

Cpl. Guy Bishop Writes of Gallantry On "Heartbreak Ridge"

Dear Tommy:

What the liaison officers, committees, and subcommittees are bawling over a cup of Army coffee and things have quieted down considerably, maybe I can get around to thanking you for sending me the Plymouth Advertiser which I have enjoyed very much.

Of course, the school news is very interesting and brings back a chain of old memories of Plymouth High. I received a copy of the Mayflower Yearbook, 1951, and of course, it will be a treasured possession.

I fully intended to get a story to you on the much publicized "Heartbreak Ridge" encounterment, last month but I was so busy doing leg work for Stars and Stripes and the wire services that it was impossible. The entire action was centered around the 23rd "Invader" Regiment and at that time, I was attached to that regiment out of P.O. It was a fascinating experience to witness and write about the gallantry displayed by the American soldiers on that momentous peak.

My work at the present time is more confining and routine. I'm

doing editing, rewriting, and administrative work here in the main office where our stories pour in daily. I spent almost three months with what I consider, the finest regiment in the world, the 23rd. Maybe it was just as well that they pulled me out of duty because one never knows when a mortar or artillery round has his name on it.

The story of "Heartbreak Ridge" is a great one. I will live brilliantly in military history. The American people cannot realize the tactical situation involved, the mountainous terrain, the unfavorable conditions, or the unselfish sacrifices. For those who battled there, both dead and alive, their praises can never be sung too highly. No doubt there were boys from Richland County, the same as any other county, that participated in that heroic struggle.

Now that it's over and the companies have juggled in new placements to fill the loop holes, action on the entire Korean front has taken a vacation. The second division is now in Army reserve after a record-breaking 102 consecutive days on the lines. I was with the 23rd all during those 102 days.

With my six months just around the corner, it shouldn't be too long until I'll be leaving Korea and its fertile rice paddies behind. It has been an unusually interesting experience which I wouldn't trade for a million dollars yet wouldn't give two cents to go through again.

My best luck to the Pilgrim gristers this season and to the all round success of Plymouth High School. Any time you have any spare copies of the Advertiser, I'd be only too happy to relieve you of it.
