Pilgrims Fall Before Powerful Richmond

The Plymouth Pilgrims failed in a bid to ruin Richmond's Homecoming (as they had had their injury) last Friday when they went down in defeat 47-18. Again injuries hampered the Plymouth attack.

The first period looked very dark for the Pilgrims as Richmond scored three touchdowns to take the lead at the quarter 21-0. Although Plymouth at the opening kick-off looked good they were fairly disorganized on defense.

The second quarter found the boys from Plymouth gathering steam and shortly after a drive to mid-field Tom Rhine threw a pass to Meiser who ran it the rest of the way for a touchdown. The play carried a total of 45 yards. The Pilgrims elected to plunge for the extra point but were unsuccessful and the score remained 21-6. At this point, Dick Griffith, Richmond's captain and fullback, showed his leg took some of the 220 yd dash at the State meet last year. He took Larry Hampton's kick-off and streaked down the field for an 82 yard touchdown run. The kick was good and Richmond went off the field at halftime possessing a 28-6 lead.

During the third quarter the most activity came from the Pilgrims after Richmond had scored once more making the score 34-6. Rhine, Plymouth quarterback then went to the air and completed several passes to both Beltec and Meiser. But none of these passes were quite good enough for a score.

The play was fairly even in the final period as L. Hampton raced 55 yards for a touchdown but Richmond came back with two scores on an intercepted pass and a returned punt to finish up the game 47-18 after a drive almost the entire length of the field carried the ball to the two yard line where Tom Rhine pushed it over.

Ten of the Plymouth team played the entire game as substitution was limited because of injuries received in the Butler-Plymouth fracas. The Pilgrims counted 14 first-downs to Richmond's 15 for the evening.

Rhine and Meiser combined their throwing talents to complete 9 out of 18 passes which is a very good average.
