

WILL DISPLAY FIRE FIGHTING EQUIPMENT SATURDAY NIGHT; FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

This is Fire Prevention Week! All over the nation a drive is on to make people "fire conscious." Astounding statistics prove huge losses through fire, and they also point out that fires are started because of carelessness and non-thinking.

In observance of Fire Prevention Week in Plymouth, Fire Chief Dalton F. McDougal has arranged for a display of safety and emergency apparatus on Saturday night, Oct. 13, between 7 and 10 p. m. The fire trucks and equipment will be on display on the Peoples National Bank corner. Joining in with the fire department will be the equipment of the Board of Public Affairs, and Supt. Lincoln Sprowles will be on hand to answer questions and give suggestions on electrical wiring and installations. Fire Chief McDougal and his volunteer firemen will also be present and will explain fire hazards and how to avoid them.

In May, 1948, Plymouth township trustees entered into a contract with the village of Plymouth for fire protection in a certain

area of the township. The trustees and the Plymouth fire department made a survey of the territory, establishing a complete record of all farms and buildings, listing each and giving each a home number. The system is so arranged, that should a fire occur all that is necessary is to notify the department, giving the name and especially the Fire Number assigned to the home. Through the assigned number the firemen can easily locate the fire and the shortest route to the home. So residents in Plymouth township should keep and remember the fire number assigned them, as it will save many minutes in answering a call should there ever be a need. If you do not know your fire number or misplaced it, this week will be an opportune time to renew it in your memory and to place it conspicuously in your home.

TO HOLD INSPECTION

In furtherance of fire prevention, Chief McDougal and his firemen will conduct a fire inspection during the month of October of all business houses in Plymouth. The firemen will be split up into pairs of two, and will be assigned to various sections of the village. The inspectors will point out to you fire hazards, if any, and you will be aiding the prevention of fire and your community by rectifying any hazard which may now exist.

In checking over his records, Chief McDougal pointed out that in 1950 fire losses in the community totaled \$7,864.00. The department made 12 runs during the year. So far this year, the first seven months of 1951, losses totaled only \$515.00, and six runs were made by the department. This gives a bright outlook for the current year's losses over those of 1950.

There is good cause to observe Fire Prevention Week when the great losses caused by fire are considered. During the first seven months of 1951 losses ran over \$439 million dollars, in fact the round figures are \$439,661,000. This is an increase of 4.6 per cent over the first seven months of 1950. With these tremendous fire losses each year, it can plainly be seen that the prevention of fires is the main objective of each and every community in the country.

Before starting your furnace for the winter, check over carefully the chimney and all pipes; don't be careless with electrical wiring; do not let children play with matches or around fire, and be very careful about smoking. Smoke and electrical defects are credited with 40 per cent of the fires started in the United States. And remember, most all fires start from a flame that can be put out with a pint of water.

Beryl Miller Suffers With Heart Attack

Stricken with a heart attack early last Friday morning, E. B. Miller, junior partner of Brown & Miller Hardware, is confined in the Willard hospital, where his condition remains still critical, although somewhat improved.

News of his sudden and serious illness brought much regret to his countless friends and acquaintances in Plymouth and vicinity. Mr. and Mrs. Miller had entertained Mr. and Mrs. Fred Schneider until around midnight, and at the time of retiring Mr. Miller did not make any complaint of feeling ill. However, at around 3:30 a. m. Friday morning he informed Mrs. Miller that he was very ill, and could hardly get his breath. Dr. C. O. Butler was called to the home, arriving at about 6:00 a. m., and just while Mr. Miller was suffering, it is believed, his second attack. He was rushed to the Willard hospital and placed under an oxygen tent. At noon Friday another attack struck, but in a very light manner.

Since last Friday Mr. Miller's condition has been such that only his wife and two children are permitted to visit him but a few minutes at a time. Tuesday night he showed a slight change, and on Wednesday afternoon reports gave a little more encouragement.

LOSES THUMB

Raymond Steele, supervisor of the Foster Park Memorial Cemetery in Lorain, suffered a broken right arm and serious injury to his right thumb while engaged in an operation, last Thursday, while at his work.

Mr. Steele and his assistants were placing stone around a cross, which required a hoist. The chain broke and the stone caught Mr. Steele in such a manner as to break his arm and crush a portion of the thumb. He was moved to the Amherst Hospital, where it was found necessary to amputate the thumb, and he also received two severe cuts on his head.

Hard luck seems to have caught up with the Steele family. Mrs. Steele, having undergone an operation some six weeks ago and is now recuperating. Former residents of Plymouth, their local friends are sorry to hear of the accident.

