COUNCIL APPROVES LAND ANNEXATION

Council approved an ordinance at Tuesday night's meeting, which increases the size of Plymouth, the ordinance contains the application of land on the west side of town that a certain tract of land be annexed and incorporated within the city limits.

Some months ago a petition was presented to council by residents of the west side, including Raymond L. Brooks, Hazel Brooks, Perry L. and Virginia Curtis, Robert and Marjorie Deppen, William and Henrietta Van Loo, Roy and Irene Evans, Dan and Jessie Grabach, C. Scott and Mary Ann Grabach, that a portion of their properties be included in the corporation limits.

Litigation has been conducted between the village and Richland and Huron counties, and the final passage of the ordinance brings this section of land within the limits of the town.

An exact description may be found in the ordinance which is being published in this issue. The ordinance also states that the portion of their properties be included in the corporation limits.

APPROVES BUDGET

Council also approved the 1953 operating budget for 1953, which was sent in by the Richmond County Board of Commissioners. At the meeting, the council decided to approve the budget for it revealed that the tax valuation for the village had been reduced over \$110,000.

Richland County Auditor Norman Wolfe informed Clerk Harry Trauger that the reduction was caused by a low inventory at the plant of The Fete-Roth-Heath Co., which in turn reflected in the tax structure.

There is little doubt but what the village will have to approve two or three mill tax levy if the town is to be operated without going in the red.

In the absence of Mayor West, who is in Florida, J. Ben Smith was acting mayor, and all councilmen were present.

TOLEDO FIRM BUYS LOCAL BOND ISSUE

The Brown & Bosworth Co., Toledo, was the successful bidder on the \$160,000 school bonds which were sold in the city Tuesday noon. There were eight sealed bids at the Board of Education meeting, which were opened at the meeting Tuesday. Bids ranged from two and one-half per cent to three and one-quarter per cent.

The Toledo firm purchased the bonds at the local rate of 2 1/2 per cent interest rate with a premium of \$877.

Harold Cashman, president of the board of directors, said the board members, including John Helbig, Paul Stoodt, John F. Root, and Halston Cheesman, were present. Earl Cashman, Supra. Cloon and Chas. J. Marr, New Philadelphia architect, were in attendance also.

With the bonds sold, the board will proceed with necessary legislation to begin work on the new grade school addition some time around May 1, 1953.

FIREPROOF YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE

Charles R. Scott, Ohio Fire Marshal, is urging all to be careful this Christmas to have their trees fireproofed. He said that their holiday will be free from the uninvited guest, FIRE.

Remember that a Christmas tree is very combustible, being filled with pitch and resin, it ignites easily and burns fiercely. Second, keep your Christmas tree safe—keep your Christmas tree safe—keep your Christmas tree safe.

1. Don't set the tree up until a few days before Christmas.
2. Set the tree in the coolest part of the house away from radiators, heaters or fireplaces. Stand it in water or wet sand.

3. Use only flame proof decorations (all of other types).
4. Avoid smoking around the Christmas tree.
5. Remove all wrappings without delay.

6. Use only electrical lights bearing UL label and don't leave the lights burning when leaving the house.
7. When needles start falling, take tree down and discard it.
8. Provide plenty of large ashtrays. Check before retiring to see that no cigarettes or cigars are left burning.

9. Avoid buying trees that are operated by gasoline or alcohol.
10. In case of fire call the fire department at once and get everybody out of the house.

By following these simple rules you may save your life or the lives of your loved ones. Enjoy a happy Yuletide Season.

P. H. S. SCHOOL NEWS

ACROSS THE DESK
OF SUPT. COON

Three members of the Plymouth Board of Education together with Mr. Coon visited some new elementary buildings last Thursday. All of the buildings contained cafeteria facilities. This is of special interest to members of the board of education, since the plans for the elementary addition includes kitchen facilities.

The new elementary buildings visited were Shelby Central, Shelby Auburn, and Lincoln Heights Schools. The cafeteria at Mansfield Madison and Union were also inspected.

The modern equipment and facilities of these buildings is quite costly and necessary. Some electric stoves as high as 350 pupils each day. To peel enough potatoes, wash all the dishes and cook that much food requires a lot of equipment. All of the kitchens were equipped with steam tables, potato peelers, power mixers, dish washers, restaurant stoves and large ovens.

Some other interesting projects visited were the art room at Shelby Central, the elementary library at Shelby Central, the new gymnasium at Shelby Auburn, and the new Home Economics room at Madison. Mansfield Madison's cafeteria is finished in knotty pine and was gayly decorated for the athletic banquet which was held the preceding night.

In looking at these new building facilities one concludes that our own facilities are quite modest, but certainly adequate.

Although our building will not have any frills or luxurious facilities, it will be nice, bright, clean, adequate and economical. We will have an elementary school building of which Plymouth will be proud.

ATHLETIC ELIGIBILITY

In order to clarify the correct meaning of athletic eligibility, the following is quoted from the manual.

A pupil who at the end of the first six-weeks passes two subjects, and fails two is not eligible until he has passing grades in three subjects from the beginning of the semester. If the passing grade is 70, and if he receives 65 in one of the failing subjects, he would have to make 80 in this subject for the next three weeks to be eligible the tenth week. 6×65 plus 3×80 divided by 9 equals 70.7.

