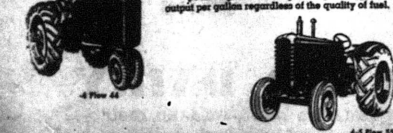

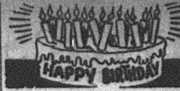

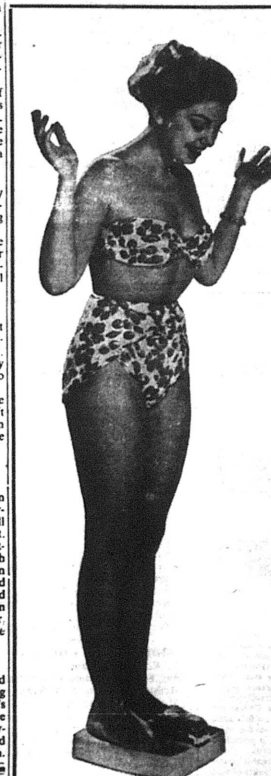

Huron County Polio Report

Although the "March of Dimes" Drive officially ended at the close of January, contributions have been coming in to the various area chairmen in Huron County sufficiently to warrant holding open their drive until now. With the last area report in for the 1952 drive the Chairman, Ruth Friend submits the following report.

Gross returns from the whole county were \$13,885.41, an increase over 1951 of \$2,298.52.

Breaking it down into areas it reads as follows: Willard Ch. Lois Moore, \$1,231.00; Bellevue, I. H. Kahle, directing for the Lion's Club, \$2,245.61; New London, Ch. K. C. De Good \$915.82; Plymouth, Ch. M. J. Coon, \$461.51; Greenwich, Ch. Pearl Eichenlaub, \$881.47; Monteville, Ch. Guy Latham, \$1,454.22; Wakarusa, Mrs. G. J. Cranston, Ch. \$431.81; Collins, Ch. Lawrence Pfeiffer, \$131.55; North Fairfield, Ch. Thomas McIntyre, \$203.25; Norwalk, Jack Gerkin directing for the Jr. Chamber of Commerce, \$5,929.19.

Although Huron County had fewer Polio victims in 1951 than in 1950, there are two Polio patients from the 1950 season still receiving treatment regularly; also three from the 1951 season were just discharged from Gates Memorial Hospital, Elyria and three others still under treatment.

The "March of Dimes" in this County has not kept pace with the "March of Polio" since the Huron County Chapter has had to ask for funds from National Headquarters every year since 1948. However, it is the earnest hope of all that this county will be spared this coming polio season.

1951 Accomplishments

During the past polio season, 28 persons were hospitalized as possible polio with 10 proving actual cases. The cost of those hospitalized cases and proving negative, ranged from \$60.00 to \$225.00. For those hospitalized and proving positive the cost ranged from \$295 for the milder case to \$2,400.00 for those more seriously involved.

Braces were provided for five of the new patients as well as for six patients of former years. The Chapter provided for four corrective operations during the summer of '51 and they have six who are receiving regular therapy treatments.

Every contributor to the "March

of Dimes" can feel they have contributed to the vast program of research and care as carried on by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis; but they have also assured themselves or any of their family the best possible care should they be unfortunate victims of polio.

Hospitalization

The Huron County Chapter has definite commitments with City Hospital so all patients can be hospitalized as quickly as possible when necessary; with Gates Hospital at Elyria where most of the children convalesce; and for outpatients needing therapy treatments. Dr. Crawford of Mansfield an outstanding Orthopedic Surgeon supervises the patients from the southern part of the county, while those of the northern part receive their therapy at Elyria under the direction of Dr. Strong.

The yearly organization meeting of the Huron County Chapter when officers for the coming year will be elected will be Monday evening, March 31 at 8 p.m. in the

Courtroom, Huron County Court House and all contributors are privileged to attend not only to elect the officers but to assist in setting up the policy for the coming year.

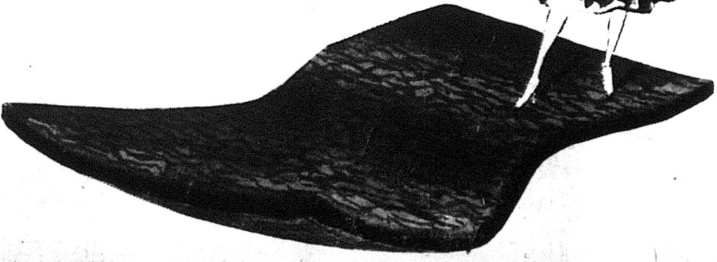

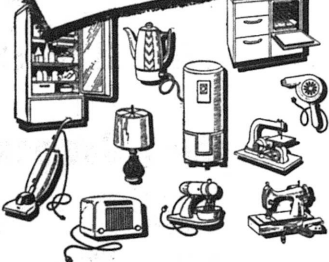

So that the parents know the legal side of school attendance, the following material is reprinted from the Ohio School Code.

School absence may be approved only on the basis of any one or more of the following conditions:

- Personal illness
- Illness in family. (This does not apply to children under fourteen years of age.)
- Quarantine of the home.
- Death of a relative (This is limited to a three day period.)
- Home work due to the absence of parents or guardian. (This applies only to the time the parents are actually absent from the home.)
- Observance of religious holidays

These are only the legal school absences which the State of Ohio recognizes.

Parents sometime allow children to miss school for such things as vacation trips, shopping trips, work for relatives, and other miscellaneous purposes.

Since it is the legal duty of the superintendent of schools to enforce the attendance laws, it will

facilitate the matter if parents will allow their children only to be absent for the legal reasons.
