Drive-In Theatre Opens Saturday

Star View Drive-In Theatre, located on Rt. 20 between Monroeville and Norwalk, re-opens Saturday, Mar. 22, with former manager Ernie Plitz, recalled to Naval service 1½ years ago, back at the helm.

Recalled to colors in Sept. 1950, he reported to Philadelphia Navy Yard for assignment. There he was assigned to the U. S. Naval Control of Shipping, Seattle, Wash. and flown to Treasure Island, Calif. for two weeks training with Commander, Western Sea Frontier. Upon completion of training he was flown by the Military Air Transportation to Seattle, landing at a nearby air base in a dense fog with the help of Radar Ground Control. Approach method of bringing the plane down in foul weather, in the Seattle theatre now used by Control of Shipping was then formed. The unit being classified handled routing and convey of ships carrying military cargo and troops to the Far East. All ships handled by NSCO, returned safely to the Continental limits of the United States.

In March 1951, his wife Dolores and two-year-old daughter joined him in the Northwest and all returned together in February, 1952, with an abundant supply of photographs of that colorful mountainous country.

While on the west coast, Ernie Plitz visited several of the Drive-In Theatres and was surprised to find they lacked many of the amenities and conveniences provided by his own Star View. Entering and leaving the area took three to four times longer than most patrons of the Midwest theatres now use to depart theatre areas.

Personal comment: "It's wonderful to be among grand people again and speaking for the family, we hope we can remain here forever."

With the re-opening of the theatre on Saturday the best in courteous service will be provided; the best obtainable film at no increase in price despite the rise of film cost; the best in sound and projection; and the latest improvements and entertainment will be adopted as they become available.