Luther Brown To Head School Levy Committee

After being appointed by the P.T.A. as a member of the school levy committee, Luther Brown was present at the regular board meeting Tuesday night.

It was shown that a levy was discussed and the necessity of the levy pointed out. The board of education has been operating for the past four years on 4.5 mills. This levy was passed when there were 390 pupils in the Plymouth schools, and at that time the school had one building in operation. Today there are 434 pupils and we are operating two buildings on the levy that was voted in then.

This means we have about 15% less money for each pupil than we did in 1947, while costs have gone up much more than 30% in most years.

The necessity of adding teachers will consume approximately half of the increased revenue from the levy. The remainder will help repay money that must be borrowed after the first of the year.

It was estimated that \$8000 dollars more to operate the school than existing revenues furnish in one year. The two additional mills will give us approximately that amount.

WILLARD MOTHER DIES IN CRASH

WILLARD-Mrs. Clara Vaughn, 28, mother of two children, was killed when her car was spun into a culvert shortly before midnight Sunday on the Town Line Road, north of Willard.

Mrs. Vaughn and her children were returning home from her sister's at Centerton. A passing motorist saw the headlights of the car in the ditch and discovered the driver, who, her husband, James, children, and two parents, as well as brothers and sisters survive.



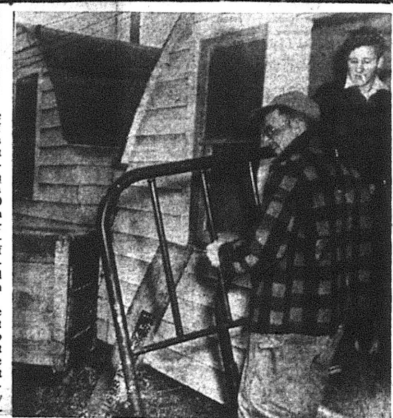

After a week of smog, smoke and fire the muckland west of Plymouth is still burning. It is reported that the blaze started last Wednesday on a state game preserve, believed to have been caused by a motorist toting a lit cigarette. Most of the 1,000 acre game preserve was soon burned off causing deer and other wildlife to seek a new home. Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week, the blaze spread, cleaning off 300 acres of uncultivated land on the John Stambaugh farm.

At the outbreak of the blaze Wednesday, it was reported that the fire had been closed down on a 15-square foot area, but that a gust of wind came up, and the blaze became out of control. Last week-end, Art Heck, Earl McQuinn, Tom Root and others flew over the vast tract of burning forest and land, and reported that it looked at times as though the earth beneath the plane were a burning inferno.

Friday morning a huge volume of smoke drifted over Plymouth. Motorists between Mansfield and Delaware had to use their driving lights. At first they thought it fog, but then the smell of smoke disoriented them. Early Tuesday morning of this week the dense smoke which settled over Plymouth, but mainly north and west of town, slowed up traffic on U. S. Route 224 almost to a halt. This lasted for a couple of hours.

Sunday afternoon traffic was unusually heavy through Plymouth. Hundreds of motorists throughout northern Ohio traveled to the scene of the blaze, but at that time the smoke was so intense that most of the sightseers

MINISTER'S WIFE INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENT SUNDAY

Mrs. Edna Smith, wife of Rev. L. F. Smith, is convalescing in the Shelby hospital from injuries received Sunday evening in a head-on collision on Route 178 near the Walnut Chertfield home.

Mrs. Smith and son Leonard were coming home about 6:30 from Shiloh when they were struck by a car driven by Lawrence Bodine of Dover, O., who was going toward Shiloh to Ashland. Wet and slippery road is said to have caused Bodine to lose control of his 1948 Ford Sedan when he was rounding the curve and crashed head-on into the oncoming car driven by Leonard.

Mrs. Smith was removed to the hospital where it was disclosed she had a dislocated shoulder blade, possible chest injuries, two severe cuts on her head and a bad cut on her leg besides bruises and abrasions. Leonard escaped with minor injuries.

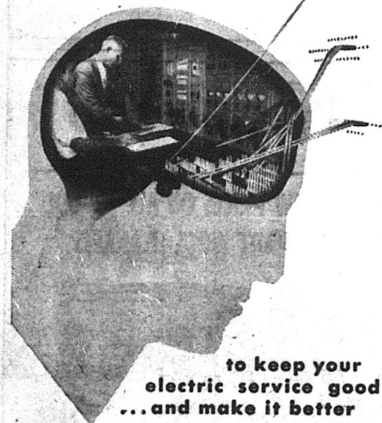

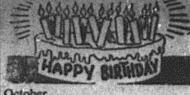

IT'S TOO EARLY TO START

Plymouth business men and car owners will appreciate it if parents will take to avoid window washing on store fronts and cars. Already the youngsters are marking glass, which makes extra work for everyone, and there's a shortage of help. Have a little chat with them in a kindly and friendly manner, and explain why window marking isn't such fun after all!