(This means a boy must average less than failing for the entire semester before he is ineligible and must average more than passing for the entire semester to be eligible. You cannot make him eligible on his weekly grades, but only on the entire semester average.)

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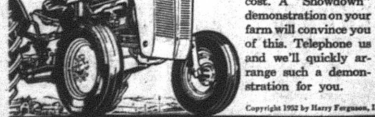

HOLLY BUSHES AND TREES NOW READY FOR CHRISTMAS

Many people around this old village, on the southern edge of the Firelands and New England Reserve, have holly bushes or small trees on their property. Some Plymouth housewives have already clipped and cut the green leaves for Christmas decorations, and perhaps some observe the old superstition that the holly should not be cut before the Christmas Eve. Hemlock is used locally, too, for swags and other decoration.

The holly bushes and trees are old favorites, especially of those of English descent, for lawn decorating and holly's popularity seems to be growing. It is not known for sure, but it is nice to think that

holly trees at the Roscoe Hutchinson home might have been brought from old England itself. The following information on this popular Christmas green is interesting, especially to those other holly who live in Plymouth, Holly Carter and Holly Pitzon Pugh.

THE HOLLY

The Virginia world opened sleepy, surprised eyes to find snow sparkling white beneath a cloudless sky. 'Twas then memory found a picture that will never fade. A holly tree with its dense tangle of thick short twigs and stiff foliage had caught innumerable puffs of clinging white. Bright red berries, rich green leaves, pure white snow

and deep blue sky, strong colors intermingled with bold strokes. The melting snow wetted leaves and berries making them glisten in the dullest sunlight. Red, white, green; white, green, red—up and up to a towering mass of resplendent tri-color like a 40-foot bouquet, against a foil of blue.

HOLLY HISTORY

Man has noted the beauty of the Holly since earliest time, says the National Wildlife Federation, as evidenced in songs, poems and folk tales. The spirit of old superstitions of gnomes, and wood sprites hangs among its twisted branches. It brings dreams of holly leaves and berries. Holly hanging came from the old Roman Festival of Saturn or from the Teutonic practice of hanging evergreen as refuge for hibernating spirits. In parts of England it is considered unlucky to bring in holly before Christmas eve. In the Yorkshire tradition the husband or wife will rule, depending on whether the holly brought in has rough leaves or smooth.

AMERICAN HOLLY

American holly is much like the European species. It grows in moist, sunny places from East Texas to New Jersey, and north along the coast to Cape Cod, Massachusetts. In Louisiana it attains a height of 100 feet, with its stocky, rough trunk 4 feet in diameter. In spring the inconspicuous flowers of some trees are all staminate, of the others, all pistillate. Only the latter, of course, will produce the 1/2-inch berrylike fruits. Lustrous evergreen leaves, bright berries and pyramidal crown make it a fine shade or ornamental tree, particularly near the coast where it is resistant to salt spray. Europeans make hedges of it.

Holly wood is white, hard, tough, uniform and stains well. It is used for scientific ebony, colored inlays, turnings, cabinetwork, interior finishing, sporting and athletic goods. The bark was employed in making birdlime.

STATE TREE

The holly is the state tree of Delaware. It is protected by law in several states. Before Christmas, unscrupulous people trespass and tear off branches indiscriminately, killing many trees. Holly grows slowly. No berries are borne until it is 10 years old. If the branches are cut cleanly at their junction & restraint is used, however, no harm is done. Correct holly clipping is a proper and profitable annual harvest. The public can help most in protection of this fine tree, says the National Wildlife Federation, by seeing that all holly branches for sale were legitimately harvested. Destructive stealing must be made unprofitable or the American holly will be gone forever.

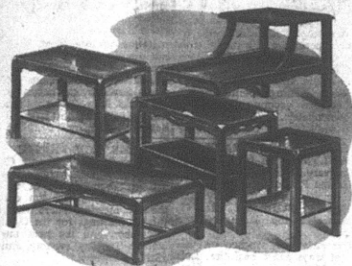

The U.S. Airforce is thanking T/Sgt. Farrell Williamson for thinking up an idea that is expected to save about \$100,000 annually in maintenance at the Alaskan base where he is stationed. The following report comes in from the management improvement program at Ladd base, in Alaska:

T/Sgt. Farrell Williamson, of the 449th, being aware that qualified personnel were available to do minor maintenance on the J-33 engines, started the ball rolling to get authorization and kits for such work. This has been realized and will more than double the hours engines can stay in the area. The saving in crating and shipping the engines stateside and back, together with the reduced AOC of aircraft, is estimated to be well over \$100,000 annually.

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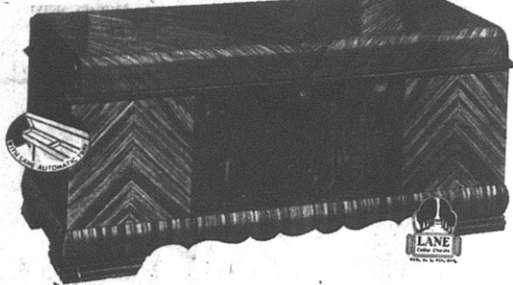
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
