls followed us for two days.

"The Zealand, 12,000 ton freighter, has five very large holds—all filled to capacity. The holds were covered with metal roofing and in about ten hours we had a foot of stuff was lashed on top. Every nook and cranny of the lower deck is filled with all kinds of crates, boxes, and barrels. There are about 1000 drums of something scattered about, too. Everything is lashed down. Every other stuff is chained to the crewman chain the rust off the chains and grease them.

P. H. S. STUDENTS RECEIVE BOOKLETS On last Friday, January 19, the students of P. H. S. received a booklet called "Survival Under Atomic Attack." This is a booklet put out by the U. S. Government. The booklet is very interesting and one that everyone should read. It tells what you should do if an atomic bomb is dropped in or around your city. You can survive and live through an atomic bomb raid and you won't have to have a Geiger counter, protective clothing, or special training in order to do it.

The only secret of survival in an atomic area are (1) Try to get shielded in a basement, subway, ditch, or around a stable building, (2) Drop flat on the ground or

...so that you won't be struck by flying objects. (3) Bury your face in your arms so it will hide your eyes and face from burns and flying objects. (4) Don't rush outside right after a bombing, but wait a few minutes then go help other people. (5) Don't take chances with food or water in open containers because they may be contaminated. (6) Don't start rumors that might touch off a panic.

DID YOU KNOW...

That one hundred and fifty-five years ago today the discovery and use of vaccination was progressing rapidly? Vaccination was discovered by an English physician, Edward Jenner who was born in 1749. He was quite interested in medicine and doing things to help the human race. Amid all criticisms and attacks against the theory of vaccination by physicians and clergymen he succeeded in his experimenting and made his first successful vaccination on an eight-year-old boy, James Phillips, who was stricken with cowpox.

Vaccination is a form of inoculation for the prevention of smallpox. The principle upon which vaccination is based is that if the individual acquires the disease antibodies for the prevention of the disease will be manufactured in his own blood and make him immune for a number of years.

Vaccination is also used as a preventive for other diseases such as diphtheria, scarlet fever, and typhoid fever. Edward Jenner received many honors and rewards for his great discovery.

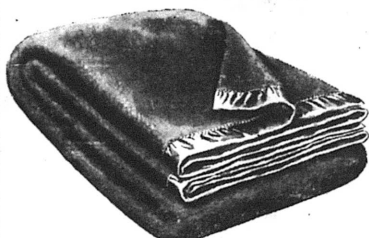

"We haven't been seasick. Inez missed a couple of meals and I was dizzy for a couple of hours but that is all. Kay has been in bed since we started.

"We spend our time playing games and cards, walking on deck, sunning ourselves and watching sea life. So far we have been flying fish, turtles, and either a shark or a porpoise.

"Yesterday we passed San Miguel Island. It is in the Azores group. It is forty miles long and we passed it at a distance of about three miles so we got a good view of it. It was in sight from early morning till mid-afternoon. It had quite a large town—about 14,000 people, the captain said.

"Just before we left Brooklyn, Elmer and I went ashore and bought some large hooks and some line. We couldn't fish so far because the propeller would take our line. We plan to fish tomorrow night when we stop at Gibraltar.

"We are supposed to arrive there sometime in the evening and we will mail these letters there if we see a whale, shark, or porpoise. We will stop in the harbor for about six hours to take on fresh water. We can't get to shore so the water is being brought out to us in small boats.

"From Gibraltar we are going straight across the Mediterranean. We will pass south of Sicily (Cyprus, and Crete). Our next stop will be Tripoli (in the Holy Land).