NEEDED: A NEW NOAH

Paper, one of the main adhesives of modern civilization, was made for man and not man for paper. Sometimes we wonder if the reverse isn't true as we view the erupting mountain of paper, the expanding army of clerks, agents and officials enlisted to shuffle the paper and waste of time by ordinary mortals, seeking only to make an honest living, putting little marks and answering asinine questions on that paper.

Amusing as this habit may appear from one angle, viewed soberly it is frightening. The extent of the paper-complex marks the degree of government interference in business and in private lives. It marks the reversal of that dictum that the government which rules the best is the government which governs the least.

Bad as this habit is in itself, most disconcerting are its effects. Not the least dangerous of these was cited the other day by James E. Shelton, retiring president of the American Bankers Association. The snarl of federal regulations, the shuffling of useless forms and papers, Shelton pointed out, invites both law evasion and moral disintegration.

This is true. Examples are abundant. While the United States still was following the Jeffersonian ideas of noninterference by government and no special privileges for business, the countries of Europe were creating paper-juggling bureaucracies that were strangling them. But the inability of officials to profit by example is notorious and hence the United States has been walking into the paper flood with its eyes wide open to the perils.

One of the main roadblocks to recovery in Europe is paper. Governments there have taken upon themselves so many functions which, strictly speaking, are none of their business, that business is hog-tied. In some countries a dozen Marshall plans and billions more of American capital could not retrieve the situation because the more money turned was turned over the more paper-dizzy functionaries would be hired to handle it. Greece, Italy and France are suffering especially from this disease of modern society. Britain has it, but to a lesser extent. But all Europe is victimized by it to some degree.

Consequently evading the triplicate form, dodging taxation and frustrating the snooping agent have become accepted forms of operation. In short, dishonesty has been sanctified. It resembles thieftolerance toward if not the approval given the bootlegger by the public in prohibition days. It is a form of revolt which does not ameliorate or end the evil but does bring about a moral disintegration in those who practice it, as Shelton warned.

We Americans are not excepted from this danger by any higher moral qualities than the Europeans possess. To take an honest look at the corruption which is spreading over our society we have to admit that we live in a very brittle glass house.

While tax evasion is not as easy here as in Europe, where few countries have adequate enforcement machinery, other forms of cheating and chiseling are becoming habitual. This amounts to a breakdown in government. It can be argued that much of it should break down and vanish. But the method of eliminating unwanted and unnecessary government is from the top, not by a morally destructive revolt.

The excuse for all this in the United States was stated by Shelton:

"In the last two decades we have been living in one government-declared period of emergency after another. How long does an emergency program have to continue before it becomes an established and regular procedure? How long will it take for a government-regimented economy, established for the duration of a series of unending emergencies, to become the way of life of the American people?"

The feeling is inescapable that these emergencies, each giving rise to more paper shuffling, are often created to justify the paper shuffling and not to meet a real need.

Americans are hard-headed. They demand their money's worth. And when government begins to cost more than it is worth—when Americans are forced to pay a high price for services of diminishing value—they will take the way out that all other peoples have taken, evasion and chiseling. The paper flood and all it implies is just as dangerous as a foreign foe. If we are not to cripple ourselves and impair our ability to defend ourselves should the need arise a rainbow must appear from some quarter above the deluge of regulations, forms, documents and strangulations.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

129 YEARS AGO TODAY

Rutherford Birchard Hayes, 19th President of the United States, was born in Delaware, Ohio, 129 years ago today. He graduated from Kenyon College at the head of his class in 1842. He went to Harvard to study law, and was admitted to the bar in 1845. He began his practice at Lower Sandusky, but removed to Cincinnati in 1849. At the beginning of the Civil War, he rose to the rank of Colonel Major-General before the close of the war. In 1864 to 1866, he was a member in Congress, and was governor of Ohio from 1867 to 1871 and from 1875 to 1877.

Hayes was nominated for President of the United States by the Republican Party in 1876. An electoral commission, appointed by Congress, was required to decide the result of the election. It was decided in favor of Mr. Hayes over Samuel Tilden, the Democratic nominee. He favored withdrawal of troops from the South in interest of reconciliation, and advocated civil service reform and a sound financial policy. At the close of his administration, he retired from political life and devoted himself to interests of a philanthropic and scientific character. He was a member of the Peabody Education Board and was president of the National Prison Association. Many educational institutions recognized his eminent services by conferring upon him honorary degrees.

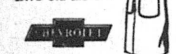
